Social Justice Ministry Meeting

June 8, 2023 Minutes

Opening Prayer: Sue led us in the opening prayer.

People Attending: Sue McNamara; Bill Engels; Steve Dublinski; Bonita Lawhead; Francy Pavlas Bose

Disciple in Dialogue:

- Fall session: "How to be an Anti-Racist" by Ibram X Kendi was discussed
 - We will order the two workbooks for Kendi's book through the Social Justice Ministry funds to review for future programs this fall.
 - If we can find the video or discussion by Kendi, we should plan to obtain and listen to it also for future discussion
 - Workshops were suggested to raise awareness of how to react to racism through improved listening skills
 - Sue brought up a book called "The Other Talk" about the white person's learning about racism which should help with the listening skills mentioned above
- Conversation about the School Board Meeting addressing Racism complaints in the Pullman School District
 - About eight people commented/addressed the board, including an 8th grader
 - After the meeting, participants discussed follow-up actions with Palouse CORE (Council on Racial Equity). CORE is assisting with the upcoming Juneteenth celebration in Moscow and received a \$500 grant from Inatai Foundation for the event.
- Suggested Workshops to raise awareness

The group discussed the idea of a panel with representation from different groups in Pullman concerned about racism, for the next program at the parish in the fall. Suggested participants included Dr. Jeff Gilroy and Bill Wasmuth's sister at St. Gertrude's Monastery in Cottonwood. Bill will reach out to Palouse CORE for further ideas and to invite their participation in the program. The group may apply for a grant from Inatai Foundation to finance the program.

Refugee Resettlement in Pullman for Afghans and Ukrainians [Via Interfaith Connections' meeting notes]

- Refugees need English Classes:
- WSU has intensive classes for \$4000
- Spokane Falls Community College, Pullman, hosts an English language course in reading, writing, speaking, and listening. It meets two hours daily four days a week. The cost is \$25 or, for those receiving DHSH services, free.
- Start a Refugee Service Committee with the Interfaith Connections Group
- Stuff and Storage at <u>Simpson United Methodist</u>: It was thought best to not collect things, but rather provide funds to purchase needed items from local thrift stores
- Current situation and ideas to address :
 - 1. individual help to practice speaking English
 - 2. Francy and Sue will join Larry Fox & Liz Siler (IC) in dispersing the collected items and stop collecting.
- Direct Service ideas for Sacred Heart Parish are needed

Laudato Si' Disciples

- Enhance or review the current ways we are addressing Climate Change both individually and as a Parish
- Parish "REFRESHER OF CURRENT ACTIVITIES AND HOW TO GET INVOLVED." The group began planning 3-minute announcements at the end of Masses this fall. Bill will draft the announcement for those presenting. Topics for SJM include
 - TREX recycling and signing up to receive a bench (2 benches will be kept at Sacred Heart)
 - 2. Glass & metal lid recycling (perhaps using a clear plastic bag?)

Other concerns addressed included:

- Brainstorming other possibilities
- o Repeat Laudato Si Program
- Sue would like us to consider "Water Use" on the Palouse and how it can be improved. Also address food waste, pre- and post-consumer (Sue)
- o Plan to address MOPI in 2024
