Refugee Resettlement

- Sacred Heart purchased a car seat/stroller for one of the two Afghan families in Pullman; they are expecting a baby girl.
- Francy Bose was informed about a Ukrainian couple in Pullman; Sue McNamara will follow up.

<u>Laudato Si' Disciples</u>: The group will host a showing and discussion of *The Letter*, a documentary based on Pope Francis' encyclical *Laudato Si': On Care for Our Common Home*, at Sacred Heart on Thursday, April 20, at 6:30-8:30 pm.

Neighbors in Dialogue: A presentation by and dialogue with three Indigenous persons was scheduled for April 12 at Community Congregational Church. Julian Matthews, Leader of Nimiipuu Environmental group, Tipiziwin Tolman of the Lakota Standing Rock tribe and WSU professor, and Aaron Miles from the Nimiipuu tribe shared their experiences with ongoing racial discrimination, including in the Pullman school district.

<u>Community Connections</u>: 270 Origami "peace dove" Easter cards were made with help of parishioner Lina Quock. The distribution plan was Pioneer Square, Avalon, Regency 200; Circles of Caring 25; and Homebound at Sacred Heart 50.

Family Promise:

- The Comfort Food Cook-off, their annual fundraiser, Saturday, April 22, <u>was</u> cancelled as of April 18.
- The next hosting of families by Sacred Heart volunteers is May 12-13.

Food/Donation Drives:

- Cougar Food Pantry: Based on the response from parishioners as of March 22, SJM expected to deliver close to 500 lbs. of food during Lent.
- The following will be collected from the Community Action Center after Easter: pasta sauce; pasta; soup; canned fruit; canned vegetables; canned meats: chicken; salmon; spam; granola bars; cooking items (sugar; flour; oil); crackers, any type; diapers (sizes 3, 4, 5, 6.); hygiene items; shampoo; body soap; tooth brushes, tooth paste. Items can be placed in the basket at the church entrance.

Move-out/Pitch In:

- Tim will advise WSU to tell students they can give items no longer needed to local groups such as Palouse Treasures, Goodwill, and Cooper's Legacy in Pullman, and Hope Center and Habitat for Humanity in Moscow.
