

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As we seek to move forward with the guidelines given for Phase D from the Bishop's Decree and the options given, there will be some adjustments for seating in Mass. Phase D is the latest phase from the Diocese and will be in effect until an unknown date in the future. Taking into consideration that the dispensation from the obligation of going to Sunday Mass is ending on August 15, we want to have the opportunity for people to come to Mass, even if they may have to do so with the inconvenience of wearing



a face mask. I invite you to treat the wearing of the face mask as an **act of charity to your neighbor** more than a concern for yourself.

Looking forward to after August 15, I invite you to please keep this teaching from the Catechism of the Catholic Church (par. 2181) in mind,

The Sunday Eucharist is the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice. For this reason the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, unless excused for a serious reason (for example, illness, the care of infants) or dispensed by their own pastor. Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin. For those with underlying health issues, you do not have the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays or Holy Days of Obligation.

One of the guiding principles with the decree from the bishop is that we have either 1) 6ft minimum social distancing between households or 2) wear face masks with adapted social distancing. Having a 6ft minimum social distancing within Mass would mean that less than 50% of the church seating could be utilized. There is a strong desire to allow more people to come and participate within Mass. For the time being, the 4:30pm Vigil Mass will still be designated for the vulnerable. Beginning Saturday, July 25, the Masses for Sunday will be arranged as follows:

Saturday, 4:30pm Vigil Mass: (for the vulnerable)

- Face Masks required
- 6ft social distancing in place

Sunday, 8:00am Mass

- Face Masks recommended and optional
- 6ft social distancing in place

Sunday, 10:30am Mass

- Face Masks required
- Adapted social distancing

This means that at the 10:30am Mass, all pews will be open and you can determine the social distancing you have between yourself and your neighbor. Face masks are required at that Mass. With the additional seating, we will move away from the option of reserving a pew section at any of the Masses. There will be a slight adjustment to pew availability. It will be first come, first to choose their seat, as it has been in the past. Daily Mass along with Adoration will have the 6ft social distancing in place with the face masks being recommended and optional.

St. James the Apostle July 25

This James is the brother of John the Evangelist. The two were called by Jesus as they worked with their father in a fishing boat on the Sea of Galilee. Jesus had already called another pair of brothers from a similar occupation: Peter and Andrew. "He walked along a little farther and saw James, the son of Zebedee, and his brother John. They too were in a boat mending their nets. Then he called them. So they left their father Zebedee in the boat along with the hired men and followed him" (Mark 1:19-20).

James was one of the favored three who had the privilege of witnessing the Transfiguration, the raising to life of the daughter of Jairus, and the agony in Gethsemani. Two incidents in the Gospels describe the temperament of this man and his brother. Saint Matthew tells that their mother came—Mark says it was the brothers themselves—to ask that they have the seats of honor in the kingdom. "Jesus said in reply, 'You do not know what you are asking. Can you drink the cup that I am going to drink?' They said to him, 'We can'" (Matthew 20:22). Jesus then told them they would indeed drink the cup and share his baptism of pain and death, but that sitting at his right hand or left was not his to give—it "is for those for whom it has been prepared by my Father" (Matthew 20:23b). It remained to be seen how long it would take to realize the implications of their confident "We can!"

The other disciples became indignant at the ambition of James and John. Then Jesus taught them all the lesson of humble service: The purpose of authority is to serve. They are not to impose their will on others, or lord it over them. This is the position of Jesus himself. He was the servant of all; the service imposed on him was the supreme sacrifice of his own life.

On another occasion, James and John gave evidence that the nickname Jesus gave them—"sons of thunder"—was an apt one. The Samaritans would not welcome Jesus because he was on his way to hated Jerusalem. "When the disciples James and John saw this they asked, 'Lord, do you want us to call down fire from heaven to consume them?' Jesus turned and rebuked them..." (Luke 9:54-55). James was apparently the first of the apostles to be martyred. "About that time King Herod laid hands upon some members of the church to harm them. He had James, the brother of John, killed by the sword, and when he saw that this was pleasing to the Jews he proceeded to arrest Peter also" (Acts 12:1-3a).

PARISH UPDATES

COVID-19 Current Guidelines

Per Bishop Doherty's Decree from <u>June 25</u>, the Diocese is moving to Phase D. The following are changes affecting SJV in an effort to protect the safety of all our parishioners.

- Everyone is dispensed from the obligation to attend Holy Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation until **August 15.** This dispensation concludes at 11:59pm on August 15 and does not include the Saturday Vigil Mass for August 16.
- We have returned to our normal Daily Mass, Adoration and Confession schedules.
- The <u>parish office</u> has resumed its normal schedule from 8:00am-5:00pm Monday thru Friday.
- Holy Water will not be in the fonts. However, you may take Holy Water from the tank if you so desire.
- There will be <u>no congregational singing</u> and chanting by clergy is suspended. Certain parts of the Mass will be chanted by the cantor and are not to be joined by the congregation.
- The collection basket is placed at the foot of the altar for you to place your offering either before or after Mass.
- The Sign of Peace is suspended until further notice.
- The <u>Precious Blood</u> will not be distributed at Mass until further notice.
- Per Diocesan instruction, those wishing to receive the <u>Eucharist on the tongue</u> are requested to wait until the end of Holy Communion, limiting possible virus transmission. This is requested as an act of charity toward your brothers and sisters in the assembly.
- Social Distancing of 6-feet has been taken into consideration and thus limits the occupancy of persons in the church. Family members can sit together.
- Saturday 4:30pm Mass
- ♦ The **Saturday 4:30pm Vigil Mass at SJV will be specifically for those who are vulnerable** to protect them from unnecessary interaction with the healthier/non-vulnerable population.
- ♦ Face masks are required for this Mass and social distancing of 6-feet will be in place for households. Face masks are available upon entrance to the church for those who need them.
- ♦ There will be <u>no music</u> at this Mass.
- ♦ This Mass will be <u>live streamed</u> online at the St. John Vianney Catholic Church YouTube channel accessible via sjyfishers.com.

Sunday 8:00am Mass

- Face masks are recommended and optional for these Masses and social distancing of 6-feet will be in place for households. Face masks are available upon entrance to the church for those who want them.
- Sunday 10:30am Mass
 - ♦ Face masks are required for these Masses. Face masks are available upon entrance to the church for those who want them.
 - ♦ All pews will be available for seating and you may determine how close you sit to one another.




