

Most immigrants are undocumented

and here illegally?

FALSE!

On average 74.5% of immigrants become naturalized citizens or are active green card holders. Most of the 25.5% of undocumented immigrants *did* enter with legal visas.

TRUE!

Until the late 1800s the US had an "open immigration system." In the early 1920s, when passage to America became easier, the regulations became more difficult.

TRUE!

Over half of undocumented immigrants overstay legal visas and do not cross the border illegally.



Documented vs Undocumented

- **Documented immigrants:** were legally admitted to the United States and hold the proper status to stay here.
- **Undocumented immigrants:** do not hold status to legally stay here. They either entered without inspection, overstayed their permitted visa, or otherwise violate terms under which they were admitted.

Why do we not use the term "illegal immigrant?"

 Though the action of staying here may be illegal, the person is not illegal.

Every person has intrinsic value as a human being. Undocumented immigrants have the same human worth and deserve to be treated with the same human dignity, as us all.

Some Documented Terms and Statuses

- The role of MRS is to involve, organize, and bring together the agency, church, and community resources necessary for successful resettlement.





Migration and Refugee Services History

6 MILLION
DISPLACED PEOPLE
RETURNED

6 million displaced people returned to their areas or countries of origin in 2022, including 5.7 million internally displaced people and 339,300 refugees.


114,300
REFUGEES
RESETTLED

114,300 refugees were resettled in 2022, double the previous year (57,500), according to government statistics. UNHCR submitted 116,500 refugees to States for resettlement.



Journey of a Refugee

- Country of Origin
 - Born and flee due to conflict or persecution
- Refugee Camp
 - Supposed to be Temporary shelter
 - Confined within the territory
 - Become permanent home for some
- New Home
 - USA, Australia, other countries



- Dietary and/or Religious restrictions

First 90 days

We...

- "Help enroll children in school
- "Get families to medical appointments
- "Teach adults English as a Second Language. Provide cultural and community orientation such as use of banks, bus routes etc.
- "Begin the process of work orientation, development and placement
- "Long term assistance include job upgrades and adjustment of their immigration status



After 90 Days

- What happens after 90 days?
 - MRS services extend up to 5 years
 - Still provide resources and services.
 - Extended Caseworker
 - Hygiene items, furniture, and household items
- After 5 years, they can apply for their citizenship



How do you stay in America legally?

- There are different ways, but they all depend on one's circumstances. The most typical way is to apply for a green card.
- A green card (also known as a Permanent Resident Card) allows you to live and work permanently in the U.S. *it does expire



"Can't I do it myself?"

NOTE: If you answered "Yes" to Item Number 2., you must have selected a family-based, employment-based, special immigrant, or Diversity Visa immigrant category listed above in Item Numbers 1.a. - 1.g. as the basis for your application for adjustment of status. Fill out the rest of this application and Supplement A to Form I-485, Adjustment of Status Under Section 245(i) (Supplement A). For detailed filing instructions, read the Form I-485 Instructions (including any Additional Instructions that relate to the immigrant category that you selected in Item Numbers 1.a. - 1.g.) and Supplement A Instructions.



The application process

- Information for the I-485 application:
 - Biographical/Identification info
 - Address history
 - Employment history
 - Marriage info and history
 - Children info
 - Extensive criminal background info



Don't forget the Lawyer Fees!

Private Immigration lawyers charge between \$2,000 and \$12,000, with hourly rates ranging from \$100 to \$300.

Avoid NOTARIOS!
