

Pastor's Corner | Father Richard Doerr
**The Month of Remembrance, Funeral Planning,
and The Proper Interment of Human Remains**

November is often called “the month of remembrance” because we begin with the Commemoration of All Souls on the 2nd of the month. It is a time when we recall those who had died and gone before us marked with the sign of faith. When the world tells us to move past the trauma of losing a loved one, the Church gives us permission to remember, grieve, and pray for those who have died.

To help grieving families in the stressful time of the death of a loved one, I think it is incumbent on all of us to think about and plan our own funerals. Sound unpleasant? Well, it can be, but it can also be an opportunity to plan a liturgy that will inspire and evangelize your family and friends about the most important things. Our website has an excellent funeral planning page with a worksheet and links to Scripture and music options. Go to the liturgy tab, and one of the choices is funerals; it is quite easy to navigate. Also, you are invited to attend a funeral liturgy planning workshop hosted by Rex Rund, Director of Music and Liturgy, on Saturday, November 19, at 9:00 AM in the school library.

Part of the funeral process is the respectful interment of the remains of the deceased. I must admit that, particularly as cremation becomes more common, this is getting more and more challenging. I got a sense of this when my dog died. The veterinary technician offered me all sorts of options for Bosco’s ashes, including a necklace and Christmas ornaments. “No thanks!” I said rather abruptly.

To be clear, this has nothing to do with my dog’s remains! But believe it or not, these same options and more are offered for human remains. Often in the throes of grief, when given these options, we respond emotionally. In trying to keep a loved one close, we do not think through what happens in a generation or two. As each day passes, our memory will become more distant on this earth. Who will ensure that the Christmas ornaments and necklaces are dealt with in a dignified manner?

Thus, we must avoid practices that eliminate the sense of the sacred. A recent memorandum from Cardinal Ladaria, Prefect for the Congregation of the Doctrine of the Faith, instructs that the preferred practice is to inter the body of the deceased person. In my experience, having the body present at the funeral generally allows for a better grieving process for the bereaved. If cremation is chosen, it is preferred (but not required) that the body is present for the Mass of Christian Burial and that the cremation takes place after.

After the funeral, it is strongly recommended that the ashes be interred in a sacred place – a cemetery, mausoleum, or columbarium. In short, the ashes of the deceased are to be handled with the exact same reverence with which the body would be treated. This guidance eliminates options like storage on the fireplace mantle, scattering ashes on golf courses, or dropping them off at the haunted mansion at Disney World (I’m not kidding. Apparently, it happens regularly). Likewise, in the eyes of the Church, it is not acceptable to separate ashes among family members or make them into jewelry, artwork, or ornaments. Again, it is our duty to think long-term and treat the ashes with reverence.

There are also new green/eco-friendly methods to dispose of human remains, too many to be listed in this column. In some cases, it is acceptable (perhaps “tolerated” is a better word) to treat a body with one of these new methods, so long as what remains is respectfully interred at the end.

Put simply, our bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit. At the end of life, they should be interred in a way that demonstrates our reverence and belief in the resurrection of the dead. May we rest in peace at the end of our lives!





YOUTH ON FIRE EUCCHARISTIC ENCOUNTERS SPARK VOCATIONS

Ever since the 1992 World Youth Day in Denver, where a crowd of 100,000 chanted "JPII, we love you!" Catholic youth events have been growing stronger, as evidenced by the thousands who attended Steubenville Conferences this past summer at 16 locations nationwide.

One of the most memorable moments of the conferences comes at the final Mass, when celebrants ask teens to come forward if they're open to a call to the priesthood or religious life. "Every year it's a shock to see hundreds of teens stand up," said Bryan Wells, one of the conference coordinators. "Our mission is to help kids encounter Christ, and one of the fruits is

that they're willing to consider a radical way of life and admit in public." Typically the response to their generosity is overwhelming. "When the teens come forward, the applause literally lasts for minutes," said Bryan. "It's an amazing testament to what the Lord is doing in the Church today."


SISTERS IN SCHOOLS



**U.S. CHURCH STATS****CRISIS IN MARRIAGE**

We often think of the “vocations crisis” as referring to the decreasing numbers of priests and religious, but the vocation of marriage is faring far worse. In the last fifty years, the number of annual priestly ordinations dropped 54%, from 805 ordinations in 1970 to 441 in 2021. In that same time period, the annual number of Catholic weddings dropped by more than three-quarters: there were 77% fewer newlyweds last year than there were in 1970. And this while the Catholic population grew by 20 million people. Thus while we teach Catholic youth to listen for God’s call, we need to be sure to emphasize that Christian marriage, while at times difficult, is a beautiful and worthwhile vocation.

Reading 1 - 2 Mc 7:1-2, 9-14

It happened that seven brothers with their mother were arrested and tortured with whips and scourges by the king, to force them to eat pork in violation of God's law. One of the brothers, speaking for the others, said: "What do you expect to achieve by questioning us? We are ready to die rather than transgress the laws of our ancestors."

At the point of death he said:

"You accursed fiend, you are depriving us of this present life, but the King of the world will raise us up to live again forever. It is for his laws that we are dying."

After him the third suffered their cruel sport. He put out his tongue at once when told to do so, and bravely held out his hands, as he spoke these noble words: "It was from Heaven that I received these; for the sake of his laws I disdain them; from him I hope to receive them again." Even the king and his attendants marveled at the young man's courage, because he regarded his sufferings as nothing.

After he had died, they tortured and maltreated the fourth brother in the same way. When he was near death, he said, "It is my choice to die at the hands of men with the hope God gives of being raised up by him; but for you, there will be no resurrection to life."

Finally, brothers and sisters, pray for us, so that the word of the Lord may speed forward and be glorified, as it did among you, and that we may be delivered from perverse and wicked people, for not all have faith.

But the Lord is faithful; he will strengthen you and guard you from the evil one. We are confident of you in the Lord that what we instruct you, you are doing and will continue to do.

May the Lord direct your hearts to the love of God and to the endurance of Christ.

Gospel - Lk 20:27-38 or Lk 20:27, 34-38

Some Sadducees, those who deny that there is a resurrection, came forward and put this question to Jesus, saying, "Teacher, Moses wrote for us,

If someone's brother dies leaving a wife but no child, his brother must take the wife and raise up descendants for his brother.

Now there were seven brothers; the first married a woman but died childless. Then the second and the third married her, and likewise all the seven died childless. Finally the woman also died.

Now at the resurrection whose wife will that woman be? For all seven had been married to her."

Jesus said to them, "The children of this age marry and remarry; but those who are deemed worthy to attain to the coming age and to the resurrection of the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. They can no longer die, for they are like angels; and they are the children of God because they are the ones who will rise.

That the dead will rise even Moses made known in the passage about the bush, when he called out 'Lord,' the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob; and he is not God of the dead, but of the living, for to him all are alive."



Dear Apologist,

I've heard people compare "trans" identification to being left-handed. How do I respond?

There are two different theories about what is happening. The first is that there's nothing actually wrong with these kids, but a mixture of peer pressure and other triggers have induced their dysphoria. It is, in essence, a social contagion. The other theory is that this phenomenon is much like left-handedness. There was once a time when being left-handed was strongly discouraged. As society moved away from this superstition, the number of left-handed people gradually increased until it leveled out around 10%. Activists for gender ideology insist that the rapid increase in trans-identification is the same sort of thing. It is merely an uncovering of something natural which was repressed by Abrahamic religions.

So who is right? Consider this: Activists often say that living outwardly as "trans" and being affirmed in that identity is a life-and-death matter of mental health. If this condition is natural and has been with us all along while being suppressed, we would expect the newfound increase in trans-identification to be coupled with a corresponding decline in rates of depression and suicide among the youth. It would be the solution to a long and terrible mystery of why young people are depressed and suicidal. And yet, we have seen the opposite. The increase in trans-identification has occurred alongside rapid increases in mental health issues among the youth. According to the CDC, persistent feelings of hopelessness have increased by 40% among high school students between 2009 and 2019. This strongly points us away from the comparisons to left-handedness and to the explanation that this is a social contagion which spreads among groups of emotionally troubled minors.

How to Report an Incident of Sexual Abuse of a Minor

If you or someone you know has been a victim of child sexual abuse in the past or present day by clergy (priest or deacon) you are requested to report the incident in the following manner:

1. Make a report to Child Protective Services by calling 800.800.5556 or local law enforcement.
2. Call Jackie Montrie M.A., LMFT, LMHC, Victim Assistance Coordinator of the Diocese of Lafayette-in-Indiana at 765.464.4988.
3. Thereafter, an investigation will be undertaken by or on behalf of the Diocese of Lafayette-in-Indiana.

If you or someone you know has been a victim of child sexual abuse in the past or present day by someone working in a parish or school for the Roman Catholic Church in the Diocese of Lafayette-in-Indiana (such as a religious sister or brother, lay employee, lay volunteer, etc.), you are requested to report the incident in the following manner:

1. Make a report to Child Protective Services by calling 800.800.5556 or local law enforcement.
2. Call our Ethics Hotline 855.375.6796, or go to dioceseoflafayetteinindiana.ethicspoint.com.

3. Call Jeanne Lausten, Director of Human Resources at 765.269.4604.
