

# A Note from the Pastor

Jean-Marie Lustiger was the Cardinal Archbishop of Paris until 2005. Cardinal Lustiger was born and raised a Jew and was given the name Aaron at his birth. But in 1939 (when he was 10 years old!), he came across a Bible and was introduced to the story of Jesus. It filled him with curiosity about the once itinerant preacher from Nazareth.

During the war, Aaron's parents were forced to wear the yellow badge and eventually died in the Shoah, but Aaron and his sister were hidden away by Christians. Interestingly, the tipping point for Aaron's eventual conversion to Catholicism wasn't our beautiful doctrine and traditions. Rather, it was his experience of walking into a French cathedral and experiencing its beauty. He was mesmerized and soon was baptized when he was 13 years old.

Many years ago when our staff began praying about the 2017 renovation of our church, we became convinced that Christian art plays a key role in evangelization. As Fr. Robert Barron once said, "Once a person is hooked by the beauty found in a Church, people are often more receptive to the idea that such beauty is inextricably connected to a way of life." Put another way, the beauty found in Christian art often leads people to imitate Christ, which leads them to the truth of Christ.

I want to thank you for supporting our pursuit of beauty during our recent church renovation! Your trust has born much fruit and fills many with awe as they see our beautiful Stations of the Cross, our mosaics, our new altar and ambo, and the lighting that draws our attention to them.

I believe that the beauty of our newly renovated church inspires us to greater discipleship. It is truly beautiful to see so many catechists spread the Good News at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel. It is beautiful to hear coaches on our sports fields not only teach the fundamentals of sports, but also teaching others about Christ. It is beautiful to see so many serving Christ present in the poorest of the poor. It is beautiful to see so many serve at the Sacrifice of the Mass as cantors, lectors, and altar servers.

Your support of our various parish ministries is incredibly inspiring to so many. I pray prayers of gratitude for you each day. May God continue to bless our parish family!

2017 began with a project that's been in the works for years, and for which many have waited with hope and anticipation: renovation of our sanctuary space, including some improvements in the nave. For some people, "Why?" is the first question, "Didn't we just do a major church renovation 15 years ago?" Yes, we did. But that renovation was focused on, to borrow and adapt a real estate phrase: space, space, and space. We added 300 seats to the church, expanded gathering space and overflow seating in the narthex, provided meeting rooms in the lower level, and added a sacristy and the holy prayer space of the Adoration Chapel. Space was our greatest need, and matters of beauty, for good or ill, took a back seat to that priority. Over the subsequent years, other priorities have continued to take precedence over beautifying the church space. Now, it was deemed to be time to return to the unfinished beautification of the worship space. Not in lieu of other works of the church, but rather to inspire us to live Christ's love more and more.

The sanctuary, in particular, had an "unfinished" feel to it after the 2002 project. For example, the back wall behind the altar was done in the same floor tile as is in the narthex and church, hardly setting it off as the "heaven on earth" that the sanctuary is supposed to represent. And the 1970s abstract stained glass windows and Stations of the Cross in our nave, while not badly done, didn't seem to achieve the goal of inspiring one to prayer and awe when entering the church, nor were they easy to interpret which one depicted what.

In the present project, the OLMC renovation committee knew it was important to embrace and accept the building we have. It isn't enough to just "put lots of nice stuff in." The renovation strived to draw our minds and hearts to God a little more vertically, while in no way losing that marvelous sense of community that is so important to us as Catholics. The goal of this 2017 renovation, then, is to provide a worship space that speaks of God's glory and inspires a person to a sense of holiness and reverence from the moment one walks in. Why? Ultimately, to lead to a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ and His Church. That relationship, then, leads to a greater commitment to Christian service, day in and day out.



# PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

### **Stained Glass**

- 10 new stained glass windows replaced both the old stained glass and the six clear windows flanked the sanctuary. Each depicts a scene in the life of the Blessed Virgin Mary, our patroness.
- The former stained glass will be re-purposed, probably elsewhere on campus.

### Stations of the Cross

• The minimalist stations were replaced with more representational ones that inspire prayer and reflection. We chose the Leonard Porter stations: colorful, perhaps a bit daring, and packed with rich symbolism. The original paintings won the 2011 Merit Design Award from the American Institute of Architects' Interfaith Forum on Religion, Art, and Architecture.

### Sanctuary

- The sanctuary was reshaped to provide more space. The back wall of the sanctuary was repositioned and covered with a more noble material than the tile that covered it previously.
- Since the shape of the sanctuary changed, the flooring did, as well. The same marble flooring for the sanctuary extends down the center aisle all the way to the Baptismal font.
- The Tabernacle, Ambo, and presider's chair all shifted location to provide a more worthy place of reservation for the Blessed Sacrament and better liturgical function overall.
- The ceiling decking over the sanctuary was painted a lighter color than the rest of the nave to help set the sanctuary apart and raise the heart toward heaven.

## Nave & Lighting

- Many parishioners and visitors commented that our nave was oppressively dark. This project added light, with the dark brick of the outer walls stained a lighter color.
- Light oak (matching the pews) wainscot now wraps the large structural beams in the nave.
- The past lighting was replaced by LED lighting that:
  - Conserves energy and is far more economical
  - Much more effectively and artistically lights the nave and sanctuary
  - Provides different lighting scenes for various liturgical functions



My daughters and I had been through quite an ordeal. When I called the Merciful HELP Center, we had been living in a domestic violence transitional living facility in Southern California for three months. Previous to that, we had stayed in the DV shelter for 45 days. Seeking safety, I made the decision to move my family back to the Midwest to escape from my ex who was still actively looking for me and was pending a criminal trial for the violations against me. I hesitated to move back to an area where I had very little to no support. I had to leave everything behind and we had to start completely over. Knowing this, Kiki's compassion and the warmth of her voice when I called helped us pave a path back to Indiana.

Upon our arrival, Jayne was at the office when I came in the Monday of the week we arrived. She assured me that we were in good hands and helped us get food, household items, and school supplies for my girls. The young men that helped me that day were wonderful; they were so sweet and understanding.

Then we started working with Tom and Jerry. What a wonderful pair of Godly men. Coordinating with Judy and her team was effortless. When the team arrived to deliver my furniture, they were also amazing. One by one the items came in to fill my home, and it took everything I had to hold back the tears of joy. Everything delivered was beyond expectation. We were just looking for the basics, and they delivered our home.

We are now settled and loving our new space with our new-to-us furniture. Most importantly, we are all safe and loved on by the MHC and the staff. We have truly been blessed by this ministry and cannot thank you all enough for the hard work and dedication you commit to the families in need. I cannot say enough that despite everything I have been through, not once did you ever make my girls and me feel "less than." You loved and cared for us as if we were part of your own family.

Your community has helped strengthen not only my faith, but my children's, as they were witness to your kindness. And now, we can move forward. We look forward to working with you in the future as we would like to give back to you, your team, and the community, and do for others as you have done for us. We love and appreciate everything you have done and cannot thank you enough.
