


A Note from Nurse Hirsch

MIXING IT UP: A TEACHER'S GUIDE TO JUNIOR HIGH DV CELESTE MICNONE

When you think about what you want to be when you grow up, do you ever think, "Teacher!" It must be a huge challenge to be responsible for the education of students. I asked Mrs. Kavy about teaching junior high. She said, "I would say that I'm lucky...I love being with so many personalities but not being stuck with the same class." I agree that it must be nice to have change throughout the day to keep things fresh and interesting.

Speaking of keeping things interesting, how do teachers find educational videos that will keep students engaged? I asked Mrs. Jarl this exact question, and she said, "As a teacher of Social Studies, finding material that will help make history come alive and feel more relevant to my students is one of my top priorities as a teacher. Oftentimes, historical events and people of the past can feel very far and distant to kids, so it's super important I find audio and video clips and activities that they enjoy and helps deliver the information to them in a way that is memorable and fun. That being said, it is also important that I find videos that are factual and appropriate for my students."

So where do these videos come from? Mrs. Jarl continued on to say, "I have a few 'favorite' websites or online sources that consistently produce clips that are free from bias, which is especially important in Social Studies. Youtube, for example, is full of 'content creators' who aren't actually historians and only want to teach history from their point of view, which does not promote healthy learning in any classroom, so I try to stay away from those."

Mrs. Jarl is very hands-on with what she shows students. "I have a rule that I never show a clip that I haven't already watched myself!"

While videos are a great tool, teaching always comes down to...well, the teacher! I asked Mrs. Jarl about her teaching style and said, "As far as finding ways to teach lessons in a way that is fun and interesting, I try to think about activities that will help history come alive. Song parodies, silly rhymes, cartoons, and other appropriate pop cultural connections are usually good ways to do this. I also try to 'turn over' my lessons and not do the exact same things every year -just to keep it fresh. Involving other disciplines and subjects is also helpful - hands-on projects, artistic projects, and assignments that help you apply your knowledge to real-life, current events are things I try to incorporate every year."

No one teacher can do it alone. Mrs. Jarl informed me that she is "constantly talking to my fellow teachers to get inspiration for new lessons or new ideas for my classroom, as teaching junior high is really a 'team sport'." To everyone in 6th, 7th, and 8th grade: Do you remember when Mrs. Jarl showed us the video of Mesopotamia? That was the

best!

Overall, the junior high teachers (and all the other teachers in St. Augustine School) are amazing people, who do alot to make learning enjoyable.


When we got there one of the kind workers greeted us. There were also chaperones that led us through every sight.
