### **Halloween Luminaries**

Have you ever wondered how to make a spooky Halloween decoration in only a few steps? If you did then you're in luck! Let's learn how to make a fun Halloween decoration in only a few steps.

Before making this spooky decoration, you will need some materials. For this project, you will need a Mason Jar, orange tissue paper, wax paper, a sponge brush, scissors, a tea light, googly eyes (which are optional,) and Modge Podge.

To start, you will need to lay the wax paper down so you don't get messy. Then, you will need to cut the tissue paper into strips. Now, you take the cap off of your Mason Jar and turn it upside down. You do this so the lid doesn't stick to the Mason Jar. After that, you dip your brush into the Modge Podge and layer it on your Mason Jar. Now, put the strips on the Mason Jar, and don't forget to layer them equally! Next, you make a face or get your googly eyes and stick them on to your spooky creation using glue or Modge Podge. Finally, you let your decoration dry, and put the tea light inside of it. Congratulations, you just made a fun Halloween decoration!

Many healthcare professionals estimate that this number was actually much higher due to the availability of home-testing kits, and those who managed symptoms at home without needing to go to a doctor's office.

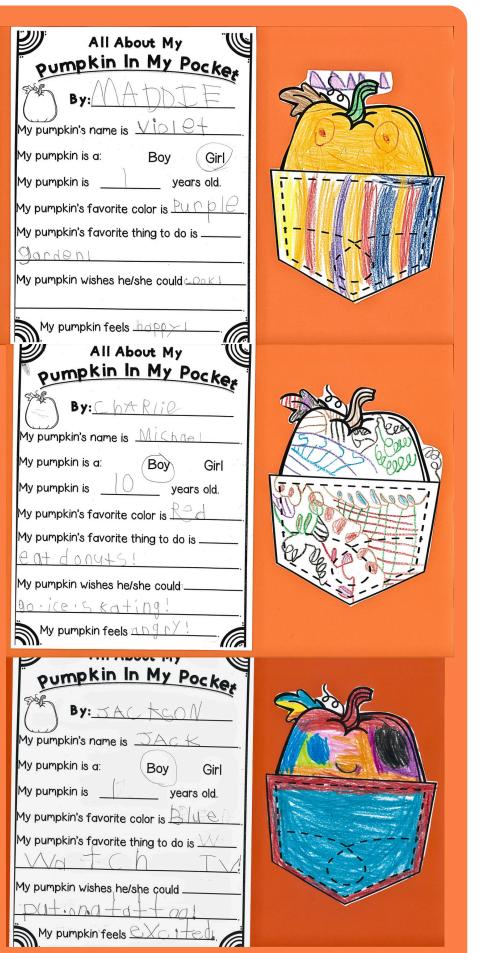
The single best way to prevent illness is to practice proper and frequent hand-washing: it really is that simple! (Selekman) Listed below are 10 more ways you and your family can help keep everyone healthy and attending school.

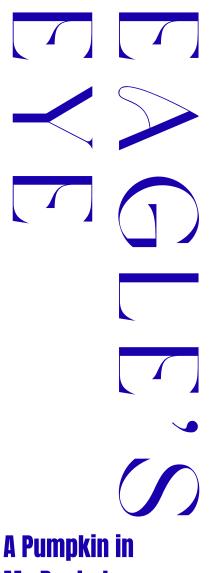
Cover your mouth with the inside of your elbow, or wash your hands immediately after sneezing or coughing into them.

•Avoid excess touching of the face.
•Avoid sharing food and drinks with friends.
•Prioritize sleep - and movement!
•Prioritize mental health. (Just trust me on this, it's all connected.)
•Eat a balanced, healthy diet that contains whole foods whenever possible.
•Take in sunshine and fresh air for at least 30 minutes a day.
•Control a cough with plenty of liquids and humid air.

Stay home when you are sick. (Friendly reminder: In order to return-to-school, your child should be 24-hours fever-free WITHOUT medication, and generally feeling well enough to have a productive day at school.)

Vaccination to prevent severe illness, and to protect vulnerable populations.

This project was titled 'All About My Pumpkin in My Pocket'.

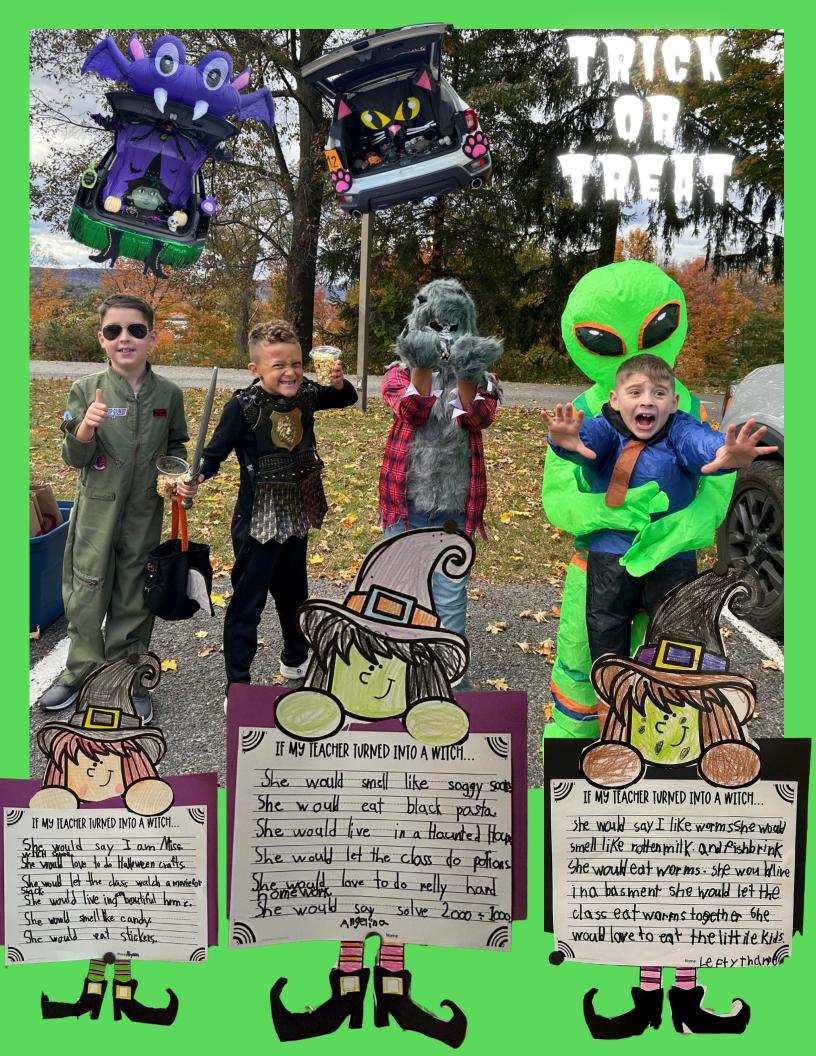
The students were able to create their own pumpkin and then answered questions pertaining to their pumpkin.

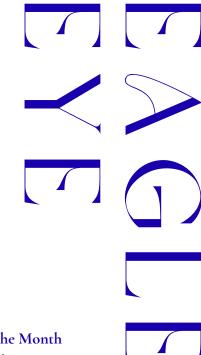
### St. Augustine School Student of the Month
