15 YEARS OF TANK PULL RAISE 2 MILLION DOLLARS FOR VETERANS

On June 8, 2025, the streets of Clifton Avenue echoed with the sounds of determination and unity as 53 teams gathered for the 15th NJ Army Tank Pull Challenge. Co-hosted by Catholic Charities Diocese of Paterson and the State Knights of Columbus, approximately 2,500 people of various backgrounds came together to honor and support our nation's veterans. This year, a record 53 teams, 20 major sponsors and donors, and 2 dozen service organizations joined in supporting this much-awaited sold out event.

This year's event was particularly significant, as it pushed the total funds raised since the Tank Pull's inception to \$2 million. These funds directly benefit veterans in need, notably through the work of various organizations serving veterans in NJ.

The 53 teams hailed from diverse sectors and from all across the state, including 11 veteran partner teams, 11 Knights of Columbus teams, and 10 labor union teams.

Families enjoyed bouncy castles and a popular ice cream truck while savoring hamburgers and hotdogs fresh from the grill, expertly manned by our dedicated veteran volunteers who brought their own special touch to the cookout. On stage, 3 National Guard service women celebrated 15 women veterans for their invaluable contributions to military service.


Another highlight came at the reveal of the 50/50, when Jon Paul Blasi II got one of the biggest prizes in the event's history: \$7250.




Bishop Kevin J. Sweeney and Msgr. Mark Condon offered strong leadership throughout the initiative. We are especially grateful to Fr. Hubert Jurjewicz and St. Simon the Apostle Church for hosting the Morris County sorting site, and to Deacon William Ruane and the diocesan deacons who volunteered countless hours to organize the generous donations.

The success of this drive also hinged on the tireless work of our committee volunteers and food pantry staff, led by Carlos Roldan. Special recognition goes to Connie Catania of St. Simon Parish, who coordinated efforts with 46 parishes, and Sharon Horvath of Hope House Food Pantry, who managed logistics, sorting, and transportation with dedication and precision.

This united effort comes at a crucial time. According to a 2024 report by the New Jersey Office of the Food Security, food insecurity in the state has worsened significantly—from 8.7% to 10.7% overall, and from 11.3% to 13.2% among children between 2018 and 2022. The Corpus Christi Food Drive is one way the Catholic Charities community continues to fight back against this growing crisis with compassion and purpose.

FATHER ENGLISH FOOD PANTRY RENOVATION NOW IN FULL SWING

The beloved Fr. English Community Center, a cornerstone of the Paterson community for decades, is undergoing an exciting transformation that will create a state-of-the-art facility designed to serve our neighbors with greater dignity and comprehensive support.

At the heart of this renovation is the complete reimagining of the Fr. English Food Pantry. The new facility will feature grocery-style aisles and modern refrigeration units, allowing clients to shop with dignity through our choice food pantry model. This approach empowers individuals and families to select foods that meet their specific dietary needs and cultural preferences.

The renovated center will offer much more than food assistance. New classroom spaces will host workshops covering essential life skills, including nutrition and healthy cooking, wellness education, English as a Second Language classes, citizenship preparation, and hands-on hydroponic farming practices.

This major capital project is made possible with the support of Bishop Kevin Sweeney, the Diocesan Ministries Appeal, and the generous and faithful donors within the Diocese of Paterson.


Since 1931, the FM Kirby Foundation has sought to make thoughtful and prudent philanthropic commitments to highly selective grantee partners.
