1. My Side of the Mountain by Jean Craighead George

Sam Gribley surprises everyone when he decides to live on his own in the Catskill Mountains. He learns about courage, independence, and the need for companionship in this gripping, inspiring, wilderness-survival adventure.

2. Cracker! The Best Dog in Vietnam by Cynthia Kadohata

A realistic story of America's war in Vietnam, using the alternating viewpoints of an army dog named Cracker and her 17-year-old handler, Rick Hanski.

3. When Friendship Followed Me Home by Paul Griffin

Ben Coffin has never felt like he fits in. A former foster kid, he keeps his head down at school to avoid bullies and takes refuge in reading sci-fi books at the library. But that changes when he finds a scruffy abandoned dog named Flip and becomes friends with the librarian's daughter, Halley.

4. One Crazy Summer by Rita Williams-Garcia

Set during one of the most tumultuous years in recent American history, one crazy summer is the heartbreaking, funny tale of three girls in search of the mother who abandoned them.

5. Hold Fast by Blue Balliett

11-year-old Early and her family don't have much in the way of physical possessions, but they are rich in love and affection for one another. Early's parents, especially her father, pass on to her a love of books and a strong faith that situations can improve if you work hard enough.

6. The Gate by Nancy Carabio Belanger

Joshua Lasko is a smart-alecky middle school boy, whose faith disappears at his father's death. He meets Pie, a nursing home resident, and his life turns around into a whopping surprise.

7. Crenshaw by Katherine Applegate

In her first novel since <u>The One and Only Ivan</u>, winner of the Newbery Medal, Katherine Applegate delivers an unforgettable and magical story about family, friendship, and resilience.

8. A Handful of Stars by Cynthia Lord

Lily, an orphaned 12-year-old who lives in a small eastern Maine town, becomes fast friends with Salma, a Latina migrant worker who has come with her family to pick blueberries. But as the Blueberry Queen pageant approaches Lily and Selma are confronted with the hard truths of prejudice and migrant life.
