Let us continue to pray for our country, for our veterans—living and deceased—and for an increase in vocations to the priesthood, permanent diaconate, and religious life this weekend and every day.

**“It takes a Village”- Vocations as a shared ministry, an excerpt from The Catholic Moment, Nov. 1, 2020**

In order to foster a culture of vocations in our parishes, we must recognize that the promotion of vocations to the priesthood, the permanent diaconate, the religious life, the dedicated single life, and marriage lies beyond merely implementing programs. Building a culture of vocations involves building a mindset in which the pursuit of the universal call to holiness is translated into a pursuit of the particular way that God is calling each person to live that holiness in her/his life. This starts in the family but must also be reinforced and supported in the greater faith community. Parishes can develop this culture among the faithful through promoting prayer, inspiring activities, education, and encouraging support.

History has proven that young people are inspired through the witness of the vocations that they encounter. It is evident that priests who faithfully and joyfully live their priesthood are integral in inspiring young men to pursue the priesthood. This is evident for the other vocations, as well. The authentic witness of men and women who know and love their vocation is inevitably attractive and desirable for young people. Through regular encounters with those who are faithfully striving to live their vocation, a young person is moved to ask her/himself, “Could that be me?” This is why parishes must foster a relational approach to vocations ministry, promoting opportunities (formal and informal) for young people to encounter and interact with men and women of any vocation (priests and religious especially) to assist them in discerning God’s call.

The phase of discernment in which a young person seeks to know the vocation that God has for her/him is unique for each discernor. Therefore, this requires individual attention in order to apply effective resources for spiritual nourishment. This attention is what we mean when we say, “pastoral accompaniment”. Discerners often get stuck asking the question, “Am I really being called to this?” Having experienced mentors who can help name the signs of a true calling is indispensable and can give that discernor the courage to take the first step to pursue that call. Each of us can take part in this accompaniment by discerning the signs in our own lives and by fostering intentional efforts to “leave no young person behind” as they discover God’s call in their lives.

There’s an old saying that “it takes a village to raise a child”. By seeing vocations as a shared ministry and by working together to apply these three basic tenets, each of us can do our part to raise up holy vocations in our parishes. In doing so, our parishes will begin to


vibrate with new life. “Many hands make light work.” Let us each lend our hands, therefore, to the ministry of vocations as we make Uniting in Heart a reality. Father Dominic Petan was ordained a priest of the diocese in 2012 and currently serves as the Vicar for Clergy, Director of Vocations and Director of the Permanent Diaconate.


**Artificial Intelligence**

**GOSPEL REFLECTIONS:**  
**WIS 6:12-16; PS 63:2-8; 1 THES 4:13-18 OR 4:13-14; MT 25:1-13**

Wisdom is a central theme in our readings today. It is one of the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit, key to living the stewardship way of life in our complex world. As Christian stewards, we should rely on this gift and ask the Holy Spirit to increase it within us.



Jesus teaches the importance of wisdom in our Gospel passage from Matthew. He tells the parable of ten virgins awaiting the arrival of the bridegroom who will welcome them in to the wedding feast. Five of the virgins were foolish and five were wise. The foolish virgins failed to bring oil along with their lamps when they went to meet the bridegroom. The wise ones, however, had prepared and brought sufficient oil to keep their lamps lit when the bridegroom came. The foolish virgins, caught off guard, ran off to buy more oil, but they were too late. The door to the wedding feast was locked to them. Jesus cautions, “Therefore, stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour.” The stewardship way of life — with its daily and weekly commitments to giving God the best of our Time, Talents and Treasure — is the “oil” that we keep with us at all times. When we have this plan in place and we rely deeply on the Holy Spirit to guide us through the twists and turns of each day, we are free, we are ready to answer the Bridegroom when He calls us. We live in wisdom.
