The use of Low-Gluten Hosts

On June 15, 2017 Robert Cardinal Sarah, the Prefect of the *Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments* in Rome issued an instruction on the bread and wine to be used for the celebration of the Mass.

A few parishioners must use the *low-gluten* hosts in order to receive Holy Communion. The practice established and to be followed in Visitation Church is as follows:

- ◆ If because of health reasons (i.e. the specific medical diagnosis of wheat allergies/intolerance) a person cannot receive the usual hosts used at mass, they should contact the Rectory and make the condition known to our priests.
- A pyx (gold container and pouch) used to hold the host will be provided by the parish.
- ◆ <u>Low-Gluten Hosts</u> *MUST* be obtained by the parishioner, requesting the use of the host, from one of the ecclesiastically approved U.S. providers:

*Please be aware that all "low-gluten" hosts contain a small amount of gluten. You should consult your doctor before they are used.

- Once the Low-Gluten Hosts and pyx are obtained, the communicant is to prepare the pyx with one host and bring the pyx to church when coming to mass. Bring the unconsecrated host (pyx and all) into the sacristy, giving it to the Sacristan or one of the priests/deacons, BEFORE MASS BEGINS. Once the mass has begun it is no longer possible to accommodate the request for the use of the host in your pyx. We will not interrupt the celebration of the mass to place the pyx on the altar.
- At Communion time, those receiving Communion using the low-gluten host are to present themselves for the reception of communion in line with the rest of the congregation. They are to go to the priest/celebrant of the mass and before the priest offers the usual greeting, simply say, "pyx please" and Father will know you are to receive the low-gluten host. He will hand you the entire pyx and host with the greeting, The Body of Christ... the priest preparing/touching the actual host, after handling the usual hosts can produce the same hazards as receiving the regular host. And so, he will give you the entire pyx, with the host contained. Step to the side, open/receive the host. When you get

home, carefully rinse the pyx with water and drink the water you put in the pyx. Then, dry using a clean towel. Bring the host in the pyx each time you come to mass and plan on receiving holy communion.



Charity and Kindness

Concepts like charity, tolerance and kindness have become rather muddled today. Kindness, for example, is an aspect of love (charity), but so is rebuke. Tolerance, as well, is a feature of love, but so is insisting on what is right. Sadly, though, many today reduce love to mere kindness and mere tolerance. For too many, love means, "You will approve of everything I do and never rebuke me, and if you do rebuke me, it is hate and intolerance." This is a sad reduction of love and Christian charity. Love is rooted in the truth and seeks the true good of the other. Sin and error may seem appealing to a person, but one who loves them properly will seek to turn them from false or apparent goods to the actual good. This is because we care for the state of their soul. Love apart from the truth really isn't love; it is soft and pandering, and it does not contribute to but hinders the person's final end. True love wants to see everyone in heaven one day.



Confessions at Visitation Parish

The Sacrament of Penance [Confession] is available in our church each week. Additionally, should you need a priest outside of the scheduled times for Confession, please call the Rectory Office and arrange to meet one of the priests so that you can make a good confession of your sin.

Bowing or Genuflecting?...

One action particular to us as Catholics is the *genuflection*. The word comes from the Latin... carrying the meaning to kiss the floor. When we genuflect, on the right knee, our knee is to bend and momentarily touch or "kiss" the floor in an act of reverence and adoration for the Blessed Sacrament. A genuflection is made toward the Tabernacle, which of course houses the Eucharist – the Real Presence of Jesus Christ: Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of God Himself, present in the Blessed Sacrament, always in our church.

A bow of the head is reserved for sacred objects and persons. A bow of the head is not the same as a genuflection, and the two gestures are ordinarily not interchangeable. Bowing of the head shows respect, genuflection shows profound respect, love, and adoration. Most especially in the Church a head bow is made before the Altar of Sacrifice, a symbol of Christ Himself. Mistakenly, some people use these distinct gestures as interchangeable, to replace the genuflection due to the Blessed Sacrament, with a head bow; perhaps out of a simple lack of knowledge or piety, "because it's easier to bow than genuflect," a misinformed sense of "renewal," or out of a lack of understanding in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist.

We should be eager to show and renew our belief in the real presence of Jesus, present in the Blessed Sacrament. Christ is truly present, body and blood, soul and divinity, in the Eucharist. If we really believe, then let our actions and attitude reflect that belief when we come into His presence. Show proper respect and reverence for the house of God, remind others who forget, and teach your children to do the same. All of us need to be models of our faith in Christ, present in the Eucharist. The presence of the Eucharist makes the church a sacred place. Loud talking and visiting, food and drink, cell phone use is all out of place at all times in the church: It is the House of God. Let *zeal for His house consume* us!

The proper reverence for Catholics to show the Eucharist, either exposed on the altar for adoration in the monstrance, or reserved in the Tabernacle of the Church, is a genuflection on the right knee. When entering your pew, or passing in front of the Blessed Sacrament, or entering and leaving the sanctuary, a genuflection is to be made. It is in this single act that we show our love, reverence, humility, gratitude, respect, and our awe for this wonderful Sacrament ~ the gift of Jesus Christ Himself.

For good reason, perhaps with the passage of years, or infirmity, a genuflection is *physically impossible*. If truly prevented from genuflecting by age or infirmity, then simply make a profound bow of the head. You'll notice that when servers and others are carrying the sacred vessels and items used for the celebration of the Mass [preparing or cleaning up for the mass], they also bow their heads, since genuflecting may cause them to drop and damage the sacred vessels [thus, the head bow being a matter of necessity].

During the celebration of the Mass, things are somewhat different; a genuflection is made at the beginning and

end of the Mass, at the consecrations, by the priest before Communion, and at the Tabernacle during Communion. Otherwise, you'll notice that the head is bowed as a sign of reverence to the altar [a symbol of Christ]. Likewise, times when the priest and deacon bow, genuflect, sit, and stand will differ from the posture the congregation is taking at times during the mass. All this regulated by Church law.

- 4. meditate for 15 minutes on the mysteries of the Rosary

Why five? The five first Saturdays of reparation were requested by Mary to atone for the ways people offend the Immaculate Heart of Mary:

- 1. attacks against her Immaculate Conception
- 2. attacks against her Perpetual Virginity
- 3. attacks against her Divine Maternity and the refusal to accept her as the Mother of all mankind
- 4. for those who try publicly to implant in children's hearts indifference, contempt and even hatred of this Immaculate Mother, and
- 5. for those who insult her directly in her sacred images

OUR LADY'S GREAT PROMISE

The Blessed Virgin assures us that this devotion plays a significant part in her promise of the ultimate triumph of her Immaculate Heart. Additionally, the Blessed Mother promises to assist at the hour of death, with the graces

necessary for salvation, all those who complete this devotion.

On Saturday, October 1, after the 8:15am Mass there will be a rite of investiture in the Brown Scapular just prior to the start of the First Saturday devotion. The scapular can be worn by young and old alike. At Fatima, Our Lady requested the wearing of the Scapular of Mt. Carmel (the brown scapular) as the sign of our consecration to Mary.
