






Weekday Mass at St. Edward's


Easter Flowers

VOCATIONIST'S CORNER

PRAY FOR VOCATIONS TO THE PRIESTHOOD.

Fr. Charles Davignon Biography



Fr. Davignon was ordained with four other men at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception on April 7, 1956 by Bishop Edward Ryan. Fr. Charles and Msgr. Roland Rivard of Winooski are the only two priests still living.

Father Davignon was born in East Albany, VT and attended St. Thomas Seminary in Bloomfield, CT, and the Seminary of Philosophy and the Grand Seminary in Montreal. He also studied at St. Michael's College in Colchester and The Catholic University of America in Washington DC. He served parishes in Essex Junction, Richford, Sheldon Springs, Montpelier, White River Junction, South Burlington, Newport, Stowe, Middlebury, Woodstock, Killington and Winooski. Fr. Davignon also served in Burlington as chaplain at the Bishop deGoesbriand Hospital and Mt. St. Mary Convent.

Father Davignon ministered in South America and served with the Maryknoll Fathers as well as on the Justice and Peace Committee in Washington, D.C. He was the director of the Office of Communications for the Diocese of Burlington, dean of the South Burlington Deanery and host of the diocesan television ministry. Father Davignon said the best part of his priestly ministry is "the mission vision", that is "the ethical part of my ministry that requires me to share it with the rest of the world." He added that the mission vision is the "essence" of his priesthood. Times have changed since he was a missionary in South America; now priests from other continents come to serve the Church in Vermont. "We've become mission territory," Father Davignon said.

He welcomes priests from other parts of the world. "They are a reminder to all of us that we belong to a missionary Church," he said. "They can come to us and we can go to them. The missionary vision is cosmic and international."

"I had no idea I'd be around 65 years later!" Fr. Davignon remarked with a laugh during a recent phone interview.
