M-W-F or W-F or	)Mass at	(Church) at	time.	

When we have written down our chosen practices, then each evening before going to bed we can check up on ourselves on whether we accomplished what we said we were going to do. If so, thank the Lord. If not, express sorry for missing out, and promise the Lord you will try to do better tomorrow.

One area that we might like to look at and work on during this Lenten Season is our example. What example are we showing in the living of our Christian life? Are we trying to give the very best example

and serve as models for our children and grandchildren? Are there areas where we give bad example?

Jesus has a special love for the children He entrusts to our care. In Matt 18:6 and he warns us of the gravity of putting stumbling blocks before children: "If any of you put a stumbling block before one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better for you if a great millstone were fastened around your neck and you were drowned in the depth of the sea."

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

# St. Gianna Beretta Molla:

# Wife, Mother, Doctor, Lover of Life

Gianna Beretta Molla was born in Magenta (Milan), Italy, on October 4, 1922, the tenth of 13 children. From her earliest youth, Gianna accepted the gift of faith and received an excellent Christian education from her parents. After earning degrees in medicine and surgery from the University of Pavia in 1949, she opened a medical clinic in Mesero, near Magenta, in 1950. She specialized in pediatrics at the University of Milan in 1952 and thereafter gave special attention to mothers, babies, the elderly and the poor.

On September 24, 1955, Gianna married Pietro Molla in St. Martin's Basilica in Magenta. Together, they would have four children: Pierluigi, Mariolina, Laura and Gianna Emanuela. Gianna met the demands of mother, wife, doctor with simplicity and balance. Gianna loved culture, fashion and beauty. She played piano, painted, enjoyed tennis, mountain climbing and skiing. She attended the symphony, theatre and opera in Milan. She also loved to travel.

In September 1961, toward the end of the second month of pregnancy with her fourth child, Gianna had to make a heroic decision. Physicians diagnosed a serious fibroma in the uterus that required surgery. The surgeon suggested that Gianna undergo an abortion in order to save her life. A few days before the child was due, she was ready to give her life in order to save that of her child: "If you must decide between me and the child, do not hesitate: choose the child – I insist on it. Save the baby."

On the morning of April 21, 1962, her daughter Gianna Emanuela was born. Despite efforts to

save them both, on the morning of April 28, amid unspeakable pain and after repeated exclamations of "Jesus, I love you," Gianna died. She was 39 years old.

Her husband, Pietro, has described Gianna's life as "an act and a perennial action of faith and charity; it was a non-stop search for the will of God for every decision and for every work, with prayer and meditation, Holy Mass and the Eucharist."

The story of this remarkable woman spread quickly throughout the world. On April 24, 1994, during the International Year of the Family, Pope John Paul II beatified Gianna Beretta Molla. The Holy Father said her witness was a hymn to life.

Ten years later, on May 16, 2004, the same Holy Father canonized Gianna Beretta Molla, offering this new lay saint to the Church as a model of virtue, holiness, motherhood, professionalism and devotion.

In an age when marriage, family life, virtue and holiness are under assault, the life of Gianna Beretta Molla is a striking witness of hope and beauty. St. Gianna Molla's life and final decision were heroic. She reminds the Church and the world of the necessity of a consistent ethic of life from the earliest moments to the final moments of human life.

In the words of St. Gianna's friend, Piera Fontana: "Fifty years ago, before Gianna, how was it possible that only nuns, priests and friars were raised to the altar?

Why were we never raised to the altar? Gianna was raised to the altar. She represents all mothers... A mother has finally arrived."

# The Freshman Merd

One day, when I was a freshman in high school, I saw a kid from my class walking home from school. His name was Kyle. It looked like he was carrying all his books. I thought to myself, 'Why would anyone bring home all his books on a Friday? He must really be a nerd.'

I had quite a weekend planned (parties and a football game with my friends tomorrow afternoon), so I shrugged my shoulders and went on. As I was walking, I saw a bunch of kids running toward him. They ran at him, knocking all his books out of his arms and tripping him so he landed in the dirt. His glasses went flying, and I saw them land in the grass about ten feet from him. He looked up and I saw this terrible sadness in his eyes.

My heart went out to him. So, I jogged over to him as he crawled around looking for his glasses, and I saw a tear in his eye.

As I handed him his glasses, I said, 'Those guys are jerks.' They really should get lives.

'He looked at me and said, 'Hey thanks!' There was a big smile on his face. It was one of those smiles that showed real gratitude.

I helped him pick up his books and asked him where he lived. As it turned out, he lived near me, so I asked him why I had never seen him before. He said he had gone to private school before now. I would have never hung out with a private school kid before. We talked all the way home, and I carried some of his books.

He turned out to be a pretty cool kid. I asked him if he wanted to play a little football with my friends. He said yes. We hung out all weekend and the more I got to know Kyle, the more I liked him, and my friends thought the same of him.

Monday morning came, and there was Kyle with the huge stack of books again. I stopped him and said, 'Boy, you are really going to build some serious muscles with this pile of books every day!' He just laughed and handed me half the books.

Over the next four years, Kyle and I became best friends. When we were seniors we began to think about college. Kyle decided on Georgetown and I was going to Duke. I knew that we would always be friends, that the miles would never be a problem. He was going to be a doctor and I was going for business on a football scholarship.

# Suicide and...

Kyle was valedictorian of our class. I teased him all the time about being a nerd. He had to prepare a speech for graduation. I was so glad it wasn't me having to get up there and speak. Graduation day, I saw Kyle.

He looked great. He was one of those guys that really found himself during high school.

He filled out and did look good in glasses. He had more dates than I had, and all the girls loved him. Boy, sometimes I was jealous! Today was one of those days.

I could see that he was nervous about his speech. So, I smacked him on the back and said, 'Hey, big guy, you'll be great!' He looked at me with one of those looks (the really grateful one) and smiled.... 'Thanks,' he said.

As he started his speech, he cleared his throat, and began... 'Graduation is a time to thank those who helped you make it through those tough years. Your parents, your teachers, your siblings, maybe a coach...but mostly your friends....

I am here to tell all of you that being a friend to someone is the best gift you can give them.

I am going to tell you a story.' I just looked at my friend with disbelief as he told the first day we met. He had planned to kill himself over the weekend. He talked of how he had cleaned out his locker so his Mom wouldn't have to do it later and was carrying his stuff home. He looked hard at me and gave me a little smile.

'Thankfully, I was saved. My friend saved me from doing the unspeakable.' I heard the gasp go through the crowd as this handsome, popular boy told us all about his weakest moment. I saw his Mom and Dad looking at me and smiling that same grateful smile. Not until that moment did, I realize it's depth.

Never underestimate the power of your actions. With one small gesture you can change a person's life. For better or for worse. God puts us all in each other's lives to impact one another in some way. Look for God in others.


