Arrangements must be made at least six months, preferably a year, in advance of the desired date. A marriage preparation program is required.



Living in the Spirit



This week the readings seem to echo the sentiments of how fleeting life can be. We hear from Ecclesiastes, "...let your heart be glad in the days of your youth. Follow the ways of your heart, the vision of your eyes." However, I think we can all agree that the vision before our children's eyes is not something that we want to leave to the evening News, Social Media or yet another fame-seeking YouTuber. So, what *is* the vision and who helps our young people to see it?

Like many of you, my son has been learning from home these past few weeks. I have had the opportunity to engage with his learning in a whole new way. I have even been able to offer a faith perspective to the historical issues they are studying. In years past, when I would ask my son, "What did you learn today?" I would get the infamous reply, "Nothing!" This year I not only know what he is learning, but I am able to build on it and engage him with it.

Yet even with my best intentions, my son blurted out, "Mom, what is the point of all of this? There is discrimination and war and politics and pandemics! What kind of future am I going to inherit anyway? What is the point of trying to be good?"

For our young people, this is probably a common question. The fact is, there are too many visions of gloom and doom surrounding them. If we forget to present the goodness and mercy of God with as much zeal as we do a sporting event, new movies or video game; what vision can they really be expected to have?

Last week was Catechetical Sunday. To be a Catechist in the best of times is laudable in and of itself. But to choose to be a Catechist in the days of pandemic, constant change and turmoil is nothing less than heroic. I applaud those Catechists, assistants, volunteers, and supporters of our Faith Formation community! I applaud those parents who have made Faith Formation a priority even in the times of uncertainty! Because collectively, we are saying that we want to pass on the vision we have inherited. We want our kids to have a deeper and more meaningful relationship with Christ than with anything the world might have to offer.

Our Catechists are here for support and to guide our families through this faith formation year. Our parishes are committed to presenting the truths of sacred scripture and sacramental love. We are here to support the vision that we want our children to have because it is getting harder and harder to find it anywhere else. This vision is not any less real when we learn it remotely. God has been working with humans through distance learning long before now!

Catholics Care. Catholics Vote. Participate in political life.

In their statement on *Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship*, the U.S. Catholic bishops remind Catholics, "We are called to bring together our principles and our political choices, our values and our votes, to help build a better world" (no. 14).

In New York State, the voter registration deadline for the November 3 election is October 9. You can pick up a mail-in voter registration form at your county Board of Election or onlinevoterreg.dmv.ny.gov/motorvoter. New York State allows early voting from October 24 through November 1. Contact your county Board of Election to apply for a *mail-in ballot* allowed for anyone concerned about COVID-19.
