Living in the Spirit




Symbols can be very powerful. They can point toward different realities, offer means of perception and understanding. They can trigger deep emotions and memories. Last week I walked into a public building and there, off to one side, was an older veteran sitting by a table giving away artificial poppy flowers for a donation. Instantly I knew that Memorial Day was right around the corner. Perhaps, like for so many others. the poppy brings an influx of thoughts and memories: about the many who lost their lives in various battles and wars, of families torn apart, of cities and homes destroyed, of family members lost. It also brings thoughts of courage, strength, honor and hopes for a better and a more peaceful world. That little flower is a powerful symbol.

It is said that in war-torn battlefields the red poppy was one of the first plants to grow. The seeds from the poppy sit dormant in the ground and only germinate when the ground is disturbed as it is during a war. The origin of the red poppy as a modern-day symbol was the idea of an American woman, Moina Michael, who, in 1918, was inspired by a 1915 poem written by the Canadian soldier John McCrae, *In Flanders Field*. He spoke of those who have died, and she was inspired to find a way that they would never be forgotten.

Michael's idea and inspiration reached across oceans and nations. To this day I remember my father sharing stories of WWII, of where he was and places he saw. I was a child when I first heard them. I don't remember all the details - today I wish I could ask him more questions. But even though I'm not clear about all the details of his military days I remember some of the stories and I remember the songs he and his friends would sing when they came together. One particular song always comes to mind when I see the poppy. My dad was in Italy in 1944 just as the Allies were advancing toward Monte Casino. On the eve of the final battle two Polish soldiers composed the song of the red poppies growing on the hills heading up toward the torn monastery at the top. The lyrics speak of the fallen as they went up the hill and those whose red blood on the ground match the color of the poppies. A little flower, a powerful symbol bringing forth so many memories, so many connections.

Perhaps that is the reason why the church has used symbols so extensively. Perhaps that is why the telling of the stories of faith, of singing songs and hymns becomes so important to help us remember, to unite us as a community of faith, to stir our hearts and fill us with courage and hope to face another day, together with the God who is always with us. Today, on this Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, I was reflecting about the various symbols preachers and teachers have used to explain and give meaning to the God who is One in three Persons – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. What hymns stir your heart about the God who is three in One? What symbols do you associate with this belief? How is the God of Love revealed in the Love of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit?

May this weekend stir your memories and fill your hearts with Love. Peace and blessings, Margaret

We hear today the closing words in the Gospel of Matthew — Jesus' final commissioning of the disciples to evangelize and baptize in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. What insights to the nature of God does this divine relationship offer?
