By appointment only. Call the office to schedule.

Sacrament of Matrimony

Arrangements must be made at least six months, preferably a year, in advance of the desired date. A marriage preparation program is required.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick

This Sacrament is available for individuals upon request and communal celebrations are periodically scheduled.



Living in the Spirit



Driving along in our city and various towns one encounters various signs that call for, "Help Wanted," or "Now Hiring." Workers are in high demand everywhere. According to the US Bureau of Labor Statistics, at the end of June, there were 10.1 million job openings in the United States. Most will agree that the pandemic has exacerbated this issue. Recently, I've been thinking a lot about work from the perspective of an employer and an employee and the very concept and value of work itself.

There have been numerous speculations for the reasons of this high level of job openings. Some are saying that the enhanced unemployment benefits, along with the stimulus checks and other government aid programs are making it attractive for workers to remain on the sidelines. Some are just looking for higher pay. Older workers during this pandemic reevaluated their options and decided to take early retirement. Parents on the other hand, have found it hard to juggle job, provide daycare and home school their children all at the same time. In choosing between working or searching for a job and taking care of their children, some parents have opted out of the job market. Added to this is, of course, the fear of contracting COVID-19. It is also amazing to see how employers during this time have become quite creative in attracting workers. Besides offering higher pay, some offer signing bonuses, hybrid schedules, flexible hours, childcare, a stipend for childcare, or at least emergency childcare.

Besides all these objective elements concerning work and labor there is a deeper aspect that must be addressed. Recently, I've been reading a book by Carolyn Humphreys, OCDS, OTR. In her writing she speaks about Carmelite spirituality and their approach to God through self-knowledge and contemplative prayer. Surprisingly however, she has a section dedicated to labor. In that section she reminds the reader of the words of Pope John Paul II who once said that work is a blessing from God. God created men and women to transform and rule the earth so that God's work of creation may continue with their intelligence and effort. In essence she points out, "through our labor we try to produce something good and useful, or contribute something worthwhile, for ourselves and others. Our work is a way we connect with the world. We can create, help others, and put our knowledge and skill to good use. Work gives meaning and coherence to our lives. As long as it is for the betterment of humanity, it does not matter what we do, but how we do it. We do the best we can within the circumstances that shape our lives. Good work is God's love made visible, and one of the channels by which we learn and grow."

God has entrusted the world to us so that we might continue to co-create through our love, care wisdom and labor. Every person, every type of work is important and of value. Perhaps the ideal would be to find something that we love to do, that seizes our imagination, that God has given us the skills and capacity to do and then do it with all our love and passion. Then work would not seem like work but a joy and a blessing from God for us and for others.

Readings for the Twenty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time

1st Reading Jos 24:1-2a, 15-17, 18b

Joshua gathered together all the tribes of Israel at Shechem, summoning their elders, their leaders, their judges, and their officers. When they stood in ranks before God, Joshua addressed all the people: "If it does not please you to serve the LORD, decide today whom you will serve, the gods your fathers served beyond the River or the gods of the Amorites in whose country you are now dwelling. As for me and my household, we will serve the LORD." But the people answered,

"Far be it from us to forsake the LORD for the service of other gods.

For it was the LORD, our God, who brought us and our fathers up out of the land of Egypt, out of a state of slavery. He performed those great miracles before our very eyes and protected us along our entire journey and among the peoples through whom we passed.

Therefore we also will serve the LORD, for he is our God." The Word of the Lord

Brothers and sisters: Be subordinate to one another out of reverence for Christ.

As the church is subordinate to Christ, so wives should be subordinate to their husbands in everything.

Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ loved the church

and handed himself over for her to sanctify her, cleansing her by the bath of water with the word, that he might present to himself the church in splendor, without spot or wrinkle or any such thing, that she might be holy and without blemish. So also husbands should love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. For no one hates his own flesh but rather nourishes and cherishes it, even as Christ does the church, because we are members of his body.

For this reason a man shall leave his father and his mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh.
