Living in the Spirit



As we age, time seems to fly past more and more quickly and days have a way of turning into years in the blink of an eye. With that preamble clearly in mind, I was stunned recently to learn that Bishop Matano will turn 75 on September 15. It was only "yesterday" that he was named the ninth Bishop of Rochester by Pope Francis on November 6, 2013, not yet eight years ago. By the law of the Church, however, he must now submit his resignation. As canon 401 puts it: "A diocesan bishop who has completed the seventy-fifth year of age is requested to present his resignation from office to the Supreme Pontiff, who will make provision after he has examined all the circumstances." Normally, that resignation receives a quick written response, accepting the resignation "nunc pro tunc," that is, it is accepted "now" though it will be fully implemented "then," at some later date when a successor will be named.

Until the Second Vatican Council, bishops did not ordinarily resign but the council fathers expressed the opinion that "the pastoral office of bishops is so important and onerous, diocesan bishops...are earnestly requested to resign from their office if on account of advanced age or from any other grave cause they become less able to carry out their duties." [CD 21] In implementing various aspects of the Council's teaching, in June 1966 Pope Paul VI issued an apostolic letter "Ecclesiae Sanctae" which, among other things, fixed the retirement age for diocesan bishops at 75.

On September 15, 2021, then, the selection of the 10th Bishop of Rochester will begin. The Holy See will not begin with a blank slate, however. About every 3 years, each diocesan bishop submits a list of 3 names "of presbyters whom he considers worthy of and suited to the episcopal function" to the bishops of his province [in our case to Cardinal Dolan and the bishops of New York State]. These names are discussed together in a confidential way and an annotated list is prepared and sent to the Pope's representative, the Papal Nuncio in Washington [Archbishop Christophe Pierre], "without prejudice to the right of each bishop individually to make known to the Apostolic See" his personal recommendations. [C 377 §2]

When a vacancy exists in a diocese, either because of the transfer, resignation or retirement of a diocesan bishop, the Papal Nuncio is charged with preparing a list of 3 names to be sent to Rome for consideration. He arrives at that list from the names previously submitted by the bishops of that particular province, the current suggestions of the metropolitan archbishop [Cardinal Dolan], the suggestions of the president of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops [Archbishop Gomes] and his own suggestions. When he has narrowed down the list, he begins to consult confidentially with some priests from the candidate's home diocese (consultors, presbyteral council members, chancery officials) and "if he judges it expedient, is also to seek individually and in secret the opinion of others from both the secular and-non-secular clergy and from laity outstanding in wisdom." [C 377 §3]

When the Nuncio thus consults a bishop, priest or lay person, he usually sends the individual a questionnaire in a double envelope, the outer envelope with the address and the inner envelope continued on page 3

with a warning that the consultation must be kept perpetually secret "under pain of excommunication," lest the process admit politicking or corruption. What the Nuncio is earnestly seeking is a priest "outstanding is solid faith, good morals, piety, zeal for souls, wisdom, prudence, and human virtues, and endowed with other qualities which make him suitable to fulfill the office in question." [C 379 §1]


At this point, the Nuncio submits his ternus, his list of 3 names, to the Holy See, in the order of his preference. In Rome that list of candidates is prepared to be vetted by the 30 Cardinals appointed by the Pope to the Congregation of Bishops. Two Americans now sit on that Congregation: Cardinal Blasé Cupich of Chicago and Cardinal Joseph Tobin of Newark. While the Congregation meets every two weeks, the Americans usually attend only when an English-speaking bishop is being considered. The Congregation's recommendations, including any doubts, questions or minority opinions, are then sent to the Pope, who usually approves the Congregation's decision after considering them for several days. The Congregation then notifies the Nuncio, who telephones the candidate, asking whether he will accept the Pope's appointment. If he says "no," the process starts all over again.


In any event, Bishop Matano deserves our thanks and prayers as he completes his fruitful ministry among us. While he waits for the announcement of his successor, he knows that sometimes that announcement comes quickly but more often there is a long delay lasting from 6 months to a year or more. In the meantime, may his heart rest in peace knowing that he has served us well. Peace to all,
