Living in the Spirit



One of the commentators for this weekend's readings recalls a story in the autobiography of the music legend Ray Charles. Charles tells the story of Ma Beck: "I wasn't quite 15 when my mama died. That was the most devastating thing in my whole experience—bar nothing, period. I couldn't get the sorrow out of my system Ma Beck saw the trauma I was going through. So, she took me aside and said, 'Son, you know that I knew your mama. And I know she always taught you to carry on. . . . Didn't she tell you that?' "I said, 'Yes ma'am' and started to tear up.

And Ma Beck kept after me. 'Well, then, you also know that your mama didn't want you going around just doing nothing and feeling sorry for yourself, 'cause that's not the way she brought you up. Isn't that right?' . . . That episode with Ma Beck shook me out of my depression. It really started me on my way. After that I told myself that I must do what my mom would have expected me to do."

During the Last Supper, Jesus made known to his disciples that he would be with them for only a little while longer, and so he gave them a new commandment: "love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another." Just like Ray Charles' mama, Jesus didn't want his disciples "going around just doing nothing." Through his words and actions, he taught them and showed them what he expected.

Just as in the past, so today, Jesus expects his disciples to "carry on," to love as he loved, and "to do this, in remembrance of me." How do we accomplish this great commandment?

First, through study of scripture and tradition, we learn about the life and teachings of Jesus. Through prayer we draw closer and form a deep relationship with him.

Secondly, we learn to love as he loved. On this topic a well-known commentator, William Barclay, offers some insights that may be helpful. Barclay states that Jesus loved selflessly. Not thinking of what we can get out of a particular relationship, but to give all we have for those we love is to love selflessly; by loving sacrificially: Jesus was willing to die on the cross rather than abandon his love for us. The question is, are we willing to do the same for others? Jesus loved understandingly: He knew the strengths and weaknesses of his disciples because he spent time with them. He accepted them as they were and who they were. To love as Jesus loved is to see the beauty and wonder of each person, to know of their faults but to love them anyway. Jesus loved forgivingly. His disciples often misunderstood him, were slow to learn, and abandoned him in his hour of need – but he forgave them. Like Jesus' love ours must be built on forgiveness or it will shrivel and die. Loving as Jesus loved and loves doesn't make life easier, it makes life worth living for us and for others.

Thirdly, in the Gospel of John, Jesus washed the feet of the disciples and said, "I have given you a model to follow, ... as I have done for you, you should also do." (13: 15) By his action, Jesus calls us to be servants of one another.

Finally, at the Last Supper, Jesus took bread, blessed and continued on page 3

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broke it and gave it to his disciples. Then he took the cup, gave thanks and shared it with his disciples. The Gospel of Luke states very clearly, we are to "do this" in memory of Jesus. The Eucharist is a way for us to "carry on." It is part of what Jesus expects of us. It should be central in our Christian life. Perhaps that is one reason why the USCCB has initiated the National Eucharistic Revival. It will begin on the Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ and will extend until June of 2025. Answering God's Call: Becoming Catholic

God has placed within each human heart, the desire to come to know, love, and serve God. Roman Catholics have responded to this divine call by embracing the Catholic faith. For us, to be all that God created us to be means that we live a life of faith based on the Gospels and we do so as members of the Catholic Church. There are others, as their lives unfold, that begin to wonder if God is not calling them to come to know God through the Catholic faith. The Church calls these people "Seekers" or "Inquirers" and has established a

process by which they may discern if God is calling them to be Catholic. This process is named the R.C.I.A. (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). It is a journey that involves learning about Catholicism and the community of faith they wish to join. Members of the community of faith or parish have an important role in accompanying these Seekers on this journey. Parishioners are asked to pray for them, to role model what it means to be a Catholic disciple of Christ, and to take an active role (when possible) in the process by attending sessions and volunteering to help the Seekers discuss the readings/Gospel from our Sunday liturgy during our Dismissal Rites.

The R.C.I.A. process is for anyone who is

- baptized in the Catholic Church, but may not have made First Communion or been Confirmed;
- baptized in another Christian Church, but now desires to become a member of our faith community;
- someone who has not been baptized.

Please pray about whether you are being nudged to explore the Catholic Faith or to invite someone to consider this process. You might even be called to take an active role in helping prepare those who come forward as Seekers. If this sounds like something you may want to be involved in or if you have any questions, please contact Mary Ann Obark at Maryann.Obark@dor.org or 585-490-0389.
