# Living in the Spirit



Perhaps it is quite natural to reflect on the past when moving forward toward a new beginning. Lately, I find myself reminiscing about the stirring of my heart toward ministry which began a long time ago. It followed a pattern that is recognized in the lives of so many others: that nudging, like a soft quiet whisper that will not let go and one that can so easily be stifled by the noise of everyday life. But in the midst of silence and solitude the whisper can become an overwhelming voice that cannot, that will not, be denied. Through prayer, meditation, and reflection on Scripture, God's word that has resonated throughout the centuries became for me ever clearer: "Be still and know that I am God" (Ps. 46:10), "Call to me, and I will answer you; I will tell you things great beyond reach of your knowledge" (Jer. 33:3), "Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find, knock and the door will be opened" (Mat. 7:7), "Take up your cross" (Lk. 9: 23), "Come follow me" (Lk. 18:22), "be holy for I am holy" (Lev. 11:44), "be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Mat. 5:48).

For the longest time the universal call to holiness was often perceived by the average person to be meant for someone "special", a priest, a religious, a uniquely pious individual, someone other than oneself living an ordinary life. But the call to holiness is meant for us all. The reality of this struck me in a course on Thomas Merton at Nazareth College very early in my formation. I wrote a paper (which was recently returned to me by my professor at the time), quoting Merton who said, "Holiness is not and never has been a mere escape from responsibility and from participation in the fundamental task of men to live justly and productively in community with his fellow men... Christian holiness in our age (perhaps in any age) means more than ever the awareness of our common responsibility to cooperate with the mysterious design of God for the human race" (Loving and Living, p.10). This call to be holy signified for me that there is only one vocation: whether we live in a cloister or in the world, whether we are married or single, we are called to a deep interior life, even to mystical prayer, and to pass the fruits of our contemplation and relationship with God to others, in the faith community and in the world. And if we cannot do so by word we must do so by example.

I am intrigued that years ago I grappled with the notion of holiness and that these days, as the Book Group reads and explores the documents of Vatican II, specifically *Lumen Gentium*, I once again find myself reflecting on holiness. But this time through the words of the Council Fathers who boldly proclaimed, "all the faithful of Christ are invited to strive for holiness and perfection" (#42). All the faithful of "whatever rank or status, are called to the fullness of Christian life and to the perfection of charity; by this holiness as such a more human manner of living is promoted in this earthly society" (#40). All "must follow in His footsteps and conform themselves to His image...

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In this way the holiness of the People of God will grow into an abundant harvest" (#40).

What a glorious call! Baptized into Christ Jesus, we become sharers in the divine nature. Today, in the words of St. Paul, I urge you, "to live in a manner worthy of the call you have received, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another through love, striving to preserve the unity of the spirit through the bond of peace: one body and one Spirit... one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all (Eph. 4:1-6).

Reflect: How might I understand another's perspective while rooting my own perspectives in Catholic social teaching principles of love for others, common good, option for the poor and vulnerable, and dignity of the human person?

# **Baby Shower Update**

Thanks to all who donated to the Baby Shower collection. The volume and array of baby clothes, supplies and diapers was impressive! As volunteers carried in bags and boxes of donations, the director of Birthright remarked that it looked like there was enough clothing and diapers to cover every baby in Rochester. This annual Baby Shower collection, held during the Right to Life month of October, helps support the good works of two Rochester agencies whose focus is helping women with unplanned pregnancies. With compassion, care and understanding, they work to assure the mother that there is hope and help with the challenges they may face by providing information and referrals for legal, financial and other needs.
