

Living in the Spirit



I remember pulling up behind a car at a traffic light one day and doing that creeping forward thing so I could read the whole bumper sticker. "GOD LOVES EVERYONE" it declared in big bold letters. As I inched closer though, I could make out the fine print, "but I'm his favorite." I laughed out loud in the moment, but it does seem sometimes that we're in a contest. Somehow it's not enough to be loved unconditionally and infinitely, we also want to be loved the best. Some Christian churches have even developed a misguided theology around the idea, that God will love you more (and consequently "bless" you with wealth and success) if you pray at the right church and, most importantly, pay tithes to the right preacher. Our readings this weekend though remind us that the ways of the world are not God's ways. The powerful, proud, celebrated, and successful—the ones who seem to be blessed in the eyes of the world—are not necessarily the favorites.

It appears as the opposite of blessed-ness doesn't it? To be meek, persecuted, or mourning doesn't seem to be cause for rejoicing. But the beatitudes are a guide to living lives of love, service, selflessness, and holiness. We participate in making God's kingdom come about whenever we live the beatitudes. Also, none of us should make the mistake of thinking that because we are struggling, that God loves us any less. Today's readings tell us that the ones that the world rejects--the captive, the stranger--are the ones that God is close to (and so should we be.) And the ones that the world thinks are naïve--the merciful, the peacemaker--they are the ones who are getting it right. Next week's reading from the same section of Matthew's Gospel will remind us that we are the light of the world.

Fr. Hart will say more next week about the legacy of Bishop Matthew Clark. But since I have this space this week I will say what a gift he has been in my life and ministry, and I know that's true for countless others. His leadership and support in interfaith efforts, lay ministry, and women's leadership have continued--even after his retirement--to help our diocese. I could (and probably will at some point soon) go on for a while about his amazing connection to young people. For now I will just say I always felt blessed that he was our Bishop. He walked with and among his people.

LIVE THE EUCHARIST

"Transubstantiation" is defined by the Catechism as "the change of the whole substance of bread into the substance of the Body of Christ and of the whole substance of wine into the substance of his Blood. This



change is brought about in the eucharistic prayer through the efficacy of the word of Christ and by the action of the Holy Spirit. However, the outward characteristics of bread and wine, that is the "eucharistic species," remain unaltered" (CCC 283).

Similarly, when we participate in the Eucharist, we are transformed! OUR outward characteristics might remain the same, but our substance is changed by the love of Christ and we become more like Christ at work in the world! Live the Eucharist this week by being his hands and feet in all settings!

If your child participated in First Reconciliation preparation this past fall, I will presume you are continuing in First Eucharist preparation unless you have told me differently.
