REFLECTIONS WITH FATHER MICHAEL: LESSONS FROM MY RECENT TRIP TO AFRICA (PART 3)

For those who may not be aware, the event we are referring to here is, the *Mission Strategic Plan (MSP)* which will map out the action plan for effective and meaningful evangelization within our three parishes in the Trinity Family. The importance of this event cannot be over-emphasized. Let's pray for the success.

(Continued from page 1) REFLECTIONS WITH FATHER MICHAEL: LESSONS FROM MY RECENT TRIP TO AFRICA (PART 3)

Now, let's delve back to our reflections on the recent African trip. In the meantime, many thanks to all those who have been contacting me to indicate how much they were enjoying the story of the trip, and how much they were eagerly looking forward to reading the next segment. As we may recall, in the previous segment last month I narrated how I was pleasantly surprised and puzzled that my folks back home in Africa were going about their daily business without bothering to wear face masks or practice social distancing which I was used to here in America. I also mentioned how my conversations with two key figures at my local district helped to give me some insight as to why the covid-19 pandemic has not ravaged the area despite the obvious lack of well-equipped medical facilities.

My conversation with Fr. Ege, a respected senior was both insightful and rewarding. Time and space won't permit to go into full details of the conversation, but its summary can still make sense. According to him, when it comes to the ongoing corona virus, two factors are in play, the spiritual and the temporal. In his view, cultures that do not fully value the sanctity of life are usually hit hard by the world-wide virus. This is because once life is devalued, all kinds of sicknesses then set in, including the air-borne ones like the corona virus. He said our people not only respect and cherish the sacredness of life, but regard abortion as taboo except in very rare cases. For this reason, the body immune system is not unduly compromised due to incessant abuse of the body through abortion which not only weakens the mind but also the flesh. He challenged me to investigate those cultures the sanctity of life is paid lipservice, and those where it is strictly upheld, and find out the difference. Despite his advanced age he spoke with such passion and conviction that you would think he was a very young and dynamic man. What a pro-life priest!

Although I tried, for the sake of argument, to play "devil's advocate," pointing out to him what was happening in South Africa, and how the Omicron virus has killed many people in that country. He smiled and ridiculed such a reference. According to him, South Africa is not a good example., because it has been following the example of the western world by embracing abortion on demand, and as a result has abandoned the strict African respect for life. Then I asked him on what scientific grounds he was making his assertion on infections and lack of infections, he again smiled and said, "The current impact of the corona virus and the wisdom of our ancestors should be enough scientific evidence for you." Wow! Is he right? I cannot judge. Time will tell. However, the other reason he gave for the lack of infections in the community seems more plausible. According to him, the food and lifestyle of our people help to shield them from many diseases, coupled with the natural immunity they acquire from constant mosquito bites and malaria illnesses etc. Consequently, their immune system is so strong for pandemics such as Biola and the current corona virus to adversely harm them. Is he right? Maybe. Again, I can't say for sure. Interestingly enough, Fr. Ege also said something to which I totally agreed. He said, "Whether we believe it or not, the good Lord always cares for the poor and neglected. He knows that our people do not have good governments, or the means to take care of themselves if the pandemic were to strike the community, hence He protected them from it. I'm inclined to agree to that it makes sense to me, because other reasons may require elaborate scientific proof. But this doesn't!

The herbalist doctor, Mazi Oguguo, whom I met about a week after my conversation with Fr. Ege, said something similar to what the priest said earlier on the effects of abortion on the human body and its harmful repercussion on the community as a whole. I was amazed that both of them sounded the same, even though they were approaching the matter from different angles. What baffled me the most was their agreement on the factors they alleged helped our local population to avert the current pandemic. The only variation was that the herbalist also touched on the fact that our local folks regularly consume the highly medicinal alligator pepper almost daily with cola-nuts when welcoming guests and visitors to their home. According to him, the alligator pepper which our people eat regularly is loaded with immune boosting power. In his view, by chewing regularly alligator pepper and cola-nuts, the body immune system grows stronger and stronger daily. Wow! Is he right? Maybe. But I cannot judge or dispute with a seventy-nine-year native doctor with more than fifty years of herbal experience. Anyway, time will tell.

My fellow reflections and friends, there is more to life than meets the eyes. In other words, there are so many things that we do not know and may never fully know in life. But as Christians, the much we cannot dispute is the nearness of God to us all, especially the poor and needy. The Psalmist wasn't kidding when he said, "The Lord is kind and merciful to the poor." Without a doubt, God truly cares for the poor and marginalized. My recent trip to Africa and surprising absence of the Covid-19 infection among the rural population helped to convince me that the Lord is truly wonderful in His mercy and love, especially to those in most need of his help.

In the final segment of our reflections next month, we will find out how I reacted when I discovered that one of my boxes was left behind in France during the connecting flight home, and when that disappointment eventually turned out to be a blessing in disguise during my return journey. Indeed, the Lord works in mysterious ways! Watch out for details in the final segment on April 3rd.

Till then, stay blessed and have a great and fruitful Lenten season! And, please, don't forget to pray for the success of our Mission Strategic Plan which kicks off on Tuesday evening March 8.

This is a simple church rule and proto-cal. It is not meant for any particular church, rather it is a common practice in the Catholic church. The same thing applies to bringing and distributing flyers and leaflets in the church. Nothing is distributed in the Catholic church without the relevant permission. Please, let us take note of this important matter.

What is Lent?

Wednesday, March 2, 2022 - Thursday, April 14, 2022

Lent is a 40 day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. It's a period of preparation to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection at Easter. During Lent, we seek the Lord in prayer by reading Sacred Scripture; we serve by giving alms; and we practice self-control through fasting. We are called not only to abstain from luxuries during Lent, but to a true inner conversion of heart as we seek to follow Christ's will more faithfully. We recall the waters of baptism in which we were also baptized into Christ's death, died to sin and evil, and began new life in Christ.

Many know of the tradition of abstaining from meat on Fridays during Lent, but we are also called to practice self-discipline and fast in other ways throughout the season. Contemplate the meaning and origins of the Lenten fasting tradition in this <u>reflection</u>. In addition, the giving of alms is one way to share God's gifts—not only through the distribution of money, but through the sharing of our time and talents. As St. John Chrysostom reminds us: "Not to enable the poor to share in our goods is to steal from them and deprive them of life. The goods we possess are not ours, but theirs." (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 2446).

In Lent, the baptized are called to renew their baptismal commitment as others prepare to be baptized through the <u>Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults</u>, a period of learning and discernment for individuals who have declared their desire to become Catholics.

A Walk with Mary and Jesus

Each weekend during Lent through Palm Sunday, immediately after the 4:00pm and the 10:00am Masses, we will take fifteen minutes to reflect on three of the fifteen Stations of the Cross, until we've traveled the entire journey alongside both Jesus and Mary, sharing their suffering, their passion, and their work of salvation for all of humanity.
