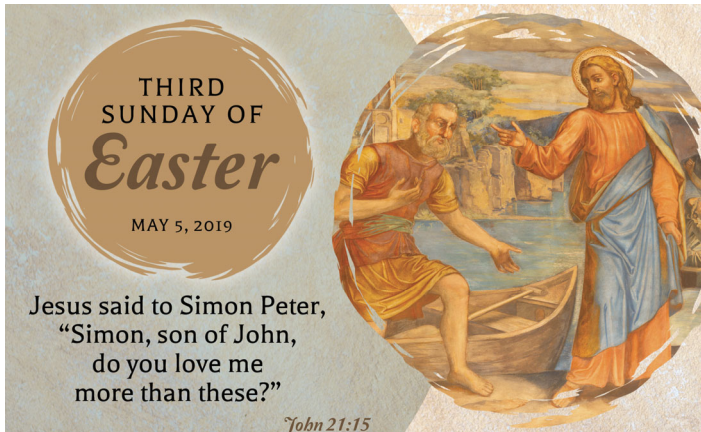

Lifelong Service

I am going fishing. What an announcement! If asked who made it, and not told it was a Bible quote, we might guess Grandpa, Uncle Fredor admit, I said that last summer. It is a Bible quote, from today's Gospel. The person who said it also once declared, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Yes, it is Peter! So today's announcement seems quite the comedown. Last Sunday Jesus said, "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." But Peter seems determined to return to his pre-apostolic occupation, until Jesus intervenes, making Peter's later announcement deeper, "Lord, you know that I love you," and Peter's apostolic calling clearer, "Tend my sheep." Peter does so. Acts presents the consequences: Peter declares, "We must obey God rather than men." As Revelation proclaims, "Worthy is the Lamb"—to receive Peter's lifelong service, and ours.

First Communion-Mother's Day

In preparation for the Sacrament of First Eucharist, a **First Communion Practice** will be held in the Church at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, May 11. Please arrive with your child at least 15 minutes prior to practice. At least one parent is required to remain with their child at all times. Treasures From Our Tradition

The Gospel today sees Peter and his colleagues after the Resurrection, returning to Galilee and resuming the family business. They are fishing by night. Although it is true that fish feed by night, the mention of darkness here is more about the human spirit than it is about fishing advice. Modern life keeps darkness effectively under control; much of the world has been glowing radiantly through the night for a century. Yet just as surely as the Risen Christ breaks into Peter's fishing, so does He break into the usual patterns of our own darkness, electric lights notwithstanding. It is Easter, and we are the people of the light.



In our tradition, Evening Prayer, celebrated in monasteries, parishes, cathedrals and homes everywhere, is a kind of solemn protest against the darkness and its claims, an act of praise for our light-bearing God, and a commitment to carrying that light forward. Sunset is a turning point of our day, felt less acutely in an electrified world, but still an effective reminder that one day darkness overtakes us all. Yet our Easter experiences have taught us in a hundred ways that the victory belongs to the Bearer of Light. Easter summons us to transform our everyday blackouts, perhaps in a way as simple as a whispered prayer of thanks at evening for the blessings of the day. James Field

“Smoting” Or Non–“Smoting”?

Some times I get angry at things that frustrate me. I am driving home and traffic slows to a crawl. The electricity goes out while I am watching a favorite show. So I have to struggle with the line in our first reading, where the disciples were "rejoicing that they had been found worthy to suffer dishonor for the sake of the name" (*Acts 5:41*). They were not just frustrated; they were flogged for believing in Jesus. Still they rejoiced.

Imagine rejoicing over pain and suffering. These disciples had seen Jesus on the cross. When He rose from the dead, they began to see that His suffering was not a tragic loss, but a sign of His glory. They loved Him so much that they took to heart His command to take up the cross. When they suffered because they believed in Him, as is recounted in today's reading, they saw that as a way to imitate Jesus on the cross. Those who had followed Him in life could also follow Him to the cross—and many did that literally, by dying for their faith.

Most of us today rarely have the chance to die for our faith. We may wonder if we even have the courage it would take. Instead, we usually find ourselves suffering because we have done wrong. God does not use special interventions to smite sinners. Think of the times we were punished as a child. Think of the times we lost a friend because of a cruel remark. Think of the times we got a ticket for speeding. These are the results of our actions. These are sufferings that we would rather avoid.

Jesus, however, suffered for our sins when He was totally innocent. If He could do that, could we not accept suffering for our own sins when it comes? We may not be ready to rejoice in that suffering, but we can at least try to learn from it. If we behave differently because of it, if we can grow to be better persons, then that suffering can be our way of accepting the cross. Of course, not all suffering is caused by the sins of the person suffering. The suffering of the innocent is a great mystery, a cause for sorrow and a challenge to help where we can. But like growing pains, all suffering is a step to new life in Christ. That is what Easter is about. Tom Schmidt

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Gone Fishing

Today's Gospel reveals Peter's reaction to the difficulties of being a disciple of the risen Jesus. "I am going fishing," says Peter. Jesus has been tortured, executed, and buried—and then gloriously raised from the dead. He has appeared to the disciples a number of times, but he no longer lives among them as their teacher. The disciples do not exactly understand how to proceed in this unfamiliar and dangerous situation. So Peter goes fishing. He is hungry, after all, and at least he knows how to fish. Jesus seems to reward Peter's instinct, and blesses their net with one hundred fifty-three large fish.

Seven troubled men went out in a boat in the middle of the night, when life seemed dark and empty. They caught no fish. What did they do there, in the dark, at sea, amid failure? Very possibly, they thought of their beloved teacher. Silently in their hearts, or together in stories, they recollected moments in their relationship with Jesus. That kind of recollection is prayer. Each one of us can spend time in prayer like this when facing our own challenges.

Come, Have Breakfast

The Gospel shows us Jesus preparing breakfast for the disciples. Jesus, in His resurrected body, surely has no need for food. He thinks only of the needs of others. The Gospel describes the charcoal fire Jesus has prepared, and we can sense the slow, intimate pace of the early-morning encounter: we hear the hissing of cooking fish; we feel dripping clothes drying in the fire's warmth; we smell bread roasting; and we see Jesus, king of the universe, serving a warm breakfast to His disciples. In so doing, Jesus demonstrates God's care for us. Sometimes God provides extraordinary miracles for us, like bursting nets. At other times, the Lord offers Himself in ordinary events, like breakfast. Follow Jesus' example by doing what we can to care for others, in extraordinary and ordinary ways.



Third Sunday of Easter

The superabundance of God's kindness ties all of today's readings together. Especially when life overwhelms us, the Lord provides all we need, and then some. In the Acts of the Apostles, Peter takes the lead when facing the Sanhedrin. We might expect the man who denied Jesus to crumble under the imposing glare of the high priest. Instead, the Holy Spirit helps him testify to his faith in Jesus Christ. What Peter had lacked before, courage and conviction, God provides in abundance. Similarly, today's Gospel shows Jesus providing a surplus of fish for the disciples. They have no luck fishing until the Lord intercedes. Jesus supplies an almost ridiculous number of fish, and He cooks it for them, too. As our reading from Revelation affirms, the overflowing riches of God require constant praise. Countless creatures—everything in the universe—cry out to honor the Lord, forever and ever.

St. John of Avila—May 10

John was born of wealthy parents at Almodóvar del Campo in New Castile, Spain, on January 6, 1499. At the age of fourteen he was sent to the University of Salamanca to study law.

However, John was attracted to the religious life and left the university to live in austere circumstances. Later he studied at Alcalà and was ordained a priest. Upon the death of his parents, John inherited much wealth, but he gave most of it to the poor. He had a reputation as an outstanding preacher and served as a missionary in Andalusia. He is often called the Apostle of Andalusia.

John's popularity as a preacher continued to grow. Eventually, he became the spiritual director of St. Teresa of Avila, St. John of the Cross, St. Francis Borgia and St. Peter of Alcantara. He died May 10, 1569, at Montilla, Spain.

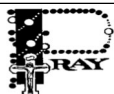

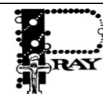
