



#### GAUDETE SUNDAY

Rejoicing is the theme of today's readings on this Gaudete Sunday. We are filled with joy, because the Lord is coming and is almost here! "God is the joy of my soul," the prophet Isaiah says in the first reading. He truly is my joy, my God, my all.

I have joy because I know what is to come. My Savior, Jesus Christ, will soon be born again. Joy beams in the broad smile that instantly bursts onto my face when I see a friend or family member. I feel joy hearing a child giggle or an adult unexpectedly laugh out loud. I rejoice knowing that the love of the Lord is really present in my life and in the world.

Being human, there are many times that I forget that joy. The words proclaimed in the first reading remind me to make my ways straight, to prepare for His presence in the world and most importantly, in my life. I need to be intimately aware of this Companion on my journey during the highs and lows and turns and twists of life, the gift of Christ Jesus and the Holy Spirit.

The "O Antiphons", which begin annually on the 17th of December, are seven ancient refrains that proclaim titles of the Messiah going back to the 4th century. They are sung or prayed during evening prayer before the Magnificat during the days leading up to Christmas Eve. Each speaks about the coming of the Messiah from prophets of the Old Testament.

"O Wisdom" is today's refrain before the Gospel. "O Wisdom of our God Most High, guiding creation with power and love: come to teach us the path of knowledge!" I have joy in the wisdom and knowledge of what is to come: my Savior, Jesus Christ. I am aware of the joy of anticipation of a birth or new beginning. It is the gift of metanoia, a change of heart to begin anew with the graces given to me through His humble birth to Mary.

May my soul rejoice in my Lord and Savior! May I be granted a metanoia of heart and spirit to grow in wisdom and knowledge that leads me closer to the glory and wonder of God. Amen!



## PASTORS CORNER FOR ADVENT (PART 1)

Since we have now entered into the Season of Advent, I will put my account of the Italy trip on hold to talk about this season.

Advent, what a beautiful and somber season in our Catholic Church's calendar year. It is beautiful because we get to look forward to the birth of our Savior, to see the changes of the chill air, as well as, the excitement of the Season leading up to Christmas as well as the Christmas season itself.

PASTOR'S CORNER

It is a somber time because we recall the events that led up to Jesus' birth that was fraught with challenges. Mary was challenged with giving birth to a child that was conceived in a unique way, by the power of the Holy Spirit without a man, in a

time and place where she could be killed for giving birth outside of wedlock, especially if it were thought that she was pregnant due to adultery. Joseph was challenged with protecting her and saying yes to the supreme task of saying yes to God to protect His only Son and the His mother from dangers. This task is exactly why he almost fled into the night, but was held to task by the Archangel Gabriel.

The following are some great ideas on Advent from the EWTN Website.

As we begin this season a good question we can ask is, "What is Advent?"

The word Advent is from the Latin adventus for "coming" and is associated with the four weeks of preparation for Christmas. Advent always contains four Sundays, beginning on the Sunday nearest the feast of St. Andrew the Apostle (November 30) and continuing until December 24.

In 2023, Advent begins on December 3 and ends on December 24 (Christmas Eve), as the Mass of the Lord's Nativity begins. Christmas Day is December 25.

## WHY DO WE CELEBRATE ADVENT?

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (paragraph 524) says,

When the Church celebrates the liturgy of Advent each year, she makes present this ancient expectancy of the messiah, for by sharing in the long preparation for the Savior's first coming, the faithful expectancy of the Messiah, for by sharing in the long preparation for the Savior's first coming, the faithful renew their ardent desire for his second coming. By celebrating the precursor's birth and martyrdom, the Church unites herself to his desire: "He must increase, but I must decrease."

#### WHY IS ADVENT IMPORTANT TO THE CATHOLIC CHURCH?

This is a period of preparation for the celebration of the Incarnation at Christmas. As Christmas seems to arrive commercially ever earlier each year, the faithful should try to turn our hearts more toward the Lord. Mother Angelica, the foundress of EWTN, once said, Let's not let the season pass without a depth of spirituality in our hearts that lets us ponder. Ponder the mystery of how, and why, this Omnipotent God, before Whom angels tremble, would come down and live nine months in the most pure and holy woman that ever lived, and ever will live. He was confined in a womb with that Infinite Intelligence, Infinite Power, and the Power of the Holy Spirit.

#### HOW DO YOU PREPARE YOURSELF DURING ADVENT?

First, it is a good idea to pray more, possibly including the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary, the Franciscan Crown, and the Christmas Novena (see below), all of which call to mind the mysteries associated with the Lord coming into the world.

It is also important to read Sacred Scripture, especially the Infancy Narratives of Matthew and Luke. The Catechism of the Catholic Church, chapters 2 and 3 of the Second Part on the Creed, expresses the Church's Faith in the Incarnation and Nativity of the Lord.

Finally, to truly prepare, it is important to go to Confession at least once during the season, and maybe go to daily Mass and do Eucharistic Adoration when you are able.

### WHICH CANDLE DO YOU LIGHT FIRST ON ADVENT?

First Week: A purple candle

Second Week: A second purple candle, in addition to the first week's candle

Third Week: The first two week's candles and the rose or pink candle

Fourth Week: All four candles

#### HOW DO YOU OBSERVE ADVENT?

Advent is considered the Little Lent, as it begins by recalling that Christ will come at the end of the world as Judge, a reminder of the holiness with which we should be prepared to greet the Lord. Thus, although not strictly a penitential season, the faithful should turn their hearts toward Jesus in prayer, almsgiving, and sacrifice.

In the last part of Advent, we look forward with anticipation and joy to His First Coming, in Bethlehem. One way to do this is to meditate on the O Antiphons used in the Mass, each of which represents a messianic title of Christ from the Old Testament.

## 0 Antiphons

December 17, 2023

O Wisdom of our God Most High, guiding creation with power and love: come to teach us the path of knowledge! December 18, 2023

O Leader of the House of Israel, giver of the Law to Moses on Sinai: come to rescue us with your mighty power!

December 19, 2023

O Root of Jesse's stem, sign of God's love for all his people: come to save us without delay!

December 20, 2023

O Key of David, opening the gates of God's eternal Kingdom: come and free the prisoners of darkness!

December 21, 2023

O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice: come and shine on those who dwell in darkness and in the shadow of death.

December 22, 2023

O King of all nations and keystone of the Church: come and save man, whom you formed from the dust!

December 23, 2023

O Emmanuel, our King and Giver of Law: come to save us, Lord our God!
