





#### BY HIS POVERTY WE ARE FILLED

"Go, sell what you have, and give to the poor and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." (Mk 10:21)

Particularly in today's society, we tend to center ourselves around instant gratification. The newest trends that money can buy hold a constant allure since we can get them off Amazon with just the click of a mouse. Yet most are afraid or ignorant of what to expect after death. Heavenly treasures await us if we are not first distracted by the false riches we may be exposed to here on Earth. Food, material possessions and earthly comforts are temporary, whereas reliance on Christ allows for eternal salvation.

Those who by worldly standards are considered first today may be last tomorrow at Christ's second coming. The Litany of Humility has always helped keep me grounded, reiterating the importance of loving others rather than seeking that love that we desire for ourselves. As Christians, we must ask ourselves if we take the time to tend to those most in need and live in service first to one other.

We must recall the big picture, that as Christians we have the blessing to be able to spend eternity in the presence of God's great love, if we choose to emulate that love during the short time we have here on Earth. This is best demonstrated by the love Christ displays for us poor sinners by dying on the cross. Instead of seeking comfort and security we are called to depend on God always, following His example of love.

Ultimately, we must never be afraid to break open our hearts in front of others for Christ. The life of a Christian is often going to be messy. If we're not suffering alongside Christ, we are not giving our all to Him. We must take up our cross, and not hold back nor be ashamed. The Lord is worth so much more than the sum of our fears and doubts. And in the end, He does not demand much at all. Simply that we love Him with all our heart and love our neighbor as ourselves.

#### THE PUNCH LINE

The first reading is supposed to remind us of Solomon, who, when God promised to give him whatever he asked, chose wisdom over wealth or power. Now our modern view of wisdom is usually pictured as the knowledge and experience of an older person. In the scriptures it is God's Wisdom that is desired. More than just the wise sayings of a Benjamin Franklin or Yoda, scriptural wisdom means doing God's will in all things. As Jesus tried to tell the man in the gospel, knowing and doing God's will is more precious than wealth, or even family!

So if wisdom is that good, why do so few seek it? Most of us have no problem doing God's will, as long as it is the same as ours. Or we do God's will if it is painless and convenient. I once donated money to a charity by sending a text message. I don't know if I would have done it if I had to write a check and mail it. Sometimes we are like that man in the gospel, desiring wisdom but not willing to pay for it.

Maybe our problem is that we don't trust God enough. The first reading, after praising wisdom more than health, wealth, and beauty, ends with a promise of "countless riches" while Jesus promises that the one who gives up everything will receive "a hundred times more." Because the rich man left in sorrow, he missed the punch line.

I can think of two ways to interpret that promise. One is that the more we give up for love of the Lord, the more we get back. When someone gives up selfishness and begins to love, he then becomes capable of receiving love. Which leads to the second meaning of the promise: When we let God change us by giving up our worldly attachments, we find that we are happier because we experience God's love for us more deeply. So Wisdom is the way to happiness: We outgrow our desire for things that make us feel good and appreciate the joy of accepting God's love and sharing it with others.





#### PRAYER AND GROWTH IN RELATIONSHIP WITH JESUS CHRIST

Prayer is a very important part of my life, as it should be important in the lives of every human. I spend several hours a day in prayer. I do not say this to make myself look holy or better than you or anything like that. I pour myself out in prayer so that I can grow in a deep relationship with Jesus. Prayer is so important for me, but I did not start off praying as much as I do today. No I had to work up to that, as a matter of fact at first prayer was somewhat difficult or even hit or miss. I had to really work at it, because sometimes I found it hard and dry. Other times I felt God's tug towards prayer and ether shrugged it off or realized that I needed to heed the prompting and turn to God. While at times prayer can be difficult, I have found that the more that I persevere in prayer the more PASTOR'S CORNER rewarding that it can be. Prayer is truly a relationship, a reaching out to God who has first reached out to us. It was St Augustine of Hippo who said it best in this statement, "You have made us for yourself, Oh Lord, and our

heart is restless until it rests in You." What St Augustine is saying hear resonates with me and it should do so with most of us, because it hits at the heart of our life and our need and desire for God. Our heart is truly restless and cannot find peace until it encounters God, which is because we really need God, as St Augustine says we were made by God to have an encounter with Him. So all human being are searching for something and this can be seen in our world. All you have to do is look around you and really observe other people. Most people are trying to make their lives meaningful or to fill up the emptiness inside with something. Just look at how much technology we have today and how much stuff we have, but it is never enough, people always want more. Why is that? Simple because what people really yearn for or need is God, what their deepest desire is for is God, but we do not realize this and so we try to fill that gap with everything but God. I heard this true statement long ago, God made us complete except for a cross shaped whole in the core of our being, known as our soul. Try as we might we cannot fill that whole with anything but Jesus, hence the cross shape, anything else we put there just goes through and leaves us felling empty and sad, often without really knowing why. Even so people try and try to fill the space, but they often wonder who they still feel empty inside. Without God we will remain restless it is only in coming to know Him and to turn to Him that we come to realize how incomplete we really are and how much that we truly are in need of Him.

In the Catholic tradition there are many types of prayer. Rote prayer, mental prayer or meditative prayer, contemplative prayer, prayer of silence, prayers of thanksgiving, praise and worship, and spontaneous prayer to name a few. There are many ways to grow in relationship with Jesus who loves us so much that He walked the Earth as a human who suffered and died for us and then raised from the dead so that His followers could see this in person to tell everyone they encountered. So today you can come to meet the risen Christ yourself using one of these many types of prayer.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church has this to say about prayer in paragraph 2559.

"Prayer is the raising of one's mind and heart to God or the requesting of good things from God." But when we pray, do we speak from the height of our pride and will, or "out of the depths" of a humble and contrite heart? He who humbles himself will be exalted: Humility is the foundation of prayer. Only when we humbly acknowledge that "we do not know how to pray as we ought." Are we ready to receive freely the gift of prayer, "Man is a beggar before God."

It was Saint Teresa Benedicta of the Cross who taught that vocal prayer is not, "simply saying words." Thus, "if the mere words of a prayer alone are said without the soul's raising itself to God, This is only an outwards show and not real prayer. The designated words, however, support the spirit and prescribe it to a fixed path." Vocal prayer is the first step upon the "fixed path" which leads to holiness and liberation, and such conversational prayer should always be part of your prayer life. Unless your vocal prayer includes the heart, however, you run the risk of merely reading to God. Vocal prayer should engage God with an act of the will. Project the words of the prayer over the person for whom you are praying. Therefore it becomes alive and a meaningful conversation with God. It was St. Therese of Lisieux who said this about prayer, "For me, prayer is a surge of the heart; it is a simple look turned toward heaven, it is a cry of recognition and of love, embracing both trial and Joy."

So I hope that you can see through the words of these saints that prayer is important for our relationship with God, because it fosters growth in that relationship as well as growth in our spiritual life. Prayer should become as necessary for our lives as eating food, because it is spiritual nourishment for our souls.

Over the next few weeks as I give an introduction to these forms of prayer that I have mentioned, these are all prayer forms that I have used in my life, I will give an example of ether how to pray these types of prayer or a meditation that can be used in adoration. It is my hope that these prayer forms will help people to see the beauty of prayer and desire to have a closer walk with Jesus in their lives.
