

SAINT HILARY (c. 315-367) January 13

Born in Poitiers, France, whose populace would later elect him bishop, Hilary, married and a father, was converted from paganism to Christianity through his reading of scripture. The focus of his prayerful study was the Prologue to the Gospel according to John, which portrays Jesus as the divine Logos, eternally begotten of the Father. As a result, Hilary became in the words of the biblical scholar Jerome, "the Latin Trumpet against the Arians," heretics who believed Jesus to be merely human, not divine. In defense of Christ's divinity, Hilary was not only eloquent in debate but utterly fearless in the face of relentless persecution and even exile. Thus by the witness of his own discipleship, Hilary taught that faith in Jesus as the divine Son of God has consequences. Reflecting on Jesus' challenge to his disciples, "You are the salt of the earth" (Matthew 5:13), Hilary notes that, as salt both preserves from corruption and adds savor to food, so must the faithful disciple bear a witness that, by word and example, leads others to immortality and virtuous living.



PASTORS CORNER BAPTISM OF THE LORD

Today we celebrate the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. This feast marks the end of the Christmas season and the beginning of ordinary time. As I have given the details of the birth of Jesus and visitation of the Wise Men, I decided to give Blessed Anne Catherine Emmerich's Vision of the baptism of Jesus. I hope that you will make time to read this account and meditate on this most sacred event. What do is either use this telling of Anne's vision like I would the Bible and either use Lectio Divina to meditate on it or to use my active imagination and put myself into the event and think about what I would have done when I saw this event happen and what John or Jesus would have said to me if I were there. Maybe you could have yourself be one of those coming to John for baptism.

To begin with Anne sees John the Baptist set up a special place for the baptism of Jesus, since he had been awaiting Jesus' coming all of his life. Anne explained that the place where the baptism was to take place had been the spot where over a thousand years before the Ark of the Covenant had stopped as the Israelites crossed over the Jordan and the water was held up miraculously in one mass, just as it had been in the crossing of the Red Sea. (See Joshua 3:7-13) I find this very beautiful since God had John baptize Jesus at a place where the Ark of the Old Covenant had been. Also Joshua commanded the Israelite priests to set up large stones drawn from the Jordan to mark this location. Anne describes these stones in her vision and tells how she had been shown the event happen when Joshua originally set up the stones and the Ark Cross over. So the Old Covenant and Jesus who is the New Covenant met at this location, making it a very special place where Jesus was baptized and showing God's Hand in this whole event.

So here follows Anne's vision of Jesus baptism.

It was morning twilight when, Jesus caught up with a crowd of people who were also going to the baptism of John, and he walked with them. They did not know Him, but they could not keep their eyes off Him, for there was something about Him very remarkable. When they reached the end of their journey, it was morning. A crowd more numerous than usual was assembled to whom John was with great animation preaching of the nearness of the Messiah and of penance, proclaiming at the same time the moment was approaching for him to retire from his office of teacher. Although Jesus was standing in a throng of listeners, John felt His presence. He saw Him also, and that fired him with zeal and filled his heart with joy. But he did not on that account interrupt his discourse, and when he had finished he began to baptize.

He had already baptized very many and it was drawing on ten o'clock, when Jesus in His turn came down among the aspirants to the pool of baptism. John bowed low before Him, saying: "I ought to be baptized by you, and You come to me?" Jesus answered: "Allow it now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness." He also said: "You shall receive the baptism of the Holy Spirit and of blood." Then John begged Him to follow him to the special place he had prepared. Jesus replied that He would do so, provided that some of the water with which all were baptized should be poured into the basin, that all present should be baptized at the same place with Himself, and that the tree by which He was to support Himself should be transplanted to the ordinary place of baptism, that all might share the same conveniences.

After disrobing Jesus descended into the well, and stood in the water up to His breast. His left arm encircled the tree, His right hand was laid on His breast, and the loosened ends of His white garment floated in the water. On the southern side of the well stood John, holding in his hand a shell with a perforated margin through which the water flowed in three streams. He stooped, filled the shell, and then poured the water in three streams over the head of the Lord, one on the back of the head, one in the middle, and the third over the forepart of the head and on the face.

When Anne Catherine recalled this event she could not remember exactly the words that John said as he poured the baptism water over Jesus, so she just gives best what she could remember, words that expressed the blessing over his mind, body and soul. "May Yahweh through the ministry of His cherubim and seraphim, pour out His blessing over you with wisdom, understanding, and strength."

While Jesus ascended from the depths of the baptismal well, Andrew and Saturnin, disciples of John, where were standing to the right of the Baptist around the triangular stone, threw about Him a large linen cloth with which he dried His person. They then put on Him a long white baptismal robe. After this Jesus stepped on a red triangular stone which lay to the right of the descent into the well, Andrew and Saturnin each laid one hand upon His shoulder, while John rested his upon His head.

This part of the ceremony over, they were just about mounting the steps when the Voice of God came over Jesus, who was standing alone and in prayer upon the stone. There came from Heaven a great, rushing wind like thunder. All trembled and looked up. A cloud of white light descended, and I saw over Jesus a winged figure of light as if flowing over Him like a stream. The hevens opened, I beheld an apparition of the Heavenly Father in the figure in which He is usually depicted and, in a voice of thunder, I heard the words: "This is My beloved Son in whom I am well pleased."

Jesus looked perfectly transparent, entirely penetrated by light; one could scarcely look at Him. I saw angels around Him.

The sacred baptismal well sparkled showing it to look like a pool of living light. One could see the four stones that had once supported the Ark of the Covenant shining beneath the waters as if in exultation; and on the twelve stones around the well, those upon which the Levites had stood, appeared angels bending in adoration, for the Spirit of God had before all mankind rendered testimony to the living Foundation, to the precious, chosen Cornerstone of the Church around whom we as so many living stones, must build up a spiritual edifice, a holy priesthood, that thereby we may offer an acceptable, spiritual sacrifice to God through His beloved son in whom He is well pleased.

Jesus then ascended the steps and entered the tent near the baptismal well. Saturnin brought the garment which Lazarus had been holding and Jesus put them on. When clothed, He left the tent and surrounded by His disciples, took His stand on the open space near the central tree. John in joyous tones addressed the crowd and bore witness to Jesus that He was the Son of God and the promised Messiah. He cited the Prophecies of the Patriarchs and prophets now fulfilled, recounted what he had seen, reminded them of the voice of God which they had heard, and informed them that when Jesus returned he himself would retire. John referred also to the sacred memories that embalmed the spot upon which they were standing on account of the Ark of the Covenant's having rested here when Israel was journeying to the Land of Promise. Now, he continued, had they seen the Realization of the Covenant witnessed to by His Father, the Almighty God Himself. John referred all to Jesus, and called this day that had beheld the fulfilment of the desire of Israel blessed.

After this John began to baptize all who were coming at the special spot where Jesus was baptized.

In conclusion I find that it is beautiful that Anne Catherine was shown in her vision of the baptism of Jesus events happening in spiritual realm that were not seen by those present. She was privy to supernatural events happening that showed how important this event was. In the Bible we hear about the Holy Spirit being seen as a dove, and how God's voice is heard from Heaven, but she saw God the Father in her vision and an angel instead of a dove. I am sure that if Andrew the Apostle, who was present, since he was a disciple of both John and Jesus, would have given an account of what he had seen. But if he had seen an angel revealed to those present he would have been shaken by the event instead of recounted it with amazement and Joy. As I have noted in previous pastors corners that whenever a person saw an angel they were frightened by the event. So all who were present were not able to see everything that transpired. But we are given a special privilege through the eyes of Blessed Anne of hearing of how God Himself appeared and as well as how many angels were there at one of the most special events in history.

THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD FEAR NOT

Did the first reading from Isaiah sound familiar? We also hear it on the first Sunday of Advent every few years. I suppose it could be a reminder that John the Baptist appears at the beginning of the Advent/Christmas season and at the end. In Advent we were preparing for Jesus' coming at Christmas. Now we are preparing for his coming at any time.

The reading from Isaiah talks about the Lord coming in mercy to the people whose "guilt is expiated" (Isaiah 40:2). The mountains and hills will be leveled, symbolic of making an easy way to the Lord. In other words, the Lord is approachable. With our sins forgiven we need not fear asking God for help: "Fear not to cry out" (Isaiah 40:9). The Lord comes in power, not to strike sinners down but to shepherd them and lead them.

In the second reading, St. Paul has a similar theme. Jesus gave his life for us on the cross so that we could be free from sin and able to reject evil desires. We are free to give ourselves in love as he did. And he does this, not because we did anything to deserve it, but from his own love and mercy for us. Think about that. No matter how bad I was in the past, the Lord loves me enough to forgive it all, and even better, to give the Spirit to help me stay close to God.

How do we prepare for this? We can start by hearing the words of the readings today, letting them sink into our hearts and minds. Read them again at home, and remind yourself that you have been forgiven, that you can live as a person "eager to do what is good" (Titus 2:14). Ask the Spirit to help you see what things are keeping you from being like Jesus and to give you the strength to say no to them. And look for ways you can be more loving with your family, then with your friends, and eventually with anyone who needs your help. When we let that Spirit guide us, we become like Jesus in that we can listen for God to say, "You are my beloved child; with you I am well pleased" (see Luke 3:22).
