Twenty-Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time September 22, 2024

They had been discussing among themselves on the way who was the greatest. Then he sat down, called the Twelve, and said to them, "If anyone wishes to be first, he shall be the last of all and the servant of all." Taking a child, he placed it in their midst, and putting his arms around it, he said to them, "Whoever receives one child such as this in my name, receives me; and whoever receives me, receives not me but the One who sent me." Mark 9: 34-37



Today's work of art focuses on the second part of the gospel reading – immediately after the apostles have been arguing, Christ upends their idea of who is first and last and takes a child, typically a symbol of innocence and trust, and places him before them. The artist depicts Christ plainly showing the child to the viewer as if demonstrating the gospel's message. Children are also commonly included in Christian art to symbolize human potential and new beginnings. Christ is shown in white, highlighting his purity and glory, while the child wears a pale blue mantle, symbolizing spiritual love and truth. Of note, however, underneath the mantle near the child's collar, part of a red shirt is visible. Red, a sometimes-ambiguous symbol, could potentially reference Christ's Passion while the palm certainly symbolizes victory and the triumph over death in the Resurrection. Although Christ is shown with a halo and the child with a palm, Carl Bloch's religious paintings often deemphasized overt religious symbols. However, Christ's model of faith and trust—so evident in a child—is clearly conveyed in this painting.

WORD From from "It's

Years ago, people who came from humble homes would say, EED "It's not much, but it is home." When some of their sons be-

came priests and would be assigned to parishes with large rectories and churches, the priests would joke, "It's not home, but it's much!"

The Apostles fell into the same trap, but their superlative was "the greatest." They were debating among themselves who was the most important--the first struggle for power in the Church! 
Saint Pio of Pietrelcina "Padre Pio"

Francesco Forgione was born in the Italian farming village of Pietrelcina on May 25, 1887. He was one of seven children. By age five, Francesco had already dedicated his life to God. He helped take care of his family's flock of sheep until age ten. Then, as a requirement for joining the Capuchin order, he received private tutoring, to make up for the time he had spent shepherding, rather than in school. At age fifteen, he joined the Order of Friars Minor, taking the name "Pio."

As a Capuchin Franciscan friar, he experienced both physical illness and spiritual battles, but persevering, he was ordained a priest in 1910. Due to poor health, he stayed mostly with his family until 1916, when he was required to return to the friary.

During World War I, he was drafted to serve in the Italian army in the medical corps in 1914/5, and again in 1917. Both times, illness prevented him from continuing in the service; the second time, he was given a permanent discharge. When he left the service, he returned to the friary of San Giovanni Rotondo, where he remained for the duration of his life.

Friar Pio became known to many as Padre Pio. He bore the stigmata, or wounds of Christ, invisibly from the time of his ordination in 1910 and visibly from 1918. The Vatican investigated the authenticity of his stigmata, and his ministry of prayer and healing, beginning in 1921. As his renown grew, so did persecution. In 1922, various restrictions were placed on his ministry, including being forbidden from giving blessings to the faithful. In 1931, he was forbidden from publicly celebrating Mass, hearing confessions, and receiving visitors. This ban was lifted by the Pope Pius XI in 1933, and Padre Pio was allowed to gradually resume public ministry.

Padre Pio is known for being a gifted confessor, his efficacious intercessory prayer, and other mystical gifts associated with his religious life. Under the direction of Padre Pio, in 1947, construction began to build a hospital to treat patients at San Giovanni Rotondo, using science along with faith and prayer. Shortly before his death in 1968, the stigmata disappeared. He was canonized in 2002 by St. John Paul II. Pope Francis has called Padre Pio an "apostle of the confessional."
