EXPANDED OPPORTUNITIES FOR GROWING IN YOUR FAITH

EUCCHARISTIC PROCESSIONS

Celebrating the national Eucharistic Revival, culminating in a conference in Indianapolis in the summer of 2024, Holy Family will be scheduling several eucharistic processions on major church feast days. These are usually held after the 930A Sunday Mass and include processing around the church block with the blessed sacrament in the monstrance. The next procession at Holy Family will be on November 26, Christ the King Sunday. SOLEMN SUNG VESPERS

Approximately once a month Holy Family parishioners will have the unique opportunity of participating in a centuries-old tradition of the church and of the Dominican Order by chanting the psalms antiphonally (side to side) for the Vespers portion of the Liturgy of the Hours. Enjoy the medieval atmosphere of praising God in song. Our next sung vespers is scheduled for Tuesday, November 7, in celebration of Dominican All Saints.

ROSARY GATHERINGS

One charism of the Order of Preachers is praying the Rosary which tradition says our Lady gave to St. Dominic. At Holy Family the Rosary is recited before weekday Masses and on many other occasions. Recitation of the Rosary will be offered at other times and, when weather allows, in the courtyard with the statue of Our Lady. A Rosary is scheduled for Saturday, November 11, in honor of Veterans' Day.



ADULT CATECHESIS

This year adult parishioners are invited to monitor the Tuesday evening RCIA classes for any topic about which they would like to increase their knowledge. The topics are listed in the weekly bulletin. In addition, Brother Jordan is offering adult catechesis on theological and philosophical topics at 1045A on Sundays in the Dominican Hall. This offers parents of CCD students a way to grow in their faith while their children are in class, and allows any adult to learn more about his or her faith. Stop by on Sunday.

ST. TARCISIUS

Feast Day: August 15

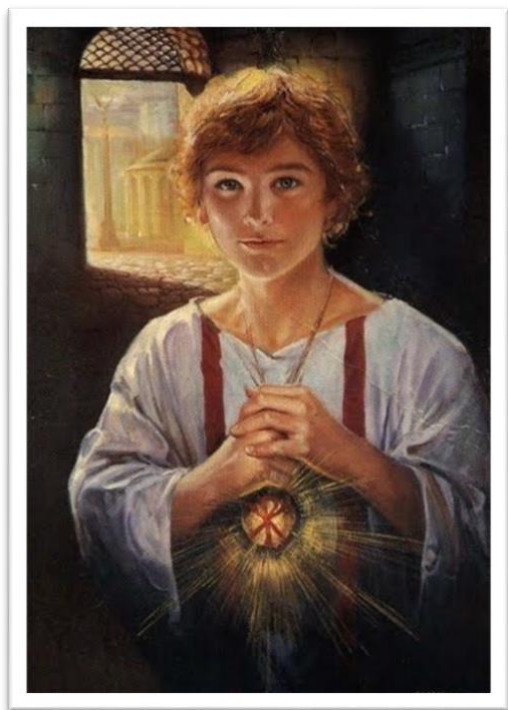
Patronage: Altar Servers and First Communicants

Because he lived such a short life, the biography of Tarcisus is very brief. Tarcisus was born in third century Rome. This was a time of great persecution for Christians. In order to pray and celebrate Holy Mass, Christians were forced to meet secretly either in the Catacombs or in private homes.

Tarcisus was an acolyte (altar server). Every day a deacon would take the Holy Eucharist to prison to those Christians condemned to death. One day there was no deacon available, so Tarcisus volunteered. On the way he met some boys who were not Christians. They were playing games and asked Tarcisus to join them. When he refused, they realized that he was a Christian and beat him to death. Tradition tells us that the sacred Host Tarcisus protected became flesh of his flesh forming a single immaculate Host offered to God.

Most of the information we have about Tarcisus is preserved in a poem composed in his honor by Pope Damasus who reigned from 366-384. The poem tells how a crowd of young boys beat Tarcisus to death while he tried to protect the Blessed Sacrament. The Pope compared his death to that of the first martyr of the Church, Saint Stephen, who was stoned to death.

Tarcisus died when he was about twelve years old. His body was buried in the Catacombs of Saint Callistus. Later his relics were moved to the Basilica of Saint Silvester the First in Rome. He was canonized Pre-Congregation (prior to the formation of the Congregation for the Causes of Saints).



When asked: “Will you guard the Sacred Mysteries faithfully and safely?” Tarcisus answered with determination: “I would die rather than let go of them.”

Little-known Fact: Because his feast day is celebrated on the Feast of the Assumption, Tarcisus is NOT mentioned in the General Roman Calendar.

FINDING SACRED SPACES

A Personal Pilgrimage of Discovering Catholic Waypoints in America

Once Upon A Time

Our journey began during our 35th wedding anniversary. We took a month-long, 8,500-mile trip from our home in Alaska down to Washington and Oregon, then over to Colorado and back home - on our motorcycles! On our way home we both thought of ways to make the return trip but with perhaps a toy hauler for us and the motorcycles. Trust us on this one, riding the Alcan on motorcycles is hard on both rider and steed.

Fast forward two years and we are on our way back to the lower 48 to pick up our new 24-foot enclosed trailer in Elkhart, Indiana. The highlight of this trip was the plan to visit as many Catholic shrines as possible along the way. One on the list was a little-known Shrine of Divine Mercy in Mossyrock, WA.

A Seed Is Planted

As we entered Mossyrock from the east on Highway 12, we stopped several locals and asked about the Shrine of Divine Mercy and could they point us in the right direction. "Never heard of it" was the gist of both replies. Well, snap, we must have gotten the wrong info from the Internet.

As we were leaving Mossyrock through beautiful fields of tulips, our disappointment turned to joy as, low and behold in the rearview mirror - a huge white cross on top of the hill! We quickly turned around and spent the last half of the day visiting and experiencing this gem of a Catholic Shrine to the Divine Mercy. Some time on the road trip back home the thought came to us that, after we retire in five or six years, we should travel around the US and document little known Catholic shrines and help build awareness for these Catholic sacred spaces.

God Works in Mysterious (and Very Wonderful) Ways

As providence would have it we unexpectedly retired a little over a year later in October of 2018. The seed had been planted and now a shoot had burst through the ground. We spent the next 12 months building out the trailer as a camper/motorcycle garage, acquiring a bigger truck, purchasing a camper top (for our not-yet-18-year-old son Blaise) and preparing the pilgrimage plan for this new chapter in our lives.

The most important lesson learned throughout the 12-month preparation period was that this pilgrimage will happen in God's time, not ours. Deadlines thought to

be broken were miraculously met, the hands of angels guided the cabinet building (we're not the most accomplished carpenter types) and it all came together exactly in time to head down the Alcan at the edge of Winter. Although not the ideal time to travel through northern Alaska and

Canada, again our holy angels guided us through a near perfect weather window to our base "camp" for the next two months in Lacey, WA.

Our new ministry "Finding Sacred Spaces" officially began on January 5, 2020. Since then, we have posted over 75 Catholic waypoint videos, we have hundreds more on our list to visit and, by the grace of God, grown our faith in immeasurable ways. We invite all to join us on this spiritual pilgrimage by visiting our website to share our on-going story, offer your intentions (we archive and offer them up at each and every sacred space we visit) and, if the spirit moves you, become a patron. As always, our prayers are with you, and we humbly ask you to keep us in your prayers as well.

How Do You Want to Live Your Last Hour?

“What are the four last things of man?

Death, Judgment, Heaven, Hell.

What is Death? Death is the separation of man’s mortal body and immortal soul.

Are we going to die someday? Yes.”

When it comes to existential questions, many people don’t agree with the classic answers of the small Catholic catechisms. But there’s at least one thing on which they agree with the Church: that someday, we are going to die. However, a lot of people, even Catholics, never really think about death and don’t see any necessity to think about it. Many years ago, somebody shared with me the testimonies of two former politicians of Québec; letters that each of them wrote a few days before his death. One of these men was a faithful and devout Catholic, and the other was not. The contrast is striking.

To keep this text short, I will only quote a few sentences of each letter.

1st Testimony: Dr. Camille Laurin

“Since this thunderclap in October, announcing the near end of my earthly pilgrimage, my thoughts have taken a more loving and more eternal turn. In this painful hour, I unite myself to Jesus on the Cross, to give meaning to all my sufferings, my sorrows, my worries, my fears, my thoughts and my actions. This participation contributes to my purification and to opening my soul wider to Joy and Love.”

2nd Testimony: Pierre Bourgault

“I always made fun of death, mine and others’. But now, death is facing me in all its brutality, with a savage abruptness that uproots me with violence. It is the worst of all deaths, and it is mine. I have known, through all my life, unspeakable sufferings

and heavy trials. But put all together, they don’t weigh much anymore, compared to the torment in which I am immersed now.”

In the last days of their life, both men seemed to experience a “purgatory on Earth.” The difference resides in the fact that for Dr. Laurin, suffering had a profound meaning, whereas for Mr. Bourgault, the absurdity of suffering was even more painful than the suffering itself.

The German philosopher Arthur Schopenhauer famously said: “Life is a business that does not cover the costs.” Indeed, life is not easy. And if there is nothing after this life, if there is no relief for those who suffer with Christ and no recompense for those who die in the friendship of God, indeed life does not cover the costs. But if there is something after this life, if there is relief for those who suffer with Christ and recompense for those who die in the friendship of God, then life indeed is a business that covers the cost.

Left side, coat of arms of the Diocese of Fairbanks with the North Star over the mountains.

Between the two red roses is the Sacred Heart of Jesus, the titular symbol of the Cathedral of the Diocese.

Right side, the personal coat of arms of Bishop Maekawa. The black and white cross is the crest of the Order of Preachers. The waves represent the waters of baptism and the family name Maekawa which means "before the river."

The episcopal motto "*Duc in Altum*" is Jesus' command to the Apostle Peter, "Put out into the deep" which reminds us to trust in the Lord Jesus believing that all creation belongs to God: "The earth is the Lord's and all it holds, the world and those who dwell in it." (Ps 24:1)

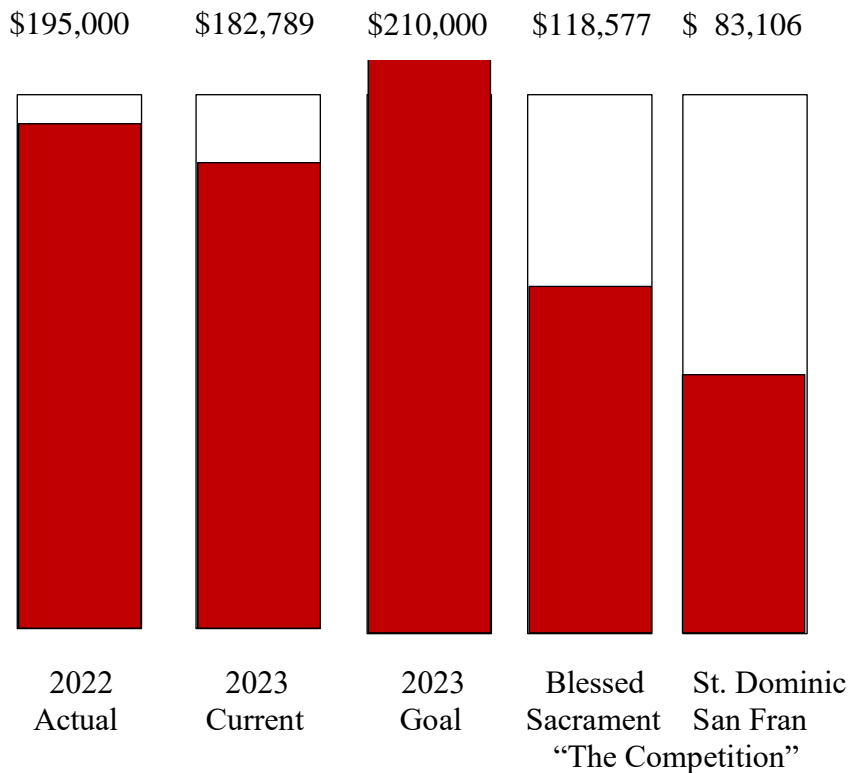

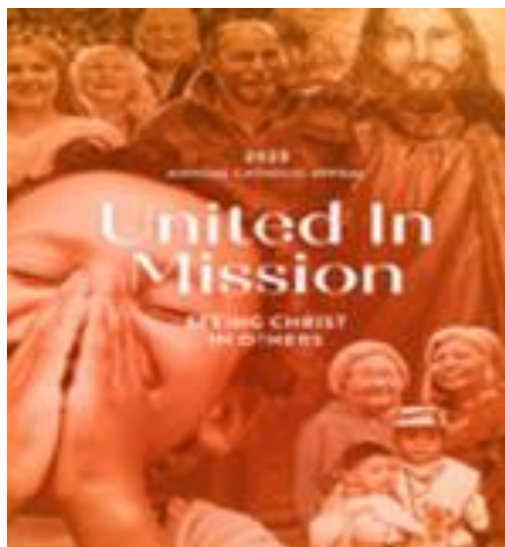

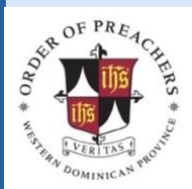

IN THE FOOTSTEPS OF AQUINAS

A Pilgrimage Celebrating the 700th Anniversary of Aquinas' Canonization. Offered through the Western Dominican Province. September 7 – 17, 2023. The two-year triple celebration includes the 800th anniversary of St. Thomas' birth and the 850th anniversary of his death. A plenary indulgence is offered for visits to Dominican sites, including Holy Family Anchorage.

Six Holy Family parishioners, the new pastor, James Moore, and former pastor Francis Le were privileged to visit major sites in the life of St. Thomas Aquinas this past September. The photo left shows the seven Western Dominicans who participated as pilgrims with 44 lay people mostly from Dominican parishes on the West Coast. This photo is the chapel at the Cistercian monastery of Fossanova, the place where St. Thomas died on March 7, 1274.

Other highlights of the pilgrimage were celebrating Mass in the Chapel of Our Lady, Queen of the Hungarians, at the Vatican, and at Santa Sabina, the worldwide headquarters of the Dominican order. The friars offered Masses, rosaries, prayers, reflections, their spiritual journeys, and friendship to the pilgrims.
