Letter from the Pastor / Carta del Parroca

Dear Friends,

There are usually many reasons why I look forward to Lent each year. In last month's newsletter, I wrote about how Lent is like a time of retreat. I look forward to Lent because it is a season where I can reset my prayer life – re-commit to a holy hour, do more spiritual reading, and probe the deeper parts of the faith through study! It is also a time where I can up my fasting game – both with regard to food and also the internet.

It is a time for me to reset – to detox. However, is Lent merely a time for self-improvement?

So many people undertake fasting for natural health reasons. Many also undertake study to make us better at our businesses. These are important things!

However, do we ever think about Lent as building our foundation for evangelization?

As Dominicans, we study, pray, and engage in community life. These might all seem inwardly focused. However, our whole life is actually oriented towards preaching!! We undertake these contemplative activities, but we do so to give their fruits away! To give to others the fruits of our contemplation is essential to the Dominican way of life!!

In this newsletter we read about the past – our Dominican past in Anchorage and our legacy of Dominican saints! We'll look deeper into the notion of forgiveness and purification for ourselves as we examine our conscience and realize the need we have for redemption. We also have our Holy Week Schedule! Make plans now to reserve a lot of time for the *Triduum* on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday (including the incredible Easter Vigil). Celebrating *Tenebrae* and the great liturgies of the *Triduum* helps us to contemplate in the deepest manner the mystery of our redemption!

However, all of these things – our remembrance of the past and in seeking to go deeper at the present - should be done with an eye to evangelization! Can we share with others this Good News of the Eucharist? Will we spread the mystery of our redemption by the cross? Can we spread the greatest joy that the enemy has been defeated, the tomb is empty – and we can live forever as Saints?

Let us continue with that Lenten journey – but let us keep in mind that these fruits are to be given away. We can't help but spread the Good News, to publish the Glad Tidings that we are redeemed and released from sin and death!!!

En este boletín leemos sobre el pasado: ¡nuestro pasado dominicano en Anchorage y nuestro legado de santos dominicanos! “ORACLE OF THE LORD – return to me with your whole heart” Joel 2:12

During Lent, some people prepare for baptism, and the others take time to remember their baptism. It is a time to dispose one's heart to celebrate the paschal mystery, in order to participate in the death and resurrection of Christ.

The Church offers us three ways to do penance and grow in friendship for God: fasting, almsgiving and prayer. We can talk about fasting, almsgiving and prayer by using a comparison with marriage. Since our baptism, we have been married to the Lord, so to speak. However, our marriage with the Lord does not always go well. And if things are bad, then what can we do to make things go well, to make things go better?

Suppose a man's marriage goes wrong, through his fault. His wife even says she will leave the house if he doesn't change. The man is shaken and he wants to change. What is he going to do? How can he repair his broken marriage? He will change his habits:

- in his relationship with the things he uses;
- in his relationship with the people with whom he lives;
- and especially in his relationship with his wife, whom he truly wants to love.

The man changes his relationship with the things he uses: the car, the television, the computer, etc. He now wants to use these things for love of his wife.

The man changes his relationship with the people around him: his children, his wife's family – her parents, her siblings, etc. He even resolves to no longer date a woman at work. He wants to act towards others and love them all for love of his wife.

Finally, and above all, the man changes his relationship with his wife. He wants to speak more to her: “How was your day? What did you do? How are you doing? Are you joyful or sad? What are your hopes, your fears?” He wants to go out at least once a week with his wife and have an evening just for the two of them.



Likewise, when our relationship with God goes wrong, we need to do something about it. This is the meaning of fasting, almsgiving and prayer. It is to repair and perfect our marriage with God.

Fasting has to do with the things we use, to order them or to better order them to our friendship with God. It's not just about fasting of food, but fasting of other good things as well.

Almsgiving has to do with the people around us. It is about loving them and giving to them as God would. They are God's children. And if God is our best friend, then we should not mistreat his children. Rather, we should help them as God would.

Prayer has to do directly with God, with our friendship with him. We have to ask ourselves: How do we live with our friend? Do we take time for God, time to listen to him and to speak to him?

During this Lenten season, let us use fasting, almsgiving and prayer fruitfully. **And let us ask Jesus for a grace: to already glimpse the victory of the fight and thus unite ourselves to the joy of his victory on Easter morning!**

BLESSED NICOLA (NICHOLAS) PAGLIA, OP

Feast Day: February 16

Nicholas was born in Giovinazzo, near Bari, Italy in 1197. When he was a child, an angel appeared to him and told him to abstain from eating meat because one day he would enter an Order that had a rule of perpetual abstinence.

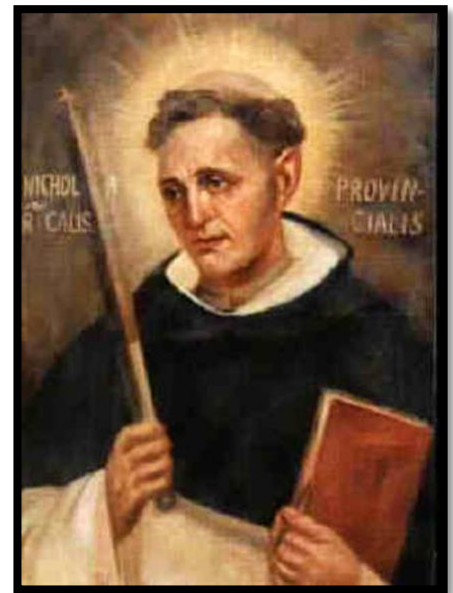
Nicholas' parents were aristocrats, and, because he was the son of a judge, he was sent to Bologna to study law. In 1218, while completing his studies, Nicholas heard a sermon preached by Father Dominic de Guzmán, founder of the Order of Preachers (Dominicans). Inspired by his preaching, Nicholas asked to be admitted into the Order. He was ordained a priest and received the habit from Father Dominic himself. Nicholas was an excellent preacher, and he became Dominic's faithful traveling companion. Together they journeyed to many cities in Italy preaching and teaching the Faith.

Nicholas was prudent, wise, charitable and compassionate, especially to his fellow brothers. He promoted the study of Sacred Scripture and compiled a Bible concordance. He served two terms as Provincial of the Roman Province that extended from Tuscany to Sicily and established convents in Perugia and Trani.

In 1231, Pope Gregory IX commissioned Nicholas to reform several monasteries and to preach the Crusade against the Saracens.

Nicholas was known as a miracle worker and, after many years of traveling and preaching, he retired to the convent in Perugia. It is said that he had a vision of a dead priest who was his friend of many years. His friend told him that Our Lady told him that Nicholas would die very soon. He died at the age of 58 in Perugia on February 16, 1256, and is buried in the church of Saint Dominic. Pope Leo XII beatified Nicholas on March 26, 1828.

Although he is not well known outside of the Order, the life of Blessed Nicholas should be acknowledged and celebrated to encourage us to become saints.

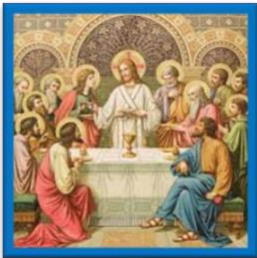

BRIEF SUMMARY OF A LONG LIFE!

- Born in Eagle Grove, Iowa, in 1915
- Early jobs as a letter carrier for the USPS
- Private pilot's license with land and water ratings
- Navy service as a hospital corpsman with the Third Division of the US Marines on Guam and Truk. Discharged in March 1946
- St. Philip Neri School for Delayed Vocations in Boston, fall 1946
- Entered the novitiate of the Holy Name Province of the Western Dominicans, fall 1947
- Ordained to the priesthood, June 12, 1953
- Began service on the DEW line, July 1961, from Barter Island in the Yukon Territory to Barrow, Alaska. 60 radar and communications stations
- "The chaplain offers daily Mass wherever he may be along his 1200 mile route, usually in the site recreation or music room."
- Served the Archdiocese of Anchorage from 1977 to 2003
- 2003. Awarded the first St. Francis medal given by the Archdiocese to someone dedicated to ministry to the poor
- Born to eternal life, September 9, 2003

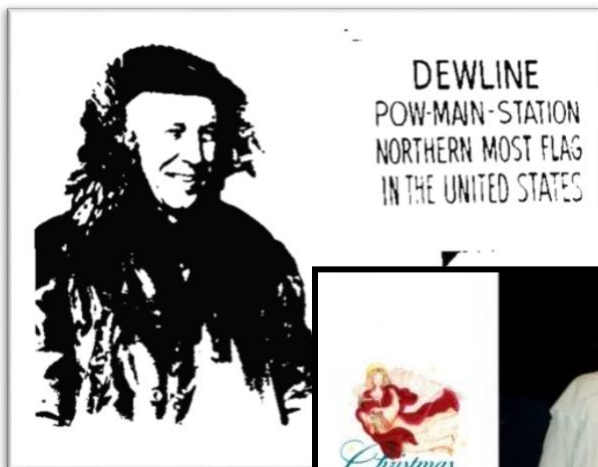

FATHER BATES' SERVICE IN ALASKA spans more than half of the 50 year Jubilee we are celebrating. He arrived to join the Dominicans here in 1977 and served here for 26 years with assignments in Kodiak, Big Lake, Glennallen, Talkeetna, and Anchorage.

He might have been the first Dominican in Alaska when he served as a chaplain on the DEW (Distant Early Warning) line from 1961 to 1964. It was a 1,200 mile circuit with 50 – 60 Catholics. He tried to visit the main sites once a month, and the smaller ones every 4- 6 months.

Sr. Claire Gagnon remembers: "He's very thrifty. We had a joke in Talkeetna that Father Bates would give you the shirt off his back but he wouldn't buy another shirt."



Fr. Bates volunteered for Habitat for Humanity. In his later years Fr. Bates visited corrections facilities in Anchorage three times a week. He continued this ministry up until a few weeks before his death.

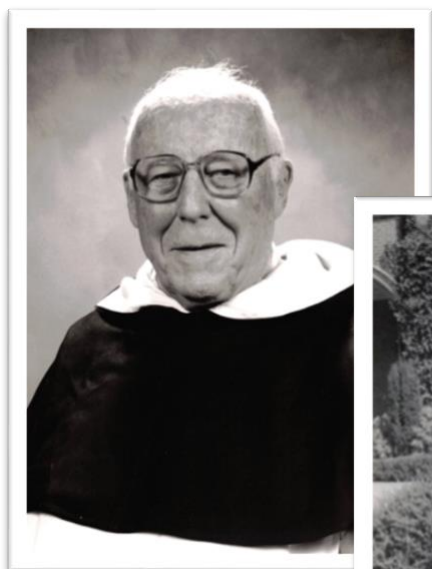
