#### A Message from our Pastor

Dear Friends,

This past week was the anniversary of the 9/11 attacks, a day that will always be locked in our memory with remarkable clarity for many of us.

While many things have stuck with me over the years, one that continues to come up often is this: in the days and weeks after, my small parish in Northboro grew exponentially. Masses were filled to the brim with people. People realized what mattered when faced with a crisis, at least for a while. For some, memories of that day that changed everything are immensely more personal because they were there in New York, Washington, or Pennsylvania. One such story was of a firefighter, whose story was published on the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary almost 12 years ago. He would be responsible for walking with those serving in situations that many of us could barely imagine. Yet, as a man of faith, the gift of his relationship with Christ would carry him forward:

Ralph Esposito was a 10-year veteran firefighter with the New York Fire Department and just assigned on Sept. 10, 2001, to the Counseling Unit for his day tours.

"I was involved right from the start," Esposito said. "I spent 10 months, three to four days a week, talking to the guys while they were digging up body parts. I dug up my own share of body parts too."

In the weeks and months since the attack, he saw "a lot of human suffering, a lot of families broken up. Kids looking for fathers, mothers looking for sons."

Aside from civilians who worked in the World Trade

Center who could not escape the collapsing towers, 343 members of the Fire Department perished in the disaster.

But Esposito also saw a "lot of good.... I've seen a lot of people do great things."

Esposito, who in 2008 was named Man of the Year for the Fire Department of New York Holy Name Society, retired this year [2011]. He teaches youngsters in five CCD classes a week.

"I remember thinking in the early days: How am I going to get through all of this? Days went from 6am to sometimes midnight. I couldn't even get home. But you took it a day at a time. If you put your strength in God, there's no limit."

Before 9/11 people knew Esposito was always a strong believer. "I remember them questioning me: What do you think of God now?" he said.

He answered: "I never asked the 'Why' question. What I found over the years is you ask the 'What' question: What does God want me to get out of this; what am I supposed to learn? Things happen. From an earthly point of view, Job's friends thought he was a sinner. That had nothing to do with Job. So just worry about your salvation. Are your bags packed? Ready to go? That's what I got out of 9/11."\*

Despite the trials and tribulations we face, let us all put our strength in God. Let us allow Him to lead so that we be sustained in this life and be with Him in the next.

#### A Message from our Bishop

My dear friends in Christ,

Why is support for Catholic schools part of the mission of every Catholic, not just that of parents with children in our schools? After all, this is not the late-19th century or early-20th century America, a time when Catholic children of immigrant families faced many obstacles when entering public schools.

A simple sign hangs in every Catholic school: "Christ is the reason for this school." Let us not be fooled. To practice and pass on an authentic Catholic faith in the classroom is becoming increasingly necessary in our society. We are called to be instruments of evangelization in society by being witnesses to the love of God.

We often hear that many community and business leaders in Central Massachusetts are products of Catholic schools. Their alma maters did not boast the fanciest buildings, or the most expansive after-school programs, or even the flexibility to express one's individuality in daily attire. What they did offer and continue to offer to this day, is attention to the individual student, sound academic and social formation and, most importantly, being formed in the Catholic faith (or in Catholic values for those of other faiths) in order to learn what true success in life really means beyond how to make money.

Each year we remind ourselves that religion is not just one topic among others in Catholic schools. The relevance of our faith can be discussed in the context of every single topic taught in our classrooms, including science, math, history, literature and languages. Faith is also a guiding force in after-school programs, sports and the arts. The Catholic school student learns that to live the good life is to live a life filled with meaning, which is not the same as living a life focused on self-indulgence or self-importance.

We recognize how difficult it is for many parents to pay tuition while often paying taxes that support public schools, but they know they are investing in their child's future, both temporal and eternal. For many families, especially new immigrant families, increased access to financial aid is the only way they can consider a Catholic school. It takes everyone sharing in solidarity with our Catholic school families.

What more can you do? Talk to family and friends about the value of the Catholic school option in our communities. Support their decision to choose a Catholic school. And, never forget the power of prayer to support the work of our teachers, administrators and staff who are dedicated to the ministry of Catholic school education, a ministry which makes tangible the love of Jesus in the life of each student they encounter.

Thank you for considering prayerfully how support of Catholic schools, in whatever way you can, will help today's students become tomorrow's leaders in both society and the Church.
