

God calls us to nurture and develop the gifts He has given us and then generously return a portion with increase. He doesn't want us to waste or hoard the gifts He has given us. He expects us to grow our gifts, to use them wisely, and to be generous with them. Unfortunately, many of us are not generous in proportion to all that God has given us. God asks us to be generous with all our gifts, especially the one that means the most to you.

A Message from our Pastor

Dear Friends,

As we enter this Thanksgiving week, I am grateful to God for what he sometimes permits in my life — the things I don't want. What I mean by this is that sometimes, as we all know, the Lord allows us to go through things we wouldn't have chosen for ourselves. Many times in the past, I'd try to run from them. But I find myself more today offering the challenges of life back to the Lord in two ways: First, for all the things I can't control, I say from my heart, "You take care of it," as he asks in the *Surrender Novena*, and let Him move things according to His Will. Second, I ask Him for the things in my control, "Let it be done according to your will." For this to come about, I must let my heart be affected by His Grace at work within (easier said than done). For that to happen in each of us means we must not go through the motions, but each day, we must give our "yes" to God and wholeheartedly let ourselves be transformed.

It can be tempting to think that if we pray the Rosary every day we are instantly holy.

Similarly, if we fast from meat every Friday of the year, it doesn't not mean that we are devout Catholics.

Performing outward religious acts is certainly an important part of being Christian, but it does not immediately mean that we will go to Heaven.

St. Francis de Sales explains this idea in his book Introduction to the Devout Life:

One man sets great value on fasting, and believes himself to be leading a very devout life, so long as he fasts rigorously, although the while his heart is full of bitterness;— and while he will not moisten his lips with wine, perhaps not even with water, in his great abstinence, he does not scruple to steep them in his neighbour's blood, through slander and detraction.

Another man reckons himself as devout because he **repeats many prayers daily**, although at the same time he does not refrain



from all manner of angry, irritating, conceited or insulting speeches among his family and neighbors. This man **freely opens his purse** in almsgiving, **but closes his heart** to all gentle and forgiving feelings towards those who are opposed to him; while that one is ready enough to forgive his enemies, but will never pay his rightful debts save under pressure.

St. Francis de Sales further points out that "all these people are conventionally called religious, but nevertheless they are in no true sense really devout."

Recipe for holiness


The key to being holy lies not in performing many religious actions with an empty heart.

Instead, we are called to give to God our whole being, body and soul. Our actions must be followed-up by a tender heart, a heart on fire with God's love.

If we do pray the Rosary every day, we must let the prayer penetrate our heart and soften it, so that we will help a neighbor in need.

Saint Cecilia | November 22

Saint Cecilia's story, like many of the earliest saints', is largely apocryphal and legendary in nature. According to tradition, Cecilia was born to a wealthy and prominent Roman family.

Though she had consecrated her virginity to the Lord, she was married to a man named Valerian. It is said that she was "singing in her heart to the Lord" at her wedding. She confessed her promise of virginity to her new husband revealing that an angel protected her. Valerian would honor her vow only if he too could see the angel. Cecilia told him he would see the angel if he was baptized, which he went to do immediately. When he returned to her, he saw the angel beside her. Cecilia also converted Valerian's brother, Tiburtius.

Unfortunately, it was a turbulent time in Rome for Christians. Valerian and Tiburtius were martyred for burying the bodies of Christians, which was illegal. Cecilia was also targeted for her faith. First authorities attempted to suffocate by locking her in the bath in her home and overheating the room. Some accounts say that she didn't break a sweat and even began to sing. They then sent in an executioner to behead her, but he faltered and was unable to complete his task, only succeeding in mortally wounding her. She remained alive for three days before she died.

The saint's body was exhumed twice, first by Pope Paschal I in 821, then by Cardinal Sfondrato in 1599. Both times her body was found incorrupt, the first saint to exhibit this extremity. St. Cecilia is the patron saint of music and musicians.


