MESSAGE FROM BISHOP FABBRO

"I am here by extending the dispensation from the Sunday obligation, including the solemnities of the Nativity of the Lord and Mary, Mother of God, until Easter. It seems unlikely that our situation with respect to the Covid-19 pandemic will change in the near future."

DEACON'S PEN

In our Gospel, we encounter John baptizing people in the Jordan River. The Pharisees sent officials to find out who John was. John responded to the officials - "I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way of the Lord,' as the prophet Isaiah said." (John 1:23).

The "work" that John was referring to is work that must be done within each person's heart and mind. If all we had to do was go out into the wilderness and make a straight path for the Lord, that would be easy, and many people would figure out how to do that.

Putting on the mind of Christ, seeing through His eyes, feeling through His heart, learning to respond to the world with Jesus wholeness and healing love (What Would Jesus Do?) are <u>absolutely life changing</u>. Life changing for us and for every person we meet. When we truly do "put on the heart and mind of Christ", others will be positively impacted by their interaction with us! This is the work of an entire lifetime.

Our responsibility is to prepare ourselves well to participate in a genuine personal relationship with Jesus. We do this through <u>daily</u> prayer (contemplative prayer as well as other forms of prayer); reading and praying over <u>Sacred Scripture</u>; reaching out in genuine love to our neighbour (the 14 Charitable Works of Mercy); <u>daily examining our consciences</u>; <u>confessing our sins</u>, <u>our faults and our failings</u>; <u>asking for forgiveness</u>; <u>and actively seeking to grow in genuine Faith</u>, <u>Hope</u>, <u>and Love!</u>

Especially when we are unable to participate in the celebration of Mass and Holy Communion, it is important that we make regular Spiritual Communions, preferably several times throughout each day!

There are also 3 exclamatory prayers that are most efficacious throughout the year:

Jesus, I trust in You! (pray 3 times)

Lord Jesus Christ have mercy on me, a sinner! (pray 3 times)

<u>Let it be done unto me according to Your Word,</u>
<u>O Lord!</u> (pray 3 times)

I pray that this Advent truly is a time of genuine Christian transformation for people everywhere! **He** is coming, are you ready?

May our Risen Lord richly bless + you and all those you love!

GENERAL ABSOLUTION

During the COVID Pandemic Bishop Fabbro has granted permission to our priests to celebrate the Rite of General Absolution since we are not all able to attend individual confession. We will be holding a General Absolution Service after each Mass on the weekend of December 19 and 20.

In a general absolution service, Catholics are absolved from their sins without confessing them individually to the priest. It differs from the communal penance service held in many parishes every Advent and Lent, during which penitents gather together for common prayer, confess their sins individually to a priest, and receive absolution from him individually as well.

The Church permits general absolution in cases of danger of death or when "enough confessors are [not] available to hear the individual confessions properly within a reasonable time" (Rite of Penance, 31b). The Church has in mind a chronic condition here, for example in mission territories, where a priest may visit only occasionally, and penitents risk being without the grace of reconciliation for a long time. General absolution is not lawful "when nonavailability of confessors is based solely on there being a large number of penitents, such as may be the case at some great festival or pilgrimage" (RP. 31b).

Only the bishop may judge whether lawful conditions exist. The priest who wishes to hold a service of general confession and absolution needs the bishop's permission. If this is not possible, he should inform the bishop as soon as possible about the need and the absolution he gave (32)

Nevertheless, penitents who receive general absolution for mortal sin are obliged to confess it individually as soon as possible.

The liturgy begins with Introductory Rites and Liturgy of the Word. Then the people kneel or bow and make a general confession of sins, like the formula we use at Mass. "I confess to almighty God."

A litany or song may follow, and then all pray the Lord's prayer. The priest then gives absolution over the whole group of sinners, and all sing a song of praise.

LAST DATE FOR 2020 DONATIONS

The last date you can donate for your 2020 income tax receipt for any of the parishes is Thursday, December 31 until 12:00 noon as the office closes at 12:00. If any donations come into the office after December 31, they will be included in your 2021 income tax receipt.

Here is a direct quote from CRA concerning donations:

What is a donation?

The date of donation is the date the gift is actually received by the charity. However, when a charity receives a donation by mail, the Canada Revenue Agency considers the date of donation to be the date of the postmark on the envelope. The charity should keep the stamped envelope as part of its books and records.

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



In the musical "Man of La Mancha," when Dulcinea asks Don Quixote what it means to "follow his quest," he responds by singing "The Impossible Dream." Mary, who awaited the birth of Jesus some 2,000 years ago just as we do this Advent, could have written the song. She certainly lived it.



Imagine how young Mary —probably no more than 15 or 16 years old—must have felt upon receiving the news that the impossible was about to take place within her, that she would give birth to the Savior. How could she tell her betrothed, Joseph? What would her family think? Who would believe her?

"Do not be afraid, Mary," the angel says to her. "Nothing will be impossible with God" (Luke 1:30, 37). We know the rest of the story. The impossible was indeed made possible, not only at the birth of Jesus, but in the many miracles he performed, and most of all at his Resurrection. If God could accomplish all this, imagine what God can do in your own life. Advent is the season for imagining what is possible, for dreaming new dreams, for hoping beyond hope.

But it is also the season when hope can be hardest to find, dreams hardest to believe. The days draw short, the nights are long and the air turns. Expenses may loom at a time when resources are scarce. Separation, grief, loneliness, and depression are no strangers to the season. Hope may be in short supply during this time. We need Mary's inspiring example of courage and trust in the face of uncertainty more than ever.

Mary can't guarantee us a smooth ride, however. Look at her own difficult journey: first, she had to travel to Bethlehem late in her pregnancy (Luke 2:1-6). Have you ever tried riding a donkey? Now imagine doing so nine month's pregnant! Later, she had to flee to Egypt with Joseph and the baby when their lives were in danger (Matthew 2:13-23).

Nor can Mary promise us a season free of anxiety and worry. Imagine how she must have worried about what was ahead for her beloved child as his messianic destiny was revealed to her, first by shepherds who left her pondering the news in her heart (Luke 2:16-19), then at the Temple by the prophet Simeon, who spoke to her of the sorrowful times ahead: "A sword will pierce your soul too" (Luke 2:22-35).

What Mary can offer us is a remarkable and inspiring example of courage in the face of adversity, patience in the face of uncertainty, and hope beyond hope that the impossible is indeed possible.

Mary stood with her son as he was crucified (John 19:25-27); she stood with his fearful followers who huddled after his death (Acts 1:13-14). She knew that the story wasn't over yet. And she was right.

Our story isn't finished, either, no matter what challenges or wounds burden us this season. All things remain possible with God. This is the miracle of Advent. We can once again dream the impossible dream—and reach the unreachable star.

According to Your Will: Mary's "Yes" and Ours


In the Gospel of Luke, Mary says yes to angel Gabriel, who asks her to bear God's son. And she does so in perfect freedom. As do we—in our own lives. God meets us in myriad ways, through nature, through prayer, especially through people "For Christ plays in the ten thousand places, lovely in eyes and limbs not his," as the Jesuit poet Gerard Manley Hopkins wrote. God invites us to join him, he invites us to follow him, he invites us to create with him.

But the decision is always up to us. We are free to say yes or no to God.

With her yes, Mary partners herself with the Almighty and is empowered to bring Christ into the world. This world-changing yes is what St. Bernard speaks of in one of his sermons on Mary: "Answer with a word, receive the Word of God. Speak your own word, conceive the divine Word. Breathe a passing word, embrace the eternal Word."

With our own *yes* to God's voice in our lives we are also asked to nurture the word of God within us and bring Christ into the world—certainly not in the same way that Mary was, but in our own situations, and in our own ways. Using our own talents and graces we are called to bring Christ into the lives of others.

In describing the arc of the conversation between Gabriel and Mary, the Gospel of Luke perfectly describes the arc of the spiritual life: God initiates the conversation; we are initially hesitant and fearful; we seek to understand God's word in our life; God reminds us of our experience, and, free to choose, if we say yes to God, we are able to bring new life into the world.






Announcement on Wearing Masks


We are taking every reasonable precaution to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in our churches and protect parishioners. There are reports from parishes across the diocese of people claiming a mask exemption but who would not have a valid exemption. Those who attend Mass or other services without a mask and without a valid exemption are violating provincial COVID-19 restrictions and putting fellow parishioners at risk. Masks are to remain in place during the entire time of the Mass.

The Catholic Church has earned the trust of provincial officials with our WorshipSafe guidelines, but if we do not consistently implement them, we may be subject to more stringent scrutiny or church closures.

Starting January 1 2021, if you have a medical exemption for wearing a mask, then you will be required to present documentation to the pastor to enter a church in the Diocese of London. We will still ask that you wear a mask briefly to enter and exit and to receive Communion. Those with the mask exemption will be seated in a designated area.

Those who refuse to comply with this diocesan regulation will be asked to leave and will not be permitted to attend Mass until they agree to wear a mask.
