UPDATE FROM BISHOP FABBRO

As directed by the Province of Ontario, as well as Bishop Fabbro, beginning December 26, all Masses and parish activities are cancelled until further notice.

Bishop Fabbro's update can be found on the Diocesan website at www.dol.ca. Look under "Covid-19 Update from Bishop Fabbro - update #15".

Please note that as of January 29, Bishop Fabbro extended the dispensation from the Sunday obligation until the end of the Easter Season; that is, up to and including Pentecost Sunday (May 23).



As of 11 am on February 9, the Chatham-Kent Public Health Unit website advised that the Province-wide "Stay at home" order will end in Chatham-Kent on Tuesday, February 16. The website also advised that, "Beginning, **February 17th**, an updated colour coded system will be implemented."

This means that we will most likely not know what "colour level" the Regional Municipality of Chatham-Kent will be in until after 9 am on Wednesday February 17 - Ash Wednesday. The "colour level" determines what degree of "reopening" will be authorized within Chatham-Kent.

Your Pastoral Team can not make any credible plans to reopen Masses until we know the colour level. Even then, we will require direction from Bishop Fabbro, and then time to organize and schedule the necessary Pastoral Team, Staff, and Volunteers at each worship site. These Volunteers, in conjunction with the Pastoral Team and Staff are vital to our ability to safely reopen our worship sites. The health and safety of everyone is first and foremost our primary concern.

Rest assured that whatever plans we make regarding reopening Masses within the Chatham Catholic Family of Parishes will be made with this firmly in our minds. In the interim, especially as we prepare to enter the Season of Lent, please take advantage of the various Lenten resources that are being made available for all of us. May this Season of Lent be a time of true repentance and conversion for Christians everywhere.

Today's gospel reading about Jesus touching the man with leprosy made me think about how the disciples might have been shocked and deeply moved by Jesus' actions. Jesus didn't even bother to purify himself after touching the man as the Mosaic Law demanded. What was Jesus thinking of? I suspect that Jesus was showing us that if he can touch this unclean man, this sinner, this outcast, then, we, too, can touch, welcome and even embrace the outcasts that we encounter.

This gospel is challenging all of us to look at the outcast in our society-

- 1. The Outcast in our Families, maybe they are our children or other relatives that we have thrown out of our lives for a number of reasons.
- 2. The Outcasts in our Workplaces, especially the ones who are difficult to work with.
- 3. The Outcasts in our Community, the transients, the poor on the street, those with emotional problems, those in nursing homes, etc.
- 4. The Outcasts in our Schools, those who are alone or made fun of because they are different.

Jesus is asking us to reach out to them. You and I both know the touch of our full presence, our smile, our kind and gentle words have the power of touch, the power of healing.

I had an experience a few years ago when a man infected by the AIDS virus came to me for help in getting food from Chatham Outreach for Hunger. He told me that he had AIDS and needed some high protein foods. After I assisted him, I reached out, gave him a handshake and wished him well. You should have seen the smile and response that I got from him.

Jesus came into this world and left his imprint on everything he touched- even death. When my time is up, I want to be able to say Jesus to make me clean and if he chooses, he can make me clean again. Hopefully Jesus will touch me and say, "I do choose. Be made clean."

Invite each of your family members to write a daily prayer and place it in the box. If children are too young to use words, let them draw a picture. At the end of each day, gather around your special prayer box and ask God to hear your prayers. If you need to say you are sorry to anyone in your family, tell them. Say the 'Our Father' together.



FASTING



So often we seem to go to God with only our needs and worries. Being homebound for so long this past year, families may be getting on each others nerves. Maybe this Lent, your family can fast from complaining and concentrate on being grateful for the blessings you see each day. Get a big glass or plastic jar, Each day, invite your family members to write one thing they are grateful for and put it in the jar. On Easter morning, open up your gratitude jar together and take turns reading all the things you thanked God for during those 40 days. You might decide to continue doing this during the Easter season!

SELF-GIVING

Part of growing closer to Jesus is learning to be an intentional disciple. That means we do things for others and God out of love. Lent is a time to look at where we are selfish in our lives. Discuss with your family how each of you can reach out to others without expecting anything in return. Read to a sibling, help a neighbour, set aside money from takeout and have a simple meal instead and give the money to the food bank, donate clothes and toys in good condition to goodwill, turn off the TV and talk to each other. Each time a family member does a good deed, drop some jelly beans in a container. On Easter morning, enjoy the jelly beans together.

Can you believe Lent is here already? It seems like not that long ago I was decorating a Christmas tree! Time waits for no one and that is why it is important to make a mindful commitment now to not let this Lenten season pass you by. It is a great time to focus on growing as an everyday steward. Mardi Gras ∼ Dare I empty myself?

Question: Carnivale and Mardi Gras celebrations are linked to Ash Wednesday, Lent, fast and abstinence. Can you tell us more about the connections between these events?

Answer: Ash Wednesday is the beginning of the forty days known as Lent. Every year, Christians highlight this penitential season as a time of self-examination, reformation of one's life, and continued development of a deeper spiritual life. The recommended practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving become the focus of Lenten activity and ritual. Each of these spiritual practices is aimed at personal discipline as well as continued concern for the other, especially the poor or alienated.

Forty days is a symbolic biblical period of time, during which personal transformation occurs and out of which people surface as more spiritual, ready to carry out God's mission. Relying on God's providence and care, no matter how difficult life becomes, is crucial to Lenten spirituality. Fasting was initially stricter, permitting only one simple meal a day without meat, fish, or other delicacies. Such things were not even allowed in the house.

In order to prepare for this in an age of no refrigeration, people gathered to consume whatever was not allowed during Lent. This led to parties or celebrations originally referred to as Carnivale, literally meaning "goodbye to meat," or Mardi Gras, literally meaning "Fat Tuesday." The eating and celebrating ended on the Tuesday just before Ash Wednesday. Today we focus more on moderation in all things, as well as a strong concern the poor. ©LPi

Ash Wednesday ~ Fasting with Jesus

Question: During non-COVID times why would we normally place ashes on our forehead each Ash Wednesday?

Answer: Ashes are rich in spiritual symbolism. We recall in the second chapter of Genesis, when the human person is fashioned "out of the dust of the ground" and receives the breath of life (Genesis 2:7). In death, a person returns to the ground from which we came. The ancient Hebrews used ashes as a sign of repentance, reminding themselves that God is God and we are not.

As the minister places ashes on our forehead, we hear either "remember that you are dust and unto dust you shall return" or "turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." When we receive ashes, we remember our own mortality. We're reminded that we have limited time on this earth and we ought to make the best use of it that we can! People are in need of love, care, and compassion. We all need to continually rediscover the love of God. The Gospel invites every person in every stage of life to encounter and imitate Jesus here and now. The forty days of Lent are the perfect time to assess our own awareness of these realities. ©LPi

Recognize God in Ordinary Moments

Have you ever taken a nature walk? Have you leisurely strolled through a forest or field, with no real destination in mind and your only objective being receptivity to and observation of all God's creation?

Sometimes, Scripture readings can feel like a nature walk. All of salvation history plays out against the backdrop of the natural world, with all elements of God's creation — plants and animals and the dust of the earth itself — turning in a supporting performance. How about Jesus in the hot and dusty desert, tempted, living "among the wild beasts?" Noah departed from his ark with the animals he rescued, observing God's sign in the very clouds of the sky. Even God Himself, offering us salvation from original sin through the waters of baptism.

How often do we remember that God speaks to us through all of His creation, even in the unlikeliest suspects?

Let's go back to the nature walk. It sounds like a lovely way to pass an afternoon, amongst wildflowers and butterflies, but don't forget the beating hot sun, mosquitos, and threat of rain on the horizon. Remember, we're not in heaven yet. Here on earth, God may be present in His creation, but that doesn't mean it's always easy to endure.

Lent is, essentially, a time to listen for the voice of God in places we may not expect: the mild irritations you experience when you're craving the chocolate you gave up, or the dull pangs of hunger during the Ash Wednesday fast. It's a golden opportunity to see the divine hand in all of creation, even those unlikely suspects.

48. How does the Church express her trinitarian faith?

The Church expresses her trinitarian faith by professing a belief in the oneness of God in whom there are three Persons: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The three divine Persons are only one God because each of them equally possesses the fullness of the one and indivisible divine nature. They are really distinct from each other by reason of the relations which place them in correspondence to each other. The Father generates the Son; the Son is generated by the Father, the Holy Spirit proceeds from the Father and the Son. Further reading: CCC 249-256, 266

49. How do the three divine persons work?

Inseparable in their one substance, the three divine Persons are also inseparable in their activity. The Trinity is one operation, sole and the same. In this one divine action, however, each Person is present according to the mode which is proper to Him in the Trinity.

"O my God, my Trinity whom I adore . . . Grant my soul peace; make it your heaven, your beloved dwelling, and the place of your rest. May I never abandon you there, but may I be there, whole and entire, completely vigilant in my faith, entirely adoring, and wholly given over to your creative action." We taking every reasonable precaution to prevent the spread of COVID-19 in our churches and protect



parishioners. Those who attend Mass or other services without a mask and without a valid exemption are violating municipal and provincial COVID-19 restrictions and putting fellow parishioners at risk.

Per Bishop Fabbro, starting January 1, 2021, if you have a medical exemption for wearing a mask, you will be required to bring to the pastor evidence from your physician, nurse practitioner, social worker, psychologist or occupational, respiratory or physical therapist attesting to your condition. Once you do so, you will be provided a document to bring to Mass each time. When you register for Mass, please let them know you have been granted an exemption, so that you can be seated in a designated area.

We will still ask that you wear a mask briefly to enter and exit and to receive Communion, unless your disability prevents you from doing so. Those who refuse to comply with this diocesan regulation will be asked to leave and will not be permitted to attend Mass until they agree to wear a mask.

We are aware that this new protocol does go beyond the requirements in most health unit orders and local by-laws, but they are required to protect the safety of our parishioners, parish teams and volunteers while on church property. Infections continue to increase in our communities and small sacrifices like wearing a mask can slow the transmission of the virus, and are a sign of our love for our neighbours and help prevent people from taking advantage of the exemptions for personal reasons.

Please note that face shields and/or plastic masks are not an appropriate replacement for a face mask. From the Ontario.ca website regarding face shields:

Face shields do not replace masks or face coverings.

A face shield is used to protect the eyes of the person wearing it. Using a face shield without a mask won't protect:

- You from potentially inhaling infectious respiratory droplets exhaled by others
- Others from your infectious respiratory droplets, as they can escape around the face shield

HOW TO DONATE TO THE CHATHAM CATHOLIC FAMILY OF PARISHES

E-TRANSFER

Create the e-transfer and in the comment/note area, please indicate your envelope number or your address and which fund you are donating to, such as Sunday Offertory, Easter, Building, Share Lent etc.

No password is needed as the parishes are set up for autodeposit.

CHEQUE

If you do not use online banking, you can mail a cheque to the office. Please make your cheque payable to the particular parish and on the memo line, indicate which fund you are donating to. Please mail it to:

PAD (Pre-Authorized Debit)

If you wish to set up PAD, you won't have to worry about remembering to bring your envelope to Mass or be concerned that you can't donate because you can't attend Mass, such as our current situation.

There is a form available on the website (www.ccfp.dol.ca/how-to-donate or click Giving/How to Donate on the top menu). You can print off the form and fill it out and either scan the form and a void cheque and email it (using the email addresses above), or mail the form and void cheque to the office (using the address indicated above). Please note for this method, the form must be received before the 15th of the month in order to take effect the next month.



PLENTY - DONATING ONLINE

Parishioners and visitors can make donations online using a computer, laptop, tablet or any mobile device, using your Visa and Mastercard (credit card, as well as Visa and Mastercard debit cards) for any type of donation. This includes both one-time donations and recurring donations. We have been working with a team of experts from Pllenty Inc. to develop this capability.

Getting Started Is Easy

•Using your mobile device's camera, scan the QR code (see codes below with the particular parish name you wish to donate to), and simply follow the instructions on the screen to make your donation. If you have an older Android smartphone, you may have to install a scanning app — newer androids and all iPhones will scan without the scanning app. You will quickly be directed to the web application.

OR

•On your computer or electronic device, go to Chatham Catholic Family of Parishes website: www.ccfp.dol.ca, then choose the How to Donate button on the home screen, or on the top menu, click Giving/How to Donate, and follow the instructions for the particular parish you wish to donate to.

You will have the option to choose where your donation will go, such as Regular Sunday Offertory, Christmas, Building etc. You can also add a comment. Any funds donated through Pllenty will be part of your annual tax receipt from the parish.

There is no fee to make your donation using this service. Pllenty Inc. runs on Amazon Web services and meets strict Payment Card Industry Data Security Standards (PCI DDS) for service providers.

This option is currently not available for Our Lady of Victory Parish.

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
