Dear Parish Family,

Admittedly, when I was a little boy, some of the worst words to wake up to were: "Freddie, wake up! We have to go to Mass this morning!" "Today? On a Wednesday?" "Yes, it's a Holy Day of Obligation." "Terrific, that means the Church is making us go to Mass in the middle of the week. Does that mean we can skip on Sunday?" "Of course not! We're still going to Mass on Sunday, now get up and get ready!"

Friends, a holy day of obligation is a type of solemnity. In the Church, solemnities are special days when we reflect on a particular mystery of our faith or remember a particular saint. The holy days of obligation are solemnities that have something distinctive about them: they're so important that the Church asks us to attend Mass on these days, even if they do not necessarily fall on a Sunday. Far too often, we as Catholics, tend to focus all of our attention on the "obligation" part. We think of all the things that occupy our time, all the things that we need to do, all the things we would rather do, and wonder why on earth the Church chooses these seemingly random days to demand more of our time. At least, that's how my young childhood mind use to think. I also know that there are many adults who think the way I use to...after all, I see the attendance on holy days.

If you can relate to this sentiment at all, I would like to propose something that will hopefully change your mindset towards our holy days of obligation, as it changed mine. I will not deny that holy days involve obligations: the Church does expect us to attend Mass on those days. However I propose, as the Church does, that they are much more than that. At their core, they are celebrations, not obligations. The Church is not merely demanding that we "go to Mass." The Church is demanding that we celebrate! You even see this in the name itself. We derive our word holiday from the concept of a "holy" day, and so a "holy day" of obligation is really a "holiday" of obligation.

Therefore, we attend Mass on these days to rejoice! At the heart of Christianity is the belief that we have something to rejoice over: namely, our salvation in Christ! The Church invites us to Mass on these holy days to remind us of this reason to rejoice. If we allow ourselves to go about our time distracted from this truth, we're forgetting the most important thing, the thing most worth celebrating. The Church isn't telling us, "Go to Mass so you can pay your debt"; it's telling us, "Your debt has been paid! Go to Mass and celebrate!"

Dear family, with this perspective, holy days of obligation become a gift. We must take a step back from all our worries and preoccupations to remember what is good, joyous, and true. We must celebrate, not so that we can "get away from it all," but so that we can get back to it all, returning to everything that matters most. Should you want to add these festivals to your calendars now, then here are the six holy days of obligation: January I - Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, Thursday of the sixth week of Easter - Solemnity of Christ's Ascension into Heaven, August 15th - Solemnity of Mary's Assumption into Heaven, November I - Solemnity of all Saints, December 8th - Solemnity of Mary's Immaculate Conception, December 25th - Christmas, Christ's birthday.

So what are these holy days? Christmas has been celebrated since the beginning of the Church, but so has the Ascension. Since the fourth century, this holy day has commemorated Christ's "Ascension" into Heaven forty days after His Resurrection. This day reminds us of the reality of Heaven: our Kingdom is not of this world, and one day we'll follow Jesus to His Heavenly Kingdom.

Three of these holy days focus on Mary, Jesus' mother. The Immaculate Conception commemorates Mary's being conceived without sin, a special grace that was offered other by virtue of her being Christ's future mother. The Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, celebrates her motherhood and her role in salvation history. The Assumption commemorates her being received body and soul into Heaven, much like Jesus. These three days therefore celebrate her entire life, from conception to Heaven.

Finally, there's All Saints' Day (which is coming up...\*wink wink\*). On this day, we celebrate all the saints who serve as models to teach us the way to the Kingdom of Heaven. However, we also celebrate more than that: a saint is someone who we believe is in Heaven, whether or not the Church has declared them a saint. If you have a relative or friend who has passed away, consider the day as celebrating their eternal life in the Lord too! If you're a pessimist like me, and you're not as convinced that all of your loved ones are in Heaven yet, then consider coming to Mass on November 2nd - All Souls Day, even though it is not a holy day of obligation, it's a wonderful day to pray for the repose of the souls of all the faithful departed and to trust in the power of intercessory prayer and the overwhelming mercy of Almighty God.

As you can see my friends, each of the holy days of obligation center around joyous Good News: the Word has become flesh, through Mary, to offer us life in the Kingdom of Heaven. Surely this is news worth celebrating!

Finally, we at North American Martyrs parish have another reason to celebrate! Our patronal feast day is rapidly approaching! Starting this Monday evening at 6:30p.m., we will begin our second annual Novena in honor of the North American Martyrs. I have personally invited some of the finest preachers from across our diocese to share in this time of parish retreat and renewal. Please remember that each of these priests are extremely busy with their respective ministerial roles in our diocese. They have so generously and graciously afforded us their precious time to celebrate with us, in order that we may more prayerfully meditate on the tremendous sacrifices our parish patron saints have made to enhance the Kingdom of Heaven on earth. It is my fervent hope and prayer that each one of us will be captivated and fall deeper in love with the magnificent reality of Love, that they so generously shared with the world!

I know that all of us are busy and live extremely hectic lives. However, as I aforementioned above, we must dedicate time to God, and celebrate in the reality of His Love for us! After all, that is the only thing that matters. Please consider coming to as many of the evening novena Masses that you possibly can. You would give your pastor a tremendous gift if he saw as many of you each evening as possible. As an aside, if you plan on missing any of the evenings, skip the first one...that guy talks too much and in my opinion, really isn't worth listening to anyway! I hope to see you all and celebrate this reality: "The blood of the martyrs is the seed of the Church." - St. Tertullian.
