




Trick-Or-Treat




This weekend our food pantry is seeking donations of: pasta sauce.

Dear Parish Family,

Last weekend, during the course of my homily, I referred to the Catholic Church as the "New Vineyard", which bestows grace by means of the seven Sacraments. After Mass, many people asked me to elaborate further on this notion of grace. With this reflection, I will attempt to do precisely that.

Grace is indeed a term that is mentioned quite often in the life of the Church, and yet I propose that if you were to ask a room full of practicing Catholics exactly what grace is, you would be met with silence and more than a few puzzled looks. Grace is one of those things that we only seem to have a sense of when we experience it, or when we have no other way of explaining some good in our lives.

Perhaps the most apropos, succinct definition of grace is found in the Catechism of the Catholic Church: "a participation in the life of God" (para. 1997). In other words, it is a "sharing in" or a "tapping into" God's own Divine Life. This participation is something that we should all eagerly strive for!

At the heart of the concept of grace is the recognition that it is a purely gratuitous gift. While we can avail ourselves to this gift (for example, through prayer and the seven sacraments), it cannot be purchased or earned. I think Catholics, in particular, can fall into the trap of thinking of God as a proverbial "vending machine" of grace. We attend Mass on the weekends and holy days of obligation, we place our monetary offerings in the collection basket, we say our prayers, we do kind and charitable works for our brothers and sisters around us, and then we expect God to give us our grace. In the event that we do not receive grace (or we fail to immediately recognize the grace that has been bestowed), we kick the "machine", grumble to ourselves and walk away feeling as if we have been ripped off.

However, my friends, Almighty God is not a vending machine and "owes" us nothing. With that being said, it is most certainly God's nature to love us. Grace therefore, is an expression or an overflowing of that love in our lives! You see it has more to do with who God is, than anything we have done or could possibly ever do.

Now this touches on a very important aspect of Catholic theology, namely, "merit". However, even here the Catechism states, "With regard to God, there is no strict right to any merit on the part of man... for we have received everything from [God], our Creator. The merit of man before God in the Christian life arises from the fact that God has freely chosen to associate mankind with the work of His grace. The fatherly action of God is first on His own initiative, and then follows man's free acting through his collaboration, so that the merit of good works is to be attributed in the first place to the grace of God, then to the faithful" (CCC, paras. 2007-2008). In other words, even my hopefully generous response to God's gift of grace, is itself the working of grace, a gift from God. Therefore, the only adequate response is thanksgiving, which also happens to be the meaning of the word "Eucharist".

The Church further distinguishes between "sanctifying grace" and "actual grace." Sanctifying grace (received at baptism) is a "stable and supernatural" disposition," whereas actual grace refers to particular "interventions" of God (cf. CCC, para. 2000). Think of sanctifying grace as being "plugged in," like a lamp in your living room. As long as you have power (and with God there always is), the grace is "flowing." Actual graces are like "pulses" that enable certain things to happen when needed, like God "turning on the lamp."

Undoubtedly, I have given you a lot to ponder about grace, and admittedly, this does not even begin to scratch the surface. However, I hope that it helps us, as we all strive to accept and open ourselves to the invitation of God's divine grace!




