

Dear Parish Family,

During this weekend when we celebrate fatherhood, in particular our own fathers, it might be well to examine how Saint Joseph carried out his parental responsibilities. We do not know a lot about him, but what we do know can give us glimpses of his role as the earthly father of Jesus.

I think many artists have inadvertently missed the mark in their renditions of St. Joseph. Too often paintings of the Holy Family show Mary's husband as an old man with a white beard standing by a young woman and her baby son. Somehow I doubt that God would entrust his dear son, Jesus to someone who had already lived most of his life and was old enough to be Mary's father. I would like to believe that Jesus was born to a young couple whose deep love taught him about the great commandment and how to live. Jesus needed a father who would teach him to be a man of God. Mary needed a husband with who would be able to share the responsibility of parenthood.

First of all, St. Joseph was faithful to his promises and commitments. Even when Mary told him she had conceived a child by the Holy Spirit and this child would be the Son of God, he did not abandon her to the punishment of the Jewish authorities. He loved Mary and believed in her and did not want to subject her to violence.

Joseph was a man of faith and, knowing how hard it was for him to fathom what was happening to Mary, God sent an angel to reassure him that the baby truly was for real and he was to be the guardian, the earthly father, of the son of God. It was Joseph's faith and deep trust in Yahweh that enabled him to believe even though he did not understand. It was that same deep faith that would initiate the flight into Egypt where St. Joseph would serve the Holy Family as its protector against the diabolical King Herod who sought to kill the Christ child.

As the scriptures indicate, Joseph was a carpenter. He most certainly worked hard to provide for Jesus and Mary. Even though there is not much is written about Joseph, I envision him as a man of prayer who shared his wisdom with his son and taught him about life. God would only provide the best for his son, Jesus. In essence, we can discern from his actions that he was obedient, loving, kind and generous. We know that he was the very epitome of what a father and husband should be.

We live in a time when masculinity is often frowned upon, when chivalry is swept aside, and when many women scoff at the idea of men doing things for them. However, just because a woman allows a man to help her doesn't mean she lacks strength. Take the Blessed Mother for example! She was incredibly strong, yet she relied on Joseph for support, which is one of the most beautiful facets of their marriage. Joseph was a leader who took care of his family, but Mary was a strong and brave Mother.

In truth, the world needs more men like St. Joseph. However, the world likes to tell us that fathers aren't important or necessary. That is a lie. Fathers are vital to the moral, spiritual, and psychological development of children, and research proves this.

According to the Child and Family Research Partnership at the University of Texas, "Children who grow up with involved fathers are: 39% more likely to earn mostly A's in school. 45% less likely to repeat a grade, 60% less likely to be suspended or expelled from school, twice as likely to go to college and find stable employment after high school, 75% less likely to have a teen birth, and 80% less likely to spend time in jail."

Focus on the Family states: "In an analysis of over 100 studies on parent-child relationships, it was found that having a loving and nurturing father was as important for a child's happiness, well-being, and social and academic success as having a loving and nurturing mother."

Further, research has found that "if a father does not attend church, even if his wife does, only 1 child in 50 will become a regular worshiper. If a father does attend church regularly, regardless of what the mother does, between two-thirds and three-quarters of their children will attend church as adults."

Fathers matter. Fatherhood matters. Strong male leadership within the home makes a huge impact on how children will develop and grow. We need strong men of faith today to make strong men of faith tomorrow.

This weekend let us thank God for the gift of St. Joseph. Let us thank God for the gifts of our own fathers or the men who served as father figures in our lives. And let us strive to not only teach our sons to become more like St. Joseph, but let us encourage our daughters to seek a husband who emulates him!
