PASTOR'S THOUGHTS: August 14-15, 2021

As we all come together to participate with the Celebration of the Eucharist, all are encouraged to **WEAR THEIR MASKS** at Mass and to observe safety protocols. Let's keep everyone safe. Thank you!

This weekend we are celebrating the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. This great solemnity celebrates and bring into a complete cycle the many "firsts" of Mary of Nazareth: first to hear God's plan for His people from an Angel, first to behold the face of God at His nativity, first to hear the fulfillment of God's promise from the lips of Simeon and Anna, first to learn from Jesus what God intends, first witness to His first miracle (at Cana in Galilee), and first to return to God's Kingdom – body and soul. But being "first" for Mary of Nazareth came with a price: "and you, yourself [own heart] a sword will pierce so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." (Lk. 2:35) This statement is well-depicted in the image/statue of Our Lady of Sorrows.

Whenever we hear of being "first," we think of academic excellence, political offices, competitive sports, employment positions, inventions and discoveries, world-breaking records, and so on and so forth. However, in addition to these expected areas where one can be first, there are also areas in life and in faith where one can be "first" as well.

"First" to love, "first" first to forgive, "first" to give are some attributes of God. God is always the initiator of everything. Humanity, by nature, initiates something only when it benefits them or for expected results, with one exception – those things that parents do for their children! But even that sometimes can be argued. Nevertheless, our common experience tells us that God is always the initiator.

What Mary of Nazareth did at the annunciation and thereafter, was uncommon for women of her time and age – she took the risk of being first! Perhaps being uncommon compared to others is what made her "blessed among women" (Gospel of Luke), not because she is special or better than anyone (in her own words, she was just "a

handmaid of the Lord" (Lk 1:38), but because she responded to the Lord's invitation with complete trust – no "if's, may be's, or but's"! And she never looked back afterwards.

Throughout her lifetime, Mary of Nazareth was there "first" for her husband Joseph and her Son, Jesus. After the death of Joseph, she devoted her life to her Son and was the "first" one to witness His first miracle, though I'm sure that made her sad realizing that it was the beginning of His public ministry. From thereon, she has to share Jesus the Christ to all.

Despite this realization and eventual experiences of the Christ in Jesus, Mary of Nazareth followed her Son even before He called by name His disciples to become His apostles. Mary of Nazareth was not even called by name by her own Son! Rather, He referred to her as "woman" at the wedding reception in Cana (John 2:4 = the beginning of John's gospel), and again at His crucifixion in Golgotha before He expired (John 19:26 = the end of John's gospel). Was Jesus being disrespectful of His Mother who was the "first" to love Him on earth? Was He being impersonal and distant from her who was there for Him at all times until death? NOT AT ALL! Jesus called her "woman" in contrast with the first woman (Eve) in the creation story who was part of the downfall of humanity (Genesis 2:22). Mary of Nazareth was the "woman" that the Book of Revelation described as one who "labored to give birth to a Son destined to rule all the nations." Mary of Nazareth for being "first" to unconditionally love and obey God, was the new Eve that delivered God's Son to us, Jesus.

Being "first" then in life and in faith like Mary of Nazareth could also earn us a place in heaven together with the "queen [who] stands at [the] right hand [of God], arrayed in gold" (Resp. Psalm 45), and all other men and women. But we must also be "first," just like God and Mary, to love generously, forgive spontaneously, and follow Jesus wholeheartedly. But be warned: being the "first" in many things in order to get the best place in heaven is not what Jesus meant. But being the "first" at all time as His disciple is what Jesus wants. So, go ahead, be the "first" to love and forgive, give and share and you'll become His disciple.
