#### PASTOR'S THOUGHTS: February 10-11, 2024

Many thanks to all who attended the Public Lecture and Presentation that Dr. Brant Pitre gave on the **Year of the Eucharist** last Thursday, February 8<sup>th</sup> at the Life Center. Father Willie Todd will facilitate a Faith-Sharing Group about Dr. Pitre's Book this Lent. With the funeral services over and the observance of Bishop Dorsonville death now concluded, the whole Diocese of Houma-Thibodaux now goes into the "transition mode" as a Vacant See (Latin: Sede vacante, meaning, "No diocesan Bishop"), as we prepare for the arrival of our next Bishop. The College of Consultors (a group of priests that former Bishop Dorsonville established upon his arrival) together with our Diocesan Administrator, will "run the diocese" until the installation of our next Bishop. I am a part of this College and will continue to assist the Diocesan Administrator in my modified former position as Coordinator for all our priests and permanent deacons (active and retired). Please pray for us as we go through another period of transition and new beginnings! The Prayer for a New Bishop will soon be made available for all to use.

The Sacred Scriptures continues to speak to us this 6<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time during our period of mourning and grief in the death of Bishop Dorsonville. The readings this weekend will speak of "healing" within and out of every person. There are many kinds of healing: healing of physical/physiological ailments, healing of emotional pains, healing of psychological traumas, healing of mental health and anguish, healing from addictions, and the healing of souls.

While the 1<sup>st</sup> reading only mention the lepers and how the Hebrew people would treat them, the gospel of Mark narrates how Jesus took care of them through one act of kindness. During the time of Moses and Jesus, lepers were suffering not only with leprosy but the stains that comes with it, viz., (1) alienation from families, friends, and the whole community, (2) starvation and hardship, (3) emotional anguish, (4) physical pain, and (5) certainty of a painful death.

Jesus knew all about these that is why He was "moved with pity, stretched out His hand, touched him [the leper]," and cured him (Mk. 1:40). What Jesus did was to cure the leper's emotional anguish and alienation, followed by the curing of his physical/physiological condition, and then his spiritual needs. The "wholistic healing" that Jesus provided to the leper is what made the leper "went away and began to publicize the whole matter and spreading it abroad."

While Moses instructed Aaron and the Hebrew people to literally stay away from the leprous and the lepers to keep their distance from the people, Jesus allowed the leper to be close to Him, He spoke to the leper and healed him in more ways than one! Jesus demonstrated in this miracle that God heals us from what we need to be healed, instead of just what we have asked for.

I knew this well from my own experience when I found out I have a tumor growing in my middle ear in my head. When I was told that the surgery could result in any of the following, (1) total loss of hearing in my left ear, (2) possible facial nerve damage, or (3) death (always a possibility in a major surgery), I went on a serious "prayer mode" asking God to heal me. However, I did not asked God to remove the tumor or to heal my middle ear, I asked God to heal me of my fear, disappointment, and lack of trust. I was afraid of the complications and consequences of the surgery, I was disappointed because I wasn't expecting something like this would happen to me who is a priest, and lack of trust because of the uncertainties. Before my surgery, God healed me from all these that I was so ready for surgery to the delight of my doctors! In my period of preparation, I used the words of the psalmist and said, "I turn to you, Lord, in time of trouble, and you fill me with the joy of salvation." (Ps. 32)

As I have mentioned above, there are many kinds of healing: healing of physical/physiological ailments, healing of emotional pains, healing of psychological traumas, healing of mental health and anguish, healing from addictions, and the healing of souls. What kind of healing do you need from the Lord? Once you exactly know which one, like the leper in the gospel story, approach Jesus, kneel before Him and say, "If you wish, you can make me clean!"
