#### PASTOR'S THOUGHTS: March 9-10, 0224

Instructions are posted at all entrances of our church for the Hearing-Aid Wearers who want to use the Wi-fi-Assisted Bluetooth feature. If you need assistance to use the Wi-Fi connection and for the separate independent loop (hearing aid telecoils) devices, please contact or see Father Vic+.

The repairs at our Co-Cathedral Church and buildings damaged by Hurricane Ida that hit our area in 2021, are almost done. Once all the repairs are completed, I will start working on the other projects that's been pending due to a series of interruptions that affected all of us (i.e., Pandemic, Hurricane Ida, changes in diocesan leadership). Watch and pray.

Work around the Bishops' Tombs on the Rectory/Life Center side of our Co-Cathedral Church is in progress. By the time it's done, there will be 3 more available spaces for future use. Just like St. Francis de Sales Cathedral, the Co-Cathedral Church now is also a resting place for the future bishops of our diocese. Please do not forget to stop by Bishop Dorsonville's tomb and offer a prayer for the repose of his soul. I can guarantee you that he will return the favor when your time comes.

This 4th Sunday of Lent is traditionally referred to as "Laetare Dominica" or the Sunday of rejoicing. Taken from the opening lines (Lat., "incipit") of the Book of the Prophet Isaiah (66:10) that says, "Lætare Jerusalem et conventum facite ..." (Rejoice ye with Jerusalem and be glad for her). What is the reason for this invitation? Because the redemption that we await is almost here! This moment of glad rejoicing during the austere season is to remind us that Lent is not all about pain and suffering, sacrifices and penance, sobriety detachments. Rather, that we do all those things because we are preparing for the fulfillment of our redemption that will be the cause of our jubilation; though I must warn y'all the readings for this weekend will not sound "too jubilant" to your hearing!

In the 1<sup>st</sup> reading from the Book of Chronicles, the writer will speak of the infidelities of people of old including the leaders, holier ones down to the common people. When God tried to send down messengers to deal with them, these people treated them badly that resulted in their own demise from their enemies. The story that we will hear from the first reading is about what happens when people turn away from God. In the words of the psalmist: "their tongues will be silenced when they forget God!" (Ps. 137)

The forgetfulness of God's chosen people had been the challenge of many a prophet ("Messengers") that God sent through the centuries. God knew that well that when

He gave the commandments to them through Moses, whose opening word to them was "Hear oh Israel, ..." (in Hebrew "shema") which could mean to listen and to remember. All of God's children are reminded to "hear, listen and remember!"

This is what Jesus was trying to do in the Gospel of John in His address to Nicodemus, a Pharisee and high-ranking member of the Sanhedrin, the Jewish Council of Elders that has religious and civil influence in Judea during the time of Jesus. Jesus was "reminding" this very educated and influential man about something that he should have known ("remembered") all his life! And what was Jesus reminding him of? **One:** God loves His creation and everything in it. Two: that out of this love God gave His only begotten Son NOT to condemn the world but to save it. Three: this redemptive act of God was already known to them through Moses who was instrumental in saving God's people during the serpentplague in the desert. This reality was forgotten by God's chosen ones after they have reached the promised land and established as a nation, a short-term memory they suffer.

St. Paul in his letter to the converts at Ephesus also reminded all his listeners the same reality that he learned from Jesus Christ and the other apostles, viz., the (1) God loves them, (2) the gift of Christ Jesus (3) that saves! (see above parallel). St. Paul encourages the Ephesians NOT to forget these three realities or else they would not be saved.

Just like Nicodemus and the people of old, we have learned many things from our past that affected, influenced, enriched, and formed our faith. Which ones do you remember, and which ones did you forget? If we only remembered those things or aspects that doesn't connect us with God, then we will indeed be sorrowful and miserable. However, if we always remember those that make God present to our lives and faith, we have every reason to rejoice!

To make y'all happy this weekend and to remind you that even in the somber season we have a reason to rejoice, I will wear a "cheerful vestment." Smile and be glad, our redemption is at hand!
