The Liturgical Year

By means of the yearly cycle the Church celebrates the whole mystery of Christ, from his incarnation until the day of Pentecost and the expectation of his coming again.

(Norms Governing Liturgical Calendars, 17)

In this chapter the students will learn that throughout the liturgical year we remember and celebrate the life of Christ.

Catechist Background

How do you remember and celebrate important events during the year?

By remembering and celebrating the life, Death, Resurrection, and Ascension of Jesus Christ, the Church opens up for all of us “her Lord’s powers and merits” (CCC 1163). The celebration of each new liturgical year enables us to unite ourselves with Christ and grow in grace.

The signs and symbols of the Church year, from the Advent wreath to the Paschal candle, continue to remind us of all that Jesus did for our sakes. At the core of each liturgical action is our identification with the Son of God. Our wholehearted participation in the sacraments, especially the Eucharist, intensifies the covenant relationship that began in our Baptism. In and out of season, Christians remember and fulfill Jesus’ command, “Do this in memory of me” (Luke 22:19).

During the liturgical seasons, the Church desires to relive “the great events of salvation history in the

‘today’ of her liturgy. But this also demands that catechesis help the faithful to open themselves to this spiritual understanding of the economy of salvation” (CCC 1095). Each new season draws us more deeply into the mysteries of Christ’s life.

The celebration of the liturgical year exerts “a special sacramental power and influence which strengthens Christian life” (*Sharing the Light of Faith*, 144). By living and celebrating the Church year, we keep Christ at the heart of all our days.
