Overview

In Chapter 18 the students learned that the Seventh Commandment calls us to respect others, their property, and the world God created. In this chapter the students will learn that the Eighth Commandment teaches the importance of learning and living the truth that comes from God.

Catechist Background

Have you ever been hurt by another person's lie?

The Eighth Commandment is "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor" (Exodus 20:16). Jesus commented on this commandment by saying, "Let your 'Yes' mean 'Yes' and your 'No' mean 'No.' Anything more is from the evil one" (Matthew 5:37). By saying this, Jesus was calling his followers to be truthful.

Christians are the living representatives of Christ. We bear his name and proclaim his message. We have been anointed through the Gift of the Holy Spirit at Baptism. We express our belief in God who is "the source of all truth" (CCC 2465). When we engage in dishonesty and lies, we betray our deepest calling because truth is one of the most important characteristics of a Christian.

Jesus is identified with truth. "In Jesus Christ, the whole of God's truth has been made manifest" (CCC 2466). In testimony to this, John's Gospel describes Jesus as "full of grace and truth" (1:14)

and Jesus calls himself "the way and the truth and the life" (14:6). The devil is identified with lying. "There is no truth in him. When he tells a lie, he speaks in character, because he is a liar and the father of lies" (John 8:44).

When we choose to speak a falsehood with the intention of misleading or deceiving, we are lying. Lies may seem to be small "twists of the truth," but inexorably they edge us away from Christ and closer to the father of lies. Truthfulness often is difficult, but ultimately it is rewarding. As Jesus promised, "you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free" (John 8:32).
