Parish and Diocesan News (continued)

Message from Bishop Soto, May 29, 2020

"I am lifting the heartbreaking suspension of public celebrations of the Sacrifice of the Mass starting on Monday, June 8th. This will help pastors ready the churches for the glorious **Feast of Corpus Christi on June 14th.** My brother priests and I are taking all the steps to ensure the Feast of Corpus Christi is celebrated in a manner that gives peace of mind to all our brothers and sisters in the Lord Jesus.

The public guidelines I recently shared for resuming public celebrations of the Mass have been updated to reflect our continued work with public health officials. These guidelines include **limiting attendance to the lower of either 25% of church capacity or a maximum of 100 congregants.** Pastors will also make these guidelines available to their parishioners. Please consult with your local parish to confirm the schedule of Masses and other directives intended to provide a safe environment for everyone in the church assembly. The COVID-19 pandemic has not ended but conditions have improved sufficiently so that we can begin to offer the Mass and other sacraments in a cautious and responsible manner. It is still necessary to maintain physical-distancing. The wearing of masks in church is strongly recommended. Those who are 65 years of age and older should remain at home. Those with a vulnerable health condition should also continue to stay in their homes. To continue to protect the most vulnerable among us, the dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass is still in effect. If you feel sick or have any flu-like symptoms, do not come to Church. Stay home. With these new guidelines in place, we are still not able to come back to the table as in the past. As we adapt to these changes, we are all called to greater charity and understanding during this transition. Our continued vigilance respects those who are afflicted and honors those who risk their own lives in caring for them. The patient efforts each of us makes are an act of Christian solidarity that will strengthen the whole Body of Christ."

Reflection on Penecost Sunday

"As the Father has sent me, so I send you." Evangelization is a daunting challenge in any time, but even more so during the pandemic with so many of us fearful and feeling powerless. What's more, it's not just the ordained, but all of us that are commissioned to proclaim the reign of God. How? Today's readings offer us a road map and hope.

Once again, the followers of Christ gathered together in fear. Suddenly, there is a burst of wind, and the Holy Spirit fills them with courage and passion for proclaiming their message of salvation. They go out and proclaim the message even to people whose language they cannot speak. It's the Tower of Babel story in reverse. In Genesis, peoples' arrogance leads them to believe that they can ascend to God through their own ingenuity. The consequence of their self-delusion is a confusion of language, social fragmentation, and chaos. The followers of Jesus, on the other hand, are humble and receive the Spirit who descends to them. They are filled with courage and bridge the communications gap. Can we repeat the disciples' success?

We must be able and willing to proclaim God's reign to people in a language that they understand. It goes beyond bilingual or multilingual Masses. We have to embrace other cultures, and be willing to learn to speak the language of Pre and Post Vatican II adults, and their children and Millennials and the Gen Z generation. The task seems overwhelming, but we can do it.

St. Paul, in today's second reading, got it right. Each member of our community has unique gifts that can serve our mission. Some of us are called to prayer, some to liturgical leadership, some to teaching or service to the poor. Some of us have the skills to maintain parish facilities or make the landscape more appealing. Whatever our charism, the important thing is that if we work together, with the Holy Spirit's help, we can overcome our powerlessness and proclaim the Word of God with confidence and in love.

There is a lawn sign in my neighborhood of World War II's iconic Rosie the riveter. Her sleeve is rolled up, and she's clenching her fist and flexing. Underneath her determined-looking stare, the sign reads, "We can do it." She was right then, and she's right now. Every time I pass her, I can feel a slight breeze, and I'm reminded that there's more to the "we" than meets the eye, and I feel a little less powerless.
