Parish and Diocesan News (continued)

Bishop Soto suspending the public celebration of Sunday and weekday Masses for the Diocese of Sacramento California until further notice.

This is in addition to his cancelling of all "non-essential large indoor gatherings" until further notice in response to the Coronavirus outbreak. On November 13, 2020, Bishop Jamie Soto directed the pastors in parishes that are located in "purple tier" counties to offer Mass and provide to the Faithful the opportunity to attend virtually, either by live-streaming or other visual technology.

Reception of Holy Communion:

Beginning Sunday, November 29, 2020, **weather permitting**, we will be offering the **reception of Holy Communion after the 10:30am and the 12:30pm live streaming Masses**. This will take place outside in the church parking lot. Father will confirm if communion will be happening following the virtual mass. Make sure that you tune in to the virtual mass and not just show up.

Communion will take place immediately after the masses are concluded.

Parishioners will be expected to line up by the Statue of Mary, directly across from the east side parking lot. Communion recipients will need to be 6 feet apart and wearing a mask that covers both the nose and mouth. After receiving communion, you must leave immediately.

Follow the masses on Facebook and YouTube to gauge what time you'll need to be at the church to receive communion.

Reflection on The Second Sunday of Advent

I have to confess; I have a hard time warming up to John the Baptist. He's a wild man with the crazed look of an Old Testament prophet. To him, we are all sinners who need to repent and make straight the way of the Lord. His brand of repentance is hard. It's not enough to recognize our sinfulness. feel remorse and try to make amends to those you've wronged. He demands that we radically change our lives and our world. Remember Fr. Michael Vaughn?

Our former pastor had no problem challenging us, almost daily, to shape up spiritually and get on with the task of bringing about the Reign of God. His manner was less abrasive, though not by much, but his message was the same as the Baptist's. I know of at least one parishioner who joined our parish St. Vincent de Paul Society because of his passion for social justice; me. We have other local John the Baptists.

Dan and Chris Delaney, the founders of Loaves and Fishes here in Sacramento, also fit the bill. Quick-witted and abrasive, Dan cared for the homeless and had no trouble speaking truth to power. I'm not sure how many times he ended up in jail on the behalf of people treated unjustly. He challenged people to stand up and make straight the way of the Lord. Chris, his wife, accomplishes the same, but by gentle invitation. I preferred her approach. Both moved me to conversion.

I am not particularly attracted to John the Baptist, but Jesus was. He sought John out in the wilderness, was baptized by him, and fulfilled the prophet's messianic vision. But then again, he didn't stay with John that long. Jesus met him and then went off to the desert where he encountered Satan. Maybe it was a case of out of the frying pan and into the fire. Modern day versions of the Baptist, if they are authentic, will send us into the desert to prepare the way of the Lord.
