Today's Reflection

Fourth Sunday of Advent

God spoke to people in dreams in all the ancient Middle Eastern countries. In the Hebrew scriptures, it is most often prophets or Kings doing the dreaming. Probably the most famous and widely known dreamer in the Jewish tradition was Joseph son of Jacob. He's famous for having dreams and also as an interpreter of dreams for the pharaoh. His dreams came true. Joseph did supersede his brothers, and the Egyptians could plan for and avoid a future famine thanks to his dream interpretation skills.

For Matthew, Joseph, the husband of Mary, having dreams would resonate with the Jewish audience he was writing for. Matthew's Joseph was a humble man.his dreams did not contain mysterious symbols requiring interpretation, God's message to him was straightforward. Mary is not an adulteress. Preserve the marriage even if you can't understand what's going on. He did, and God became incarnate in human flesh.

I used to hear the phrase, "the American dream." I hear it less these days. It seems today we are more into goal setting than dreaming. There is value in goal setting. I do it every day. But, I never want to lose sight of the dream. Goals lead to a sense of accomplishment when we reach them. But dreams generate passion. I'll take passion over self-satisfaction any day
