Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it." Luke 15-18

I wonder why the disciples didn't want to let the children go and sit near Jesus? Jesus saw what was happening. "Wait," he said. "Let the little children come to me. Don't stop them. The kingdom of God belongs to people who are like these little children.

The disciples and the crowd were amazed!

The mothers and children hurried to Jesus. He spent a long time with them. He took the children on to his lap ad blessed them. Maybe he told the mothers how much he love the children. Maybe he talked about how they could raise their children to love God.

We don't know what Jesus said to the mothers and children that day but we can be sure that he was not angry with them for wanting to be with him. He was happy.

He was glad to talk with them.

St. Anne

St. Anne is the mother of the Virgin Mary and the grandmother of Jesus. Her husband is Saint Joachim. Her name is a version of the Hebrew name Hanna. Anna means grace.

According to tradition, Joachim went to a temple to pray, but was not allowed in because he did not have a child.

Anna heard, prayed, and sacrificed.

She promised God that she would bring up a child in God's name. An angel came to Anna and Joachim and told them that God would grant her a baby. Anna had the baby soon after, and named the girl Mary. Anna kept her promise. When Mary was about three years old Joachim and Anna brought her up to the temple. They taught Mary all about God.

St. Anne's Feast Day is July 26th. She is the patron saint of children, mothers, mothers-to-be and grandmothers. Artists often show St. Anne holding Mary in her arms.

St. Anne and St. Joachim taught Mary to trust in God and always have hope. Maybe that is why Mary said 'Yes" to God when He asked her to be the mother of Jesus. Jesus' grandparents and parents showed us how important children are to God's kingdom. They also taught us how important it is to love our family and be part of God's family too.
