Choose to serve God daily.

No servant can serve two masters. He will either hate one and love the other, or be devoted to one and despise the other. The two masters Jesus is referring to are wealth, or temporal goods, and God. The truth Jesus seems to be pointing out to us is that we must make a choice; we can't juggle both. Clearly, our choice should be to serve God.

What does choosing to serve God require of us? It demands that we submit control of our life to God, that we

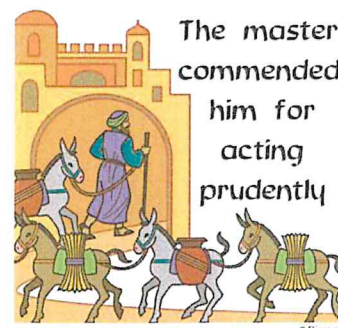
trust God completely with our lives. And our lives include our family, our loved ones, our livelihood, our safety, our health. It calls us to trust God, whatever happens. When things are going well, that can be easy to do. But when bad things happen, we might start questioning whether that trust is well placed and might start looking around for alternatives.

Choosing to serve God is not a one-time choice. Rather, it is a choice we make daily. Earlier in the Gospel, Jesus brings up another truth relevant to this point: The person who is trustworthy in very small matters is also trustworthy in great ones. In other words, the choices we make when the stakes are small will shape the kind of person we become, and will set us up either to succeed or fail as disciples of the Lord.

Before we face that big moment when our trust in God is truly tested, there will have been many smaller tests: when we were tempted to act in an un-Christian manner but chose to listen instead to the voice of our conscience; when we were enticed by vice but stayed strong in virtue; when we forgave and prayed for the person who hurt us. All these are ways we choose daily to serve God.

And choose we must, because we may be tempted to straddle the fence – to serve both God and our earthly interests. This is a strong temptation because our temporal, physical needs are deep-seated. And we are surrounded by a culture that values and rewards the pursuit of temporal goods. But, as Jesus warns, trying to pursue both won't work. We will end up choosing by default and the default choice might not be the best one.

Fortunately, the Lord knows these temptations exist and he knows our weaknesses. He is always present to help us. If we find that we have been making many small wrong choices, the Lord awaits us at the sacrament of reconciliation to offer forgiveness, healing, and a new beginning. And here in the Eucharist he offers us himself as spiritual food to strengthen us to choose to serve God today and every day.

Twenty-fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Am 8:4-7 | 1 Tim 2:1-8 | Lk 16:1-13

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

As Catholics we understand that none of our actions are truly isolated. Every virtue we practice or sin we commit affects others because we are all members of the body of Christ. Today's readings from the Old and New Testaments highlight our interconnectedness and offer guidance for how to order the life of the community according to God's will. The key to tranquil communal life is to consider the needs of others as important as our own. In the first reading, the prophet Amos decries those who exploit the poor for personal gain, putting profit over the common good. In the second reading, St. Paul begs the community to pray not only for themselves and for their close relatives, but to offer prayer and supplication for *everyone*. It's tempting to buy into the perspective that we need only focus on *our own* life. But the Lord invites us into authentic community where we intercede, sacrifice for and build up the kingdom *together*.

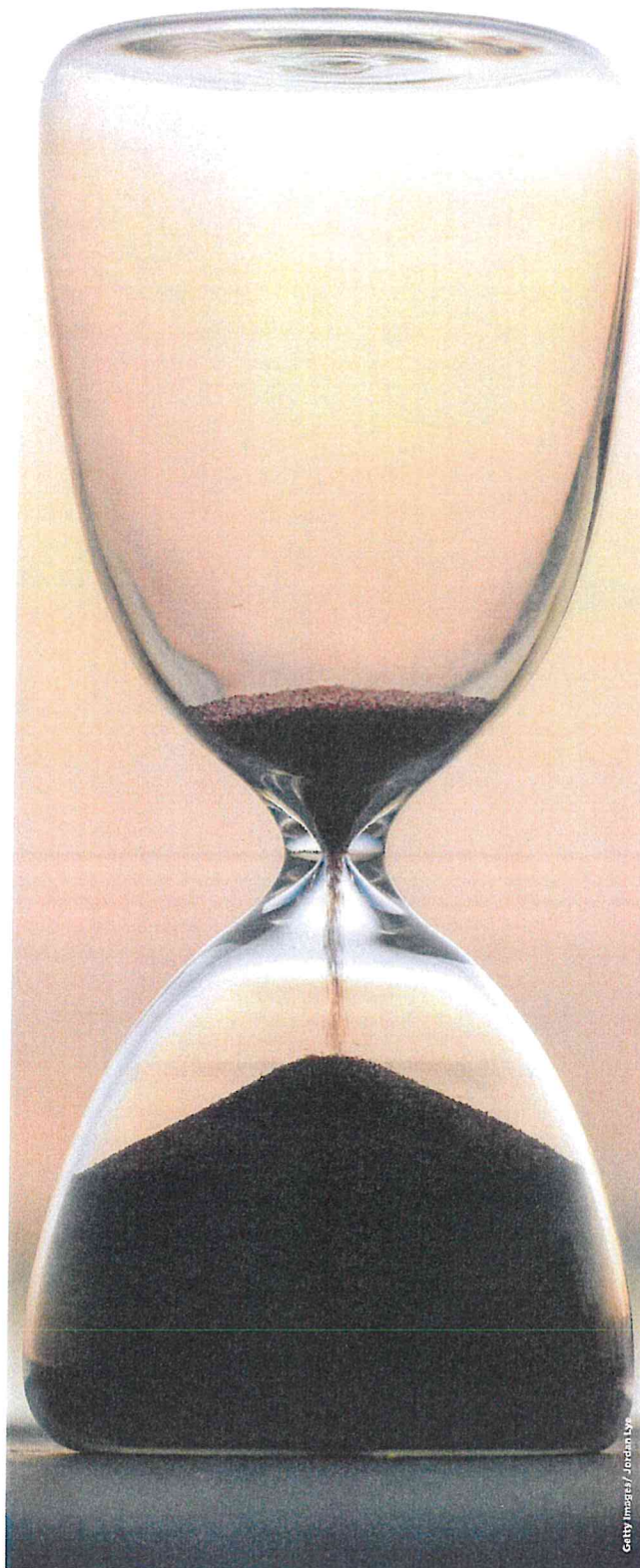
GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

I like to think of myself as a trustworthy person, and I'd expect most of us would consider ourselves the same. But as the Lord convicts my heart with today's Gospel reading about those who are trustworthy or untrustworthy in big and small matters, I hear the Holy Spirit inviting me to ponder deeper questions: Perhaps I don't intentionally deceive people and I aim to keep my word, but when someone's name or reputation comes up in conversation, can I be trusted to build them up? Do I fall prey to petty gossip, or simply sit idly by as others fall? I am true to scheduled commitments I make, but am I trustworthy with how I spend all my time? Do I use the gift of time for God's greater glory, or do I squander it with excessive scrolling or mindless TV shows? The Spirit doesn't want us to be scrupulous, and everything must be understood through God's merciful gaze. But the Lord does intend to purify us so that we can live more fully in communion with him.

REFLECT

Today, consider how you are invited to live in community and contribute to the building of a Christ-like culture. How are you called to more trustworthy stewardship of the gifts and time God has given you so that you can use them for building up the body of Christ?

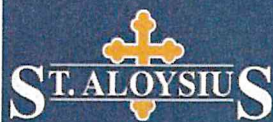
