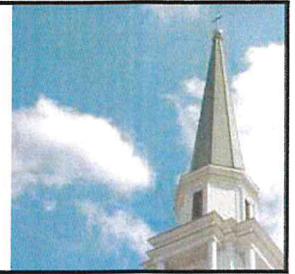

Through the cure of a person born blind, John’s Gospel presents sight in a spiritual sense. Sometimes a person can look but not see.

On this *Lactare Sunday*, we pause in our Lenten journey to rejoice in the light and hope that Christ brings. The Scriptures remind us that God looks beyond outward appearances and sees the truth of our hearts. In the Gospel, Jesus heals the man born blind, revealing that He is the Light of the World who opens our eyes to faith.

This is a moment to reflect: Where we still be blind to God’s presence? What shadows keep us from seeing His love clearly? Lent is not only a time of repentance but also of awakening of letting Christ’s light dispel the darkness within us.

As we move toward Easter, may we walk with renewed vision, hearts open to God’s mercy, and spirits lifted by the joy of His promise.

Dear brothers sisters, we need to allow Jesus to heal our spiritual blindness. We all have blind spots in our marriages, our parenting, our work habits, and our personalities. We are often blind to the presence of the Triune God dwelling within us and fail to appreciate His presence in others. Even practicing Christians can be blind to the poverty, injustice, and pain around them. Let us remember, however, that Jesus wants to heal our blindness.

We need to ask him to remove from us the root causes of our blindness: self-contention, greed, anger, hatred, prejudice, jealousy, addiction to evil habits, hardness of heart, and the like. Let us pray with the Bible scholar William Barclay, “God our Father, help us see Christ more clearly, love him more dearly and follow him more nearly” day by day. We need to get rid of cultural blindness. Our culture also has blind spots. Often it is blind to things like selfless love, happiness, fidelity with true, committed sexual love in marriage, and the value of human life from birth to natural death. Our culture has become insensible to violence, the sexual implication, and the enormous suffering in the world around us. Let us counteract this cultural blindness as, with His grace, we experience Jesus’ dwelling within us and within others, through personal prayer, meditative reading of the Bible, and a genuine Sacramental life.

Thank you, for your support and dedication to our parishes.

The Cathedral has extended confessions this week on Friday, March 20 from 12:30pm-6:30pm and Saturday, March 21 from 9:00-4:00pm.

The **Sacred Triduum** is the most important time in the Church's liturgical year. The

word Triduum means "three days." It celebrates the central mystery of our faith: the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Triduum begins on the evening of Holy Thursday and concludes on Easter Sunday. • Holy Thursday Mass at 7:00pm – Mass of the Lord's Supper (St. Aloysius). We remember the Last Supper, the institution of the Eucharist and the priesthood, and Jesus' command to serve others, symbolized by the washing of the feet. • Good Friday Service at 6:00pm – The Passion of the Lord. (St. Cabrini) The Church reflects on Jesus' suffering and death on the cross for our salvation. It is a solemn day of prayer, fasting, and veneration of the cross. • Holy Saturday and the Easter Vigil at 7:00pm (St. Aloysius) - The Church waits in hope at the tomb until the Easter Vigil, when we celebrate Christ's Resurrection, the victory of life over death, and welcome new members into the Church. These three days are celebrated as one great liturgy, inviting us to enter deeply into the mystery of Christ's love and the salvation he won for us. Sunday, April 5 Mass times are 7:00am(St. Aloysius) 9:30am(St. Cabrini) and 11:00am (St. Aloysius).

Choir Rehearsal for Holy Week and Easter will begin this week on Wednesday, March 18 from 7-8:00pm. Additional rehearsals are Monday, March 23 from 7-8:00pm, and Monday, March 30 from 7-8:00pm. Please remember the Lenten season, we will switch to using the chant mass parts, which can be und beginning with #837 in the Breaking Bread.

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

There has been much commentary over the centuries about Jesus' use of saliva and mud to heal the man born blind. One of the most profound interpretations I have read reminds us that in Genesis, God made man out of "the dust of the ground." (Gen 2:7) Jesus' use of mud in the Gospel suggests that he is re-creating the blind man before him. The man receives a whole new life, such that even those who see him after his healing question whether he is the same person as before: "Isn't this the one who used to sit and beg?" ... "No, he just looks like him." Through this Gospel, I've come to believe that Jesus is inviting us to see that every time he touches us in the sacraments, we are inwardly re-created, inwardly renewed. As we come to this midway point in Lent, let's open our eyes to the ways God is waiting to meet us with his healing love in the sacraments, and avail ourselves of this amazing grace.


GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Our first reading offers a powerful reminder that although humans see what's on the outside, God looks at our hearts. While the prophet Samuel thought surely God's hand was on Jesse's oldest son, God chooses David, the youngest, who was out tending the sheep. In the Gospel, the Pharisees look at the man born blind and think he is a sinner, born from sinners. But underneath is a man whom Jesus sends (the name of the pool that Jesus instructs him to go wash in means "Sent") to bear witness to all that God has done for him. God often chooses the unlikeliest (in our eyes) persons to be the messengers of his Gospel. At times we may wonder why God has chosen us or feel ourselves lacking in the qualities needed to lead others to the Lord. In those moments, let's trust that through our baptism and confirmation, the Lord has put his Spirit in us and has equipped us for the work of sharing the Gospel.

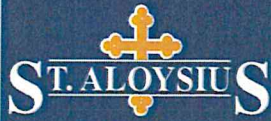
REFLECT
