April 19, 2026... Third Sunday of Easter



Dear brothers and sisters in Jesus Christ,

Today's gospel focus on community rather than on the individual. The two disciples left Jerusalem and traveled to Emmaus. In the gospels for the Easter vigil and on Easter morning, Mary Magdalene encounters Jesus, but is told immediately to give the news of the resurrection to the apostles. She becomes the apostle to the Apostles. In the gospel last week, Thomas struggles with doubt when he is away from the community but is able to make an act of faith when he is with the others. Easter is about some-

thing more than just me and Jesus. It takes the Word of God in a community for each of us to get a handle on the resurrection.

In the gospel today we see a small community of two discussing the events that have happened during the past days as they travel down the road to Emmaus. They thought Jesus was the one; but then, he died on the Cross. This broke their hearts. Then they heard a woman say that he is alive. Is that even possible? Jesus joined them on the road, but they did not recognize him. He explained to Moses and the prophets how it was necessary for the Messiah to die and to rise again. When they stopped for the night, they invited Jesus to have supper with them. Suddenly, this supper takes on a two-fold meaning. It is an act of hospitality, but the description is also that of the Mass: Jesus "took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them." Hospitality and liturgy are both communal actions, and in this community, they recognized the risen Jesus.

As they reflected on their dinner with Jesus, the two said: "Were not our hearts burning within us while [Jesus] spoke to us on the way and opened the Scriptures to us?" Somehow, they were touched by the words of Jesus in a way that was powerful and deep. As they listened, they actually felt something happening in their bodies. We think here of heart burning not as a painful thing like "heartburn," but more like a purifying experience that cuts through the trash of life to the real. The Truth. For example: you may read a passage from Scripture a hundred times. You practically know it by heart. Then you hear someone else read it to you, and you get a wholly new insight into the message for you. It takes your breath away.

This is the Easter season. It is a time of grace. It is a season of new life, spring flowers, leaves on the trees, and birds building their nests. St. Augustine said that we are "Easter people." And so we would normally celebrate the joy with each other. Except we now have constraints of isolation, social distancing and face masks. But even so, it is essential to keep the communal spirit of Easter alive.

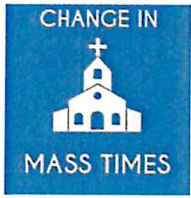

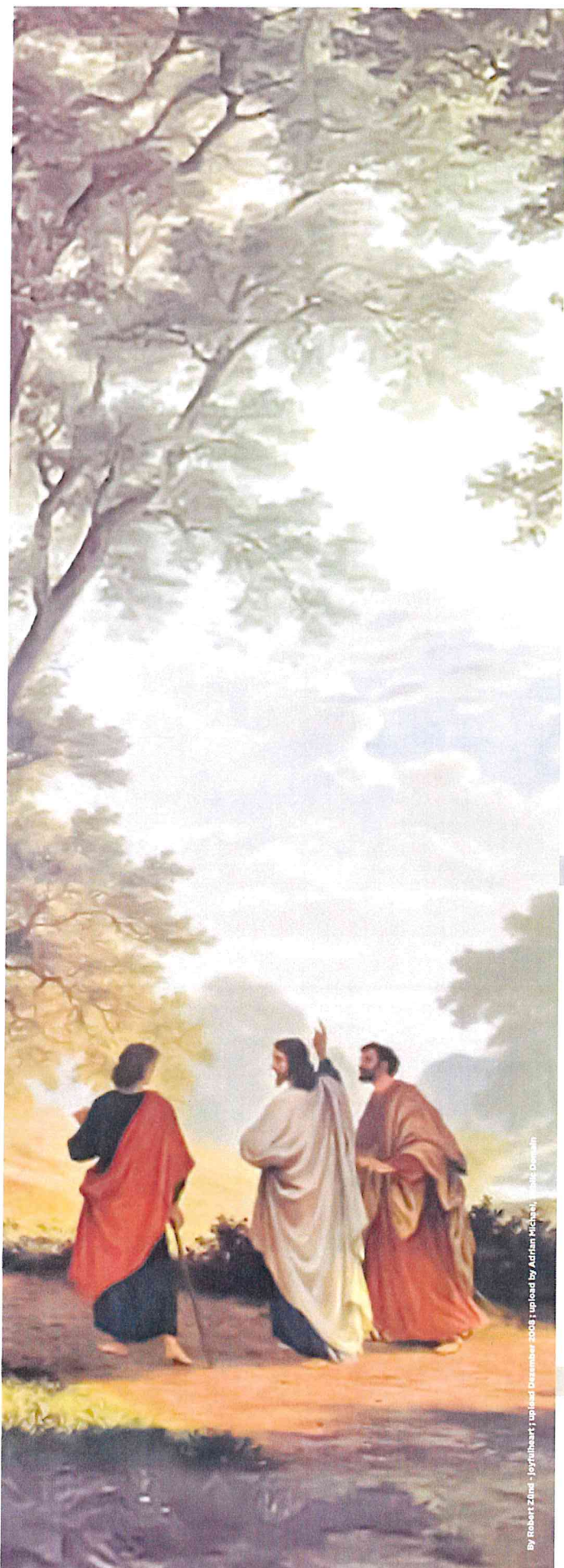

Acts 2:14, 22-33 | 1 Pt 1:17-21 | Lk 24:13-35

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

If I lived at the time of Christ and caught Jesus' eyes while passing him in the streets, would I recognize him as the Messiah? You and I are made in the image and likeness of God. We are the adopted children of the Father. Would my soul be drawn to Christ as two magnets are drawn to one another? I believe that when we are in full and perfect communion with Christ, our entire being will be drawn to the Lord and instinctively rejoice in the glory of God. But on this earth - a world broken by sin - our eyes are clouded and we do not see clearly. In the Gospel today, as the pair of disciples encountered Christ, we read that "their eyes were prevented from recognizing him." Christ had preached and worked miracles and died in faithful obedience to the Father's will. He had been raised and was present again fully glorified. Yet, they could not see who it was before them in that moment. In our world today, it is easy to become blinded by sin and miss seeing Christ in our midst. But just as he walked the streets of Nazareth growing up and walked along the road to Emmaus after his resurrection, Christ continues to walk among us today.

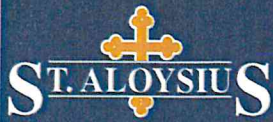
GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

When we look at the example of the disciples traveling to Emmaus, we see a blueprint for how we might improve our vision to see the Lord's presence more clearly. They listened carefully as Jesus reminded them of Scripture, they spoke to him and urged him to remain near to them, and they broke bread with him. After all of this, "their eyes were opened and they recognized him." We can also come to see Christ more clearly by encountering him in Scripture, by speaking to him in prayer, and by encountering him in the sacraments - particularly by regularly receiving the graces offered in confession and receiving the Eucharist. In doing this, we not only clear our own vision, but we align our thoughts and actions to be more like those of Christ, participating in the Father's mission to draw humanity back to himself.

WITNESS

After the disciples recognized Christ, they returned to the others and "recounted what had taken place on the way." This suggests that when we encounter Christ, we are not meant to keep it to ourselves! This week, consider how you can humbly share with a friend or family member how you have encountered Christ.
