Foundational Reading

The Bible

The Catholic Edition of any translation, usually denoted by CE, is preferable. Be aware that if you are using a Protestant edition, it will be missing seven books from the Old Testament.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church, Second Edition, revised in accordance with the official Latin text promulgated by Pope John Paul II

The Catechism draws on the Bible, the Mass, the Sacraments, Church tradition and teaching, and the lives of saints. It comes with a complete index, footnotes, and cross-references for a fuller understanding of the Catholic faith.

Documents of Vatican II: Vatican Translation

The 16 documents of the Second Vatican Council (1963-65) are included in this volume together with notes and an index.

Catholic Commentary on Sacred Scripture edited by Mary Healy and Peter Williamson

The Catholic Commentary on Sacred Scripture (CCSS) combines outstanding biblical scholarship with lively faith to help Catholics interpret Scripture and apply it to Christian life today. In seventeen volumes, the series aims to provide readable, informative commentary on each book of the New Testament. The CCSS responds to the desire of Catholics to study the Bible in depth and in a way that integrates Scripture with Catholic doctrine, worship, and daily life. Central to the commentary's approach are the theological principles taught by Vatican II for interpreting Scripture "in accord with the same Spirit by which it was written" that is, interpreting Scripture in its canonical context and in the light of Catholic tradition and the analogy of faith (Dei Verbum, 12). The CCSS helps readers grasp the meaning of texts both in their historical and literary context and in their relationship to Catholic doctrine and life in the present.

This reader-friendly handbook introduces ten of the most prominent traditions, Augustinian, Benedictine, Carmelite, Cistercian, Dominican, Franciscan Ignatian, Salesian, Lay, and Mystic spirituality and recounts a brief history of each tradition's founder, highlights its characteristics, and provides a prayer or spiritual practice for each one. A chapter titled "What's Right for Me?" guides spiritual seekers in discerning which path to prayer is the best match for their personality, needs, and circumstances.

Why Do Catholics Do That?: A Guide to the Teachings and Practices of the Catholic Church by Kevin Orlin Johnson

Blending religious history, a deep appreciation for art and culture, and an enlightened reverence for the traditions of the Church, *Why Do Catholics Do That?* is the definitive resource for anyone who wants to learn more about the rituals, symbols, and traditions that can strengthen our faith every day.

An Introduction to the New Testament for Catholics by Joseph F. Kelly

The book emphasizes devotion to the Eucharist as key element of spiritual life.

You Can Understand The Bible: A Practical And Illuminating Guide To Each Book In The Bible by Peter Kreeft

Christians are often intimidated or overwhelmed by the sheer size and complexity of the Bible. But now, popular author and teacher Peter Kreeft has written a clear roadmap of the Bible, focusing his keen insight and engaging wit on the core message of each book. Sparkling with intelligence and Kreeft's trademark humor, *You Can Understand the Bible* will transform dry study into spiritually satisfying adventures in God's Word.

He merely turned his attention to the Divine Presence available at all times during any activity. He reports that he was as fully present with God while washing dishes in the kitchen as he was when partaking of the sacrament in worship.

I Believe in Love: A Personal Retreat Based on the Teaching of St. Therese of Lisieux by Fr. Jean C.J. d'Elbee

This spiritual classic has long been beloved by Catholics for its wondrous distillation of the teaching of St. Therese of Lisieux into a reader-friendly set of meditations. It's perfect as a personal retreat when you have only a few moments to spare each day and for spiritual reading anytime and anywhere.

An Introduction to the Devout Life by St. Francis de Sales

As no sensible person would make a long road trip without first consulting a map, so the person intent upon gaining Heaven should first resort to a competent guide to reach that Goal of all goals. No better guide to Heaven exists than *An Introduction to the Devout Life* by St. Francis de Sales (1567-1622), Doctor of the Church. It is at once easy to read, being laid out in short chapters, yet thorough, authoritative, reliable, kind, and gentle; a mirror of its author. It is a book, moreover, for all, because all are called to the devout life. True devotion to God, the author points out, adorns every vocation. The devout life, moreover, is a lovely, a pleasant, and a happy life.

Happy Are You Poor: The Simple Life and Spiritual Freedom by Fr. Thomas Dubay

To the modern mind, the concept of poverty is often confused with destitution. But destitution emphatically is not the Gospel ideal. A love-filled sharing frugality is the message, and Happy Are You Poor explains the meaning of this beatitude lived and taught by Jesus himself. But isn't simplicity in

lifestyle meant only for nuns and priests? Are not all of us to enjoy the goodness and beauties of our magnificent creation? Are parents to be frugal with the children they love so much? The renowned spiritual writer Dubay gives surprising replies to these questions. He explains how material things are like extensions of our persons and thus of our love. If everyone lived this love there would be no destitution. After presenting the richness of the Gospel message, more beautiful than any other world view, he explains how Gospel frugality is lived in each state of life.

The Admirable Heart of Mary by St. John Eudes

The beloved Carmelite classic on how to reach intimate union with God through prayer. Covers the whole spiritual life. Based on the traditional liturgical calendar. Gives an absolutely Catholic view of life.

Consoling the Heart of Jesus: A Do-It-Yourself Retreat Inspired by the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius by Fr. Michael Gaitley

This do-it-yourself retreat combines the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius with the teachings of Saints Therese of Lisieux, Faustina Kowalska, and Louis de Montfort. The author has a remarkable gift for inspiring souls to trust in Jesus, The Divine Mercy.

33 Days to Morning Glory: A Do-It-Yourself Retreat In Preparation for Marian Consecration by Fr. Michael Gaitley

From Fr. Michael E. Gaitley, MIC, author of the bestselling book *Consoling the Heart of Jesus*, comes an extraordinary 33-day journey to Marian consecration with four giants of Marian spirituality: St. Louis de Montfort, St. Maximilian Kolbe, Blessed Teresa of Calcutta, and Blessed John Paul II. St. John of the Cross is one of the greatest mystics of the West. He lived in the 16th century in Spain, was monk, reformer, and best known for Dark Night of the Soul and his deep friendship with St. Teresa of Avila. St. John is considered one of the most important poets of the Spanish language.

Rediscover Catholicism: A Spiritual Guide to Living with Passion and Purpose by Matthew Kelly Kelly proposes that Catholicism is not a lifeless set of rules and regulations, but a way of life designed by God to help each person reach his or her full potential. He dispels dozens of myths that surround the rejection of Catholicism today and provides a profound and practical vision of what will lead the Catholic Church to thrive again in the future.

The Screwtape Letters by C. S. Lewis

A classic masterpiece of religious satire that entertains readers with its sly and ironic portrayal of human life and foibles from the vantage point of Screwtape, a highly placed assistant to "Our Father Below." At once wildly comic, deadly serious, and strikingly original, The Screwtape Letters is the most engaging account of temptation, and triumph over it, ever written.

The Story of a Soul: Autobiography of St. Therese of Lisieux

The Story of a Soul conveys St. Therese of Lisieux's "Little Way" of spiritual childhood, her "elevator" to Heaven, as she called it. This method was approved by Pope Pius XI as a way for all to grow in holiness through unfailing confidence and childlike delight in God's merciful love. Again and again in this book, St. Therese shows us how her "Little Way" of love and trust comes straight from Sacred Scripture.

The Fulfillment of All Desire: A Guidebook for the Journey to God Based on the Wisdom of the Saints by Ralph Martin

Drawing upon the teaching of seven Spiritual Doctors of the Church, Ralph Martin presents an in-depth study of the journey to God. This book provides encouragement and direction for the pilgrim who desires to know, love, and serve our Lord.

The Seven Storey Mountain by Thomas Merton

Merton's autobiography tells of the growing restlessness of a brilliant and passionate young man, who at the age of twenty-six, takes vows in one of the most demanding Catholic orders, the Trappist monks. At the Abbey of Gethsemani, he wrote this extraordinary testament, a unique spiritual autobiography that has been recognized as one of the most influential religious works of our time.

The Return of the Prodigal Son by Henri J.M. Nouwen

A chance encounter with a reproduction of Rembrandt's "The Return of the Prodigal Son" painting catapulted Henri Nouwen on an unforgettable spiritual adventure. Here he shares the deeply personal and resonant meditation that led him to discover a place within where God has chosen to dwell. As Nouwen reflects on Rembrandt's painting in light of his own life journey, he evokes a powerful drama of the classic parable in a rich, captivating way that is sure to reverberate in the hearts of readers. The themes of homecoming, affirmation and reconciliation will be newly discovered by all who have known loneliness, dejection, jealousy, or anger.

The Way of Trust and Love - A Retreat Guided By St. Therese of Lisieux by Fr. Jacques Philippe St. Therese of Lisieux sought a new way to Heaven: "a little way that is quite straight, quite short: a completely new little way." Blessed with personal limitations that might have discouraged another, Therese believed God would not have given her a desire for holiness if He did not intend for her to achieve it. She learned to humbly accept herself as she was and trust completely in God's love. First given as a retreat by renowned author Father Jacques Philippe, The Way of Trust and Love navigates excerpts of St. Therese's writings phrase by phrase, extracting powerful, resonating insights.

Nine Days to Welcome Peace by Fr. Jacques Philippe

We think of it as a blessing to have a peaceful heart, but it is also a necessary condition for the growth of our spiritual lives. How do we not only find peace but then keep it? Step by step, in a period of nine

days, Fr. Jacques Philippe describes how to welcome this inner peace in all areas of our existence. He shows us how to rest in the deep resonance of God's holy peace amidst the highs and lows, ease and struggles of everyday life.

Real Mercy: Mary, Forgiveness, and Trust by Fr. Jacques Philippe

In *Real Mercy* Father Jacques Philippe turns his focus on mercy in this book that developed from talks given on the first three days of the Year of Mercy beginning Dec. 8, 2015. On that feast day of the Immaculate Conception, he explored how Mary, the Mother of Jesus, is an exemplar of mercy to the Church and the entire world. In a discreet but vital way she dispenses graces and favors with the compassion of a mother. His second essay on forgiveness in families hits home with everyone. No one has escaped the ill feeling and bitterness caused by strife and misunderstanding within the family, and yet the same family is intended to be the path for both earthly and eternal happiness. The author brings to light vivid examples of how lack of forgiveness causes severe damage while forgiveness heals and restores broken relationships. Finally, he uses the writings of St. Therese of Lisieux to show how trust in God's mercy leads to extraordinary supernatural effects in one's life and in the lives of those one touches.

The Case for Jesus: The Biblical and Historical Evidence for Christ by Brant Pitre with an afterword by Bishop Robert Barron

For well over a hundred years, many scholars have questioned the historical truth of the Gospels, claiming that they were originally anonymous. Others have even argued that Jesus of Nazareth did not think he was God and never claimed to be divine. In *The Case for Jesus*, Pitre, goes back to the sources, the biblical and historical evidence for Christ, in order to answer several key questions. He shows that recent discoveries in New Testament scholarship, as well as neglected evidence from ancient manuscripts and the early church fathers, together have the potential to pull the rug out from under a century of skepticism toward the traditional Gospels. Above all, Pitre shows how the divine claims of Jesus of Nazareth can only be understood by putting them in their ancient Jewish context.

Jesus and the Jewish Roots of the Eucharist: Unlocking the Secrets of the Last Supper by Brant Pitre with a foreword by Scott Hahn

Pitre explores ancient Jewish beliefs about the Passover of the Messiah, the miraculous Manna from heaven, and the mysterious Bread of the Presence. As he shows, these three keys, the Passover, the Manna, and the Bread of the Presence, have the power to unlock the original meaning of the Eucharistic words of Jesus. Along the way, Pitre also explains how Jesus united the Last Supper to his death on Good Friday and his Resurrection on Easter Sunday.

The book also includes a compelling collection of portraits and photographs, with a novena and additional prayers to instill further devotion to Maria.

Jesus of Nazareth, from the Baptism in the Jordan to the Transfiguration by Joseph Cardinal Ratzinger (Pope Benedict XVI)

In this bold, momentous work, the Pope seeks to salvage the person of Jesus from today's "popular" depictions and to restore his true identity as discovered in the Gospels. Through his brilliance as a theologian and his personal conviction as a believer, the Pope incites us to encounter Jesus face to face.

The Spirit of the Liturgy by Joseph Cardinal Ratzinger (Pope Benedict XVI)

Considered by Ratzinger devotees as his greatest work on the Liturgy, this profound and beautifully written treatment of the "great prayer of the Church" will help readers rediscover the Liturgy in all its hidden spiritual wealth and transcendent grandeur as the very center of our Christian life.

Fr. Stanley arrived in Guatemala in 1968, and immediately identified with his parishioners' simple, farming lifestyle. He learned their languages, prepared them for the Sacraments, and cared for their needs. Fr. Stanley, or "Padre Francisco" as he was called by his beloved Tz'utujil Indians, had found his heart's calling. After nearly a decade, the violence of the Guatemalan civil war found its way into the peaceful village. Disappearances, killings, and danger became daily occurrences, but despite this unrest Fr. Stanley remained hard at work, building a farmer's co-op, a school, a hospital, and the first Catholic radio station, used for catechesis. In early 1981, his name was on a death list, so he returned to Oklahoma and was warned not to return. But he could not abandon his people, so he went back, and made the ultimate sacrifice for his faith.
