St. Joseph is also there to guide us back to life when we have lost our way to the evils of the world. There is always hope!!!The second collection this weekend is for the retirement fund for the priests of New Orleans. I pray we all feel a deep sense of gratitude for the faithful service of the presbyterate of New Orleans. Please be generous. I finally saw the monument to immigrants, which is now at Notre Dame Seminary. It is very impressive. I began to ponder the image of the US being the city on the hill, specially chosen by God. We love the felling of this imagine, but how often do we ponder its true meaning. Isaiah prophesized nearly 3,000 years ago that this was Israel was such a place and people. He went on to say that all people will come streaming to this mountain for a banquet beyond belief. The Israelites didn't like this image of foreigners coming into their land, so they killed Isaiah. God's great love of the poor, the marginalized and the outcast is often beyond our ability to comprehend. May we learn from St. Joseph who found a place of refuge for his family in Egypt when they had to flee.

Though they hope it never would be necessary, they would sacrifice their own lives to save their children. If their toddler ran out into the street they would run after them without thinking to save them from danger. Jesus, the Good Shepherd, is the same. While on earth, he lived his life in service of others, ultimately laying down his life to save us from danger of sin and evil. Unlike a shepherd for hire, who will abandon the sheep if danger arises, Jesus cares for his sheep as a parent cares for their children. Unlike other shepherds who care only for their own sheep, the Good Shepherd regards all God's children as his sheep, whether they belong to the fold or not. We are children of God, as John wrote in his letter. We share in the power that comes from Jesus, as Peter testified. God calls us each to live our life to serve others, like a good parent, like the Good Shepherd, taking care of others, for all are daughters and sons of God.







- Today's first reading takes place one day after Peter healed a man in the temple area who had been paralyzed from birth. He has been called before the Sanhedrin, who were upset that he was preaching that Jesus was raised from the dead. It wasn't that long before that Peter had denied having anything to do with Jesus. But this time Peter does not back down. Not only does he passionately testify that the man was healed in Jesus' name, he accuses them of crucifying the Messiah, the Christ. What gave Peter the boldness he so sorely lacked on Good Friday? Perhaps the first line gives us a clue. He was filled with the Holy Spirit, that source of fortitude, who strengthened him then and us now in proclaiming our faith, even when it is not easy to do so.
- Today's readings refer to us as children and as a flock of sheep, suggesting to some that we are subservient or infantile. But this is not the intent. John calls us children of God, and God loves and nurtures us as parents love and nurture their children. Jesus calls us a flock of sheep in the sense of being guided and cared for by the one who watches over us. We are still free to stray, but we know that ultimately the Good Shepherd laid down his life for us.
- Today is the World Day of Prayer for Vocations. We pray that men and women listen
 for the Lord's call and respond generously and courageously. Jesus gives us the model of service in his identification as the Good Shepherd, leading, guiding, and protecting his flock. Let us pray for many good shepherds who will care for the flock of the
 one true Shepherd.
- Question of the Week: How is the Lord calling me to guide, nurture, and care for others?






